These are only a few of the urgent and irresistible demands on the Bible Society, and now is the acceptable time to respond opportunities lost, now may be lost for ever.
HOW MUCH IS REQUIRED TO MEET THEM.
To give every person alive a halfpenny Gospel would cost over three million pounds sterling, apart from the expenses of translation and distribution. Though it is impossible at present to reach all men even with a fragment of bread, there are multitudes of the hungry whom we can reach in obedience to our Lord's command "Give ye them to eat." The Committee of the Bible Society ask for a special Centenary Fund of at least 250,000 Guineas. The P. E. I. Auxiliary will hold Centenary services in Charlottetown on March 6th and 7th.
