Cheerful Farmer Talks Of Hogs

"You are feeling much better than when you called on us in 1932," said the editor.

"Why not," he replied, "after what Mr. BENNETT did for us hog raisers at the Ottawa Conference."

"Tut! tut!" said we, "the Liberals say Mr. BENNETT did nothing for the farmers."

"Is that so," he replied, with a few remarks that cannot be printed. "Look at these figures on bacon and hams:

Discussing the methods adopted by other parties to meet the demands of Government, the Prime Minister referred to "the Liberal way" under MACKENZIE KING which he said had brought "Beauharnois and the Montreal Bridge."

He would give a further instance of "the Liberal way," Mr. BENNETT said, by reading, without comment, a passage from JOHN W. DAFOE'S book on Sir CLIFFORD SIFTON. Mr. BENNETT then proceeded to read from the book a description of Sir CLIFFORD'S method of transferring his securities from the vault of a trust company in Ottawa to those of a Toronto trust company when he moved to the latter city after serving as a member of the LAURIER administration.

It was shown that Sir CLIFFORD, not caring for the usual methods of transferring valuable securities, took a trunk and two suitcases to the Ottawa vaults, "shoveled his securities into them," and checked the trunk to Toronto while carrying the suitcases to his compartment on the train.

"I offer that without comment," Mr. BENNETT said, "as an instance of how they do things in the Liberal way."

He has overlooked Sir Leonard Tilley, who, in 1878, resigned the governorship of New Brunswick to aid Sir John Macdonald in the National Policy campaign.

The endocrine (ductless glands) endow each personality and enhance (enrich or increase) it by increasing the energy of the individual but they cannot change the direction in which that energy will be used, nor change the type of personality the individual has."

The kind of personality of any individual is determined by his parents before he is born. In other words you cannot make an extrovert (one whose thoughts and actions are all away from himself) into an introvert (one whose thoughts are always turned inward to himself) by feeding him gland extracts.

Dr. Freeman's statements were based on a study of 1400 cases of disease of the endocrine or ductless glands. He pointed out that the glands are necessary for stability or steadiness of temperament.

Irritability or sensitiveness of the nervous system, which would affect the personality may be caused by a lack of balance between these ductless glands, such as an excess of thyroid juice and a lack of parathyroid juice.

The thought then is that each gland juice does its own kind of work. The kind of work it will do in an individual is always the same for that individual but the amount of work it does can be increased by the use of the extract.
