Airmen From "Down Under" Arrive Here

A WEST COAST CANADIAN PORT—(CP)—Bronzed airmen from New Zealand and Australia—the southern Dominions' latest contribution to the empire's vast air training plan—arrived at this far west port today and set their foot on the shores of Canada where they will complete training in the tactics of modern air warfare.

VICHY GOV'T BEGINS TALKS WITH ITALY

BERNE, Switzerland, Oct. 25.—(AP)—Diplomatic sources reported tonight that the Vichy government, which has just concluded negotiations with the Nazis, has begun negotiations with Italy. These sources said the talks are being carried out by vice-premier Laval in Paris, with Italian representatives in Rome.

Says Millions Of "Yanks" Are Coming

LONDON, Oct. 25.—(CP)—The Yanks are coming again—millions of them, as they did in 1918—Col. Charles Sweeney, honorary head of the Royal Air Force's Fleeting American Eagle squadron, said Frenchmen tonight in a broadcast. "Those of us who already are here are the vanguard, as we were in 1914," said Sweeney, one of the organizers of the Lafayette escadrille in which Americans flew in France prior to the United States' entry into the last war.

Targets Include Berlin And War Supply Depots

Raid On Berlin Goes On Three Hours. Nazis Admit Damage In Reich Capital And Elsewhere.

LONDON, Oct. 25—(CP)—British bombs exploded early today from Berlin to Rotterdam—from Hamburg to the west French coast and on war supply depots in far interior Germany—in one of the longest and most violent attacks yet delivered by the Royal Air Force. The attack on Berlin—the 23rd of the year—was declared by the Air Ministry to have gone on intermittently for nearly three hours, the raiding pilots cutting down through great cloud banks, 4,000 to 12,000 feet deep.

Two Deaths On Canadian Navy Casualty List

OTTAWA, Oct. 25—(CP)—The Royal Canadian Navy in its 10th official casualty list tonight reported the death of two men. The deaths raised the total of dead and missing reported since the outbreak of war to 69.

Rumored Axis May Attempt 'Peace Drive'

VICHY, France, Oct. 25—(AP)—Premier Petain returned tonight from his rendezvous with Hitler, and informed sources here considered the possibility that the present negotiations between Germany, Italy and France may be preludes to an axis "peace drive."

British Invasion Feared By Nazis

LONDON, Oct. 25—(CP)—The Daily Mail reported today that a Berlin radio broadcast has disclosed that German troops were building lines of fortifications along the French and Belgian coasts to repel a possible British landing in force.

Hope Fades For Fishermen

GLACE BAY, N.S., Oct. 25—(CP)—Hope was all but abandoned tonight for five men aboard the fishing schooner Bluebeard, missing since a broadcast said that the vessel was working out of this port three days ago.

Two R.C.A.F. Men Killed

LARDER LAKE ONT., Oct. 25—(CP)—A Royal Canadian Air Force training plane, in difficulty flying through thick mist from Winnipeg to an Ontario port, crashed into a hill near this northern Ontario mining town today, killing two members of the R. C. A. F.

Two Women Burned In Maine Fire

AUBURN, Me., Oct. 25—(AP)—Firemen searched the ruins of fire-wrecked hotel Whitehall tonight for the bodies of two women guests. One, a Miss Grace, was found in the before-dawn blaze. The other, a Miss Mary, was found in a burning room in a building which had been used as a hotel.

Hepburn Names Commission Head

TORONTO, Oct. 25—(CP)—Premier Mitchell F. Hepburn announced tonight that Justice C. P. McTaggart, of the Supreme Court of Ontario will head the three-man Royal Commission to investigate affairs of the Abitibi Power and Paper Company. The others will be Sir James Dunn and A. E. Dymont.

R.A.F. Continues To Harass Fascist Forces

LONDON, Oct. 25—(CP)—The Royal Air Force issued the following bulletin Friday night on operations in Africa: "Royal Air Force bombers continued their attacks on Gura and Asmara yesterday. At Asmara enemy aircraft dispersed on the ground and a fire was started alongside one building and two other fires were followed by explosions."

Swiss Gov't In Move To Round Up Totalitarians

BERNE, Switzerland, Oct. 25.—(AP)—The Swiss government announced today the arrest of numerous officials and employees of a widespread Swiss totalitarian organization called "the Swiss Union of Friends of Authoritative Democracy." Raids were conducted simultaneously in a number of Swiss cities.
