sections of the province had been held up to ridicule at home and abroad as unprogressive and behind the times. He believed the great majority of the people not only of Bedeque, but along the whole road from Summerside to Crapaud were in favour of opening the road. There would, he expected, be another delegation from Bedeque and Summerside asking for a subsidy to a motor bus service between Summerside and Port Borden. Without such a service which is only a part of modern progressiveness, they could not expect to keep their young people at home. A few extreme anti-anti-people started an agitation and made all the noise. These people could not be reasoned with, but that was no reason why all the rest of the people, the people who were minding their own business should be denied modern privileges. The great majority of the people want this road opened. Some 80 per cent of them had petitioned for its opening and he hoped the Government would open it at the earliest possible moment. Howard McFarlane followed. He had always been neutral, but so many extremes in their opposition that he and many others felt it was time to hear the other side. A report of an anti-anti meeting recently held in Bedeque was published in the newspapers. It was grossly unfair giving only one side of the story. There were many at the meeting who were favourable to the running of autos, although the meeting was said to be unanimously opposed. He thought the Government should open this road as petitioned for by over 75 per cent of the people.

(Continued from page one) train. An Aerial League has been formed in this country with branches in all the important cities. These are the centres where men may come in and be cadets. Referring to the proposition for an air route for the mails between this province and the mainland looking at it in a casual way it appears quite feasible, said Lieut. Thomas. The cost, at the present time, would, however, be much in excess of transportation by steamboat. The conditions after the war will change so much that this difficulty will be removed. There will be many aeroplanes on the market and many pilots looking for employment. The question of aeroplanes is bound to be a live one throughout Canada. Lieut. Thomas told several interesting stories of incidents in aerial warfare. Several questions were asked by those present to all of which he replied very courteously. He pronounced the aerial service to be a very attractive one, doing very important work and having the longest hours to themselves of any body of national workers. Flying, he declared, to be quite safe; in fact he did not hear of a man being hurt in a machine all the time he was in France. He leaves today for Halifax. All intending applicants for the air service should apply to Mr. F. W. Hyndman, City, who will supply the necessary forms.

Officers and men from Canada with whom The Mail and Empire correspondent conversed during his recent visit to the front were unanimous in agreeing that the Dominion must be prepared to make the utmost sacrifice rather than allow the lustre gained to be dimmed by the failure to maintain the Canadian corps throughout the great struggle.—Toronto Mail and Empire.
