and other dry countries, he said. The appeal fell on deaf ears.

In ponderous style, the House considered the thousands of men who, hit by the depression, turned to rolling their own smokes. The National Revenue Minister believed the cut in the excise tax and corresponding drop in cigarette prices would make it unnecessary for smokers to roll their own. Likewise, he believed the cut in liquor excise taxes would be another blow to bootleggers.

New Brunswick Bog Branberries Shipped To M'tl.

ST. JOHN, Nov. 7.—The first carload of New Brunswick bog branberries is now moving forward to the Montreal market. Dominion Stores, Ltd. are the purchasers and the Willett Fruit Co., Ltd., are shippers.

The cranberries were raised by independent growers on the "Sun Foke" meadows near Rusagornis, Sunbury county.

Dominion Store officials after viewing the berries on Saturday, pronounced them equal in quality with the Cape Cod product and predicted a bright future for the cranberry business of New Brunswick.

The shipment is packed in 50-pound wooden boxes. It is reported that production and shipping costs are such that the berries will be able to enter into direct and effective competition with the Cape Cod berries, which up until now have pretty much dominated the upper Canadian market.

Joint Control Of Hotels Is Still Considered

OTTAWA, Nov. 7.—That the proposal to operate the Nova Scotian Hotel and the Lord Nelson Hotel, both at Halifax, under the one management is still being seriously considered by the C. N. R. which owns the former, and by the C. P. R. which has a large interest in the latter, is indicated in the evidence given by E. W. Beatty, president of the C. P. R., before the Duff Commission.

Mr. Beatty, the report that has been released shows, was telling the commission what had already been accomplished and had been planned in the way of voluntary co-operation between the two roads to eliminate needless competition. "Within recent months," he said, "an agreement has been reached whereby Canadian National agents solicit traffic for Canadian Pacific Steamships on the Atlantic, in return for reciprocal advantages in the routing of rail traffic to and from the steamships."

"At Halifax," continued Mr. Beatty, "where there have been two superior hotels, the Nova Scotian and operated by the Canadian National and the Lord Nelson in which the Canadian Pacific had a substantial interest, an agreement for joint operation of both by an independent company is in process of negotiation." The Lord Nelson is at present operated by the Associated Canadian Hotels, Limited. The purpose to operate the two hotels under the one management, which was made some time ago, has apparently been revived.

ement. Under the Mines Act, a lessee can prosecute any one mining coal on such property under two distinct charges, theft under the Criminal Code, and mining without a license.

As the latter charge would involve less expense and could be decided with a magistrate's decision, the case of MacIntyre was tried under this charge, with a conviction found by Magistrate A. McDonald, of Glace Bay. According to the evidence, MacIntyre was operating a pit in the basement of a house occupied by him.

The ground on which the pit was found, according to the argument presented by Mr. MacGillivray, counsel for the defendant, was covered by a lease to the Dominion Coal Company, and therefore since there was a lease outstanding there could be no violation of the section of the Mines Act in dispute.

Judge Crowe, however, failed to appreciate this contention, stating that the section of the Act means what it says, namely, that in unleased territory a person who prospects must have a license, and in leased territory, the person who prospects must have a lease.

Section 10 of the Act reads: "No person shall prospect or mine without a license or a lease, and every person who contravenes this section, shall for every day he prospects or mines without a license or a lease be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty dollars and in default of payment to imprisonment for a period not exceeding one month."

MacIntyre pleaded not guilty to the charge before the trial magistrate, but offered no evidence to support his plea. On the subsequent appeal before Judge Crowe, the defendant again refused to offer testimony on his own behalf.

"It would appear, therefore," commented Judge Crowe, "that unless the trial magistrate was manifestly wrong in making his conviction the conviction must stand and the appeal be dismissed."

In commenting on the case, Judge Crowe stated that there was ample evidence that the defendant was engaged in mining, the day on which the mine was examined by the informant. Peck asked MacIntyre if the pit in question was his and he replied in the affirmative. MacIntyre showed him the air course and stated there was no danger of gas. When asked what kind of lights were used, he replied, "lanterns."

Coal mined in the pit, three or four tons of it, was seen, and eight or ten tons on the surface. The defendant was in the pit which was equipped with picks, shovels, drills and lanterns, and the defendant and others were there in working clothes.

U. S. Visitors For Maritimes

MONCTON, N. B., Nov. 7.—A considerable number of expatriated Maritimers are expected to pay a visit to their native provinces in a bargain trip excursion being operated from Boston by the Boston and Maine and connecting railways on Thursday, November 10th, day coaches only being used, according to R. J. S. Weatherston, general freight and passenger agent of the Canadian National Railways here.

Present plans call for the excursion to leave by regular train "The Gull" leaving Boston 9.30 p. m. November 10th, arriving St. John, Moncton, Halifax, Truro, the following day, Sydney, Saturday morning. In the case of passengers for Prince Edward Island points, tickets will be good to stop over at Saint John or points east until Saturday November 12th, on account of train connections, the train carrying the excursion not arriving in time to make the morning connection to Prince Edward Island. Tickets will be good to return leaving destination up to and including Monday, November 14th, except in the case of points on Prince Edward Island for which an extra day has been allowed.

No difficulty should be experienced by those making the trip in connection with immigration into Canada or their re-entry back to the United States. In the case of re-entry into the United States passengers should carry with them documentary evidence, showing their right to re-enter, such as birth certificate, naturalization certificate, certificate from poll clerk showing right to vote. Aliens lawfully admitted to the United States should carry their passports on which they originally entered or a letter from immigration officer in which their record has been taken showing conditions of their admission to the United States. This would seem to be a very good opportunity for people in Maritimes to write to relatives and friends residing in Boston and surrounding district to visit them as the fares

Canada Geese And Brant Plentiful

(Special to the Guardian)

MONCTON, Nov. 7.—Canada geese and brant or "wavey" geese in flocks of tens of thousands are now feeding on the bays along the Miramichi in the Tabusintac area of New Brunswick according to reports from outfitters in that area received by the fish and game department of the Canadian National Railways.

Charles T. Summerson, a wild fowler of more than 20 years experience who operates Allinwick Lodge at Tabusintac in a letter received states "never in the history of Tabusintac have there been such large numbers of Canada geese as are here now on their southward migration. They are here and passing through in thousands which is not in keeping with the reports circulated during the northward flight this spring. In twenty years of New Brunswick wild fowling I have never seen such vast numbers of geese nor have I seen as many goshawks in one season. The condition as to numbers also applies to myriads of black duck and there is better than a normal flight of brant which are with us in rafts of one thousand or more. In addition we had a good flight of Broadbill, some Redheads, and this falls flight brought in several varieties which are usually rare here."

Bird hunters from all parts of Canada and the United States visit the Tabusintac area for their fall shooting when brant are hunted from sink boxes in the shallow bays and Canada geese from hides on the shore line. Many good bags have already been taken during the season and the shooting will last until ice forms on the bays and the last of the geese move south.

Stream Flow In Quebec

OTTAWA, Canada, Nov. 7.—The Dominion Water Power and Hydro-metric Bureau of the Department of the Interior reports that stream flow in Quebec during September was substantially above normal north of the St. Lawrence river and varied from normal to sub-normal south of the river. In the area immediately tributary to the St. Lawrence from the north as indicated by the flow of the St. Maurice river, the natural run-off was more than double the September average, whilst in the regulated portion of the river the flow was nearly 80 per cent. above the average. In the north of the province records of the Harricaw river at Amos indicate exceptionally low, Mr. Weatherston stated.

With this season's navigation drawing to a close, there are but a few more steamers to arrive here. A large number of the smaller crafts are being hauled up every day and are being put into their winter quarters, before the bad weather sets in.

The S. S. Silvia, Capt. Kean, arrived in port last night at 9 o'clock from Montreal with a large cargo of inward mixed freight. She also has a passenger list. After discharging her cargo, the Silvia will shift from her present berth at Carvell's wharf to the Railway Wharf where she will load a large shipment of oats and other produce for Newfoundland.

Wheat Situation

The correspondent of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics at Buenos Aires reports the official estimate of the wheat crop at 225,922,000 bushels, carry over 16,304,000, total 242,226,000, needed for seed and domestic consumption 95,532,000, exported to September 30, 114,858,000, balance still available 31,836,000. He says: "With practically no wheat coming forward there is no selling pressure whatever here, and our prices continue too high in comparison with those quoted by other exporting countries for there to be any hope of doing business with European buyers. Our influence in the international trade is nil, and will continue to be so until the new crop materializes, meanwhile leaving to Canada and the United States the leading roles in the determination of export wheat prices."

"With the good crops reported from consuming countries in Europe, and the apparent probability of world surplus of wheat, the feeling on the market is somewhat pessimistic at present."

"The locust plague is still with us and the area covered by the insects is slowly spreading. There is little actual damage to the wheat, although there has certainly been some in the northern Santa Fe and Entre Rios. But generally the crops of flax and the pastures have made a greater appeal to the insect appetite, and that is where most of the damage has been done."

BRITISH IMPORTS OF HARDWOOD

British importation of hewn hardwood from Canada in September totalled 36,749 cubic feet, which was about four times that from either the United States or Poland and one-third of the total importation.

The imports of sawn hardwood in the last nine months totalled 19,737,702 cubic feet. The following countries supplied the larger quantities: United States 9,895,445, Canada 3,029,291, Poland 1,644,141, Japan 875,247, British India 647,194, Finland 388,460.

BRITISH IMPORTS OF SOFTWOOD

British imports of softwood not planned or dressed in the nine months ending September amounted to 2,975,599 loads. The chief contributors were: Russia 1,092,217, Finland 729,690, Sweden 423,826, Latvia 195,178, Canada 156,744, Poland 141,826, United States 117,150, Sweden 32,340. There were in addition smaller quantities of hewn softwood, Russia supplying the largest quantity with Canada fifth.
