True Bill Is Found In S'ide Robbery Case

A true bill was found by a Grand Jury at Summerside yesterday in the case of the King vs. Lawrence Cahill, charged with robbery and violence. This was the only case on the docket at the June sitting of the Supreme Court opened. The prisoner was arraigned and pleaded not guilty. Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell presided. At the opening of the court the Attorney-General, Mr. Frederick A. Large, K.C., referred to the sudden death of the Sheriff of the County, Mr. F. J. E. Wright. "The Province and the court have suffered severe loss in the sudden passing of Sheriff Wright," he said. "I am sure that all were shocked at the news. I knew him for many years, since my youth, and a more cheerful and efficient servant of the public could not be found. I wish to express to his family the sincere sympathy of the Bar of the Province. The Attorney-General then moved that Mr. Harry Harvey of Linkletter be appointed acting sheriff till an appointment was made. This order was made by the court and the Chief Justice addressed the Grand Jury: "I know all feel that the court is meeting today under a sad pall. There is a cloud over our proceedings by the absence through death of the late Sheriff Frederick J. E. Wright. He was associated with the life of the Town and County and particularly in the office of sheriff most of his lifetime. Most of you knew him so well it is unnecessary for me to say anything about his character or personality. The court and the public service have lost one of their most faithful and competent officers. The Town and Province have lost one of their finest citizens. He set a standard of service that will be difficult for his successor to follow. "Yesterday he had a very busy day. He told me he had ordered and received a pair of white gloves which he hoped to present to me today in the absence of any criminal indictments. Unfortunately, at the last moment a new case, and one which will be necessary for the court to handle at this sitting, turned up. It then became the duty of the Sheriff to summon a petit jury. His friends have the satisfaction of knowing he died as he wished, suddenly and without any protracted period of illness or suffering. I am sure I speak for you all when I concur with what has been said by the Attorney-General in expressing sincere sympathy to Mrs. Wright and the relatives." The Chief Justice then read the

Grand Jury Report We the Grand Jury at this time would like to express our deep regret over the death of our Sheriff Frederick J. E. Wright whose loss will be keenly felt by this court as well as the people of Prince Edward Island, and also to express our sympathy to his immediate family. We would like to express to you, sir, our appreciation for the very fair, plain and impartial manner in which you have presented your views on the case for our consideration, and your timely suggestions. While it is not in our province to deal with any infringements of our laws which have already been dealt with by our courts, we view with alarm the increasing violations of our Traffic Act and the many fatal accidents resultant. Especially would we point out these directly or indirectly due to drunken drivers and recommend the penalty of those found guilty of driving to the common danger under the influence of liquor be greatly increased and made so severe that those in the habit will be made to realize the seriousness of their actions. There are also many drivers who refuse the common courtesy of dimming their lights when approaching another car, or very often drive with only one headlight. Our attention has been drawn to the fast and reckless driving of many of our cars, taxi and truck drivers. This is a serious condition and we recommend a close watch be kept by the R. C. M. P. on our public highways. We have examined the premises and found everything in first class condition. We have been informed that some trouble exists in the lighting system due to short circuit in the wiring. We would recommend that this matter be attended to immediately. Some cleaning and painting to the north side of the premises is needed, particularly the halls. Respectfully submitted, Parvla Cass foreman, for self and fellows.

(Continued from Page 1) are as high and in some cases higher than last year," he continued. "During the war, wages in that industry were fixed by the War Measures Act. While this Act has been removed from the statute-books, wages have been maintained at high levels. I know because I am closely associated with the industry myself." The same situation, Senator McIntyre added, prevails in agriculture and in other trades and industries in Prince Edward Island. He called attention to the fact that workers on Prince Edward Island Railways enjoy better protection in case of accident or industrial disease than railway workers of any other Province with the exception of New Brunswick. The Island workers have the right of appeal from a compensation board decision, which right is denied workers in the industrialized Provinces of Ontario and Quebec. Senator McIntyre declined to express an opinion on the desirability or otherwise of minimum wage legislation in the Province by Provincial statute. That, he said, was a matter for the Province to decide. If anyone inferred from Labor Minister Mitchell's statement, which was quite correct in itself, that workers were sweated and under-paid in Prince Edward Island because of the lack of a minimum wage law, they would be mistaken, the Senator emphasized. Reverting to wages in the lobster industry, Senator McIntyre pointed out that wages were maintained at war levels despite the drop in price of lobster of \$30 a case. In addition the industry was faced with much higher material costs. "Having 400,000 empty tins on hand, the firm secured four car-loads of beans, several puncheons of molasses and other materials and asked permission to pack pork and beans. "Although the firm has orders for pork and beans of nearly \$70,000 and no other firm in the Province is packing this food, Mr. Abbott and his Department have refused to grant the necessary authority to go ahead.

(Continued from Page 1) He also quoted orders limiting the use of metal containers, noting that "no exceptions to this prohibition have been or can be allowed any packer who did not pack in 1941, regardless of circumstances as such action would be manifestly unfair to established packers." The company, Mr. Fox said, originally canned chicken but "due to refusal of the Federal Government to grant an export permit could not dispose of its product.
