Wonderful Success Of Charlottetown Boy

FORD, Ont., July 22.—Evidence of Canada's continued development as an exporter of manufactured products is afforded by the recent appointment of H. H. Whitlock, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. J. Whitlock of Charlottetown, P. E. I., as factory representative of the Ford Motor Company of Canada, Limited, in West Africa.

Mr. Whitlock is now en route to Africa in the Gold Coast and territory will comprise Gambia, Sierra Leone, Gold Coast, Togoland, Nigeria and the British Cameroons. The total extent of the territory is about 450,000 square miles and the population approximately 25,000,000, predominantly blacks.

In recent years West Africa has developed extensively as an automobile market and a very considerable proportion of the motor vehicles sold there are Ford cars and trucks which are completely manufactured in the factory of the Ford Motor Company of Canada, Limited, at Ford, Ont.

Under the British Government's administration, land is held in trust for the natives and they enjoy the wealth which it creates. Nearly all of the world's grain and palm kernel crops are grown in these territories and these two crops have proved a fruitful source of revenue for the natives.

Railway facilities in these colonies are inadequate and so the motor truck has been called into service to assist in transporting the crops to the seaboard. Today the bulk of the crop is transported in Ford trucks, and a large proportion of the passenger transport is provided for by buses built upon commercial chassis.

Mr. Whitlock will be abroad for about three years. Prior to the war he resided in Charlottetown and in 1914 he enlisted with the 1st Canadian Division Signal Company and was attached to the headquarters staff of the 1st Canadian Infantry Brigade. He served in the ranks in France until 1917 when he was given a commission in the Royal Flying Corps, returning to France in June, 1918. In October, 1918, while participating as acting Flight Commander in a ground strike at Roulers he swooped down upon a fleet of enemy motor transports and so intent was he upon his shooting that he collided with an ammunition wagon while flying at about 140 miles per hour. Some time later he recovered consciousness in the hands of the enemy. He was in hospital for a considerable period and was transferred to a prison camp a few days after the armistice was signed.

In January, 1926, Mr. Whitlock joined the staff of the Ford Motor Company of Canada as district sales manager in the St. John branch territory. Some time later he was appointed commercial division head and a few months ago was transferred to home office at Ford, Ont., to undergo training for export work.

DESTRUCTION OF INSECT PESTS EFFECTIVE BY NEW PROCESSES

Many millions of dollars will be saved annually as a result of new treatment entailing spreading of insecticide by specially designed aeroplanes.

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Ont., July 22.—A sweep victory over the insect pests which infest Canada's forests doing many millions of dollars worth of damage annually is expected as a result of recent experiments in dusting the woods with poison sprayed from a specially designed aeroplane. The experiment has been made possible through the co-operation of the Entomological Branch of the Department of Agriculture, the Dominion air service and the provincial forest branch of Nova Scotia. The area selected as a test place was near Orangedale, Capt Breton Island, and where the trees were infested with spruce bud worms. Preliminary reports from the dusted area received here by J. W. Swaine who was in charge of the work indicate that the caterpillars are dying in great numbers and every hope is held out that the scheme may be developed to a point where it can be used as a thorough defence against forest insect pests. In the experiments the machine flew within about 20 feet of the tree tops in the calm air of the early morning, a dense volume of dust was swept backwards by the wind of the propeller and spread in a wide swath about a hundred feet in width, and covering the foliage of the trees.
