TROUT EGGS FOR HATCHERY—Word was received yesterday by the Prince Edward Island Fish and Game Protective Association from the Department of Fisheries at Ottawa, that 550,000 trout eggs would be shipped here from Antigonish, Nova Scotia, to be hatched out and later put into the new rearing ponds at Alley Mills, Head of Cardigan. Approximately 400,000 eggs have already been placed in the hatchery. The 900,000 young trout will be fed to fingerling size and distributed into suitable streams over the province next fall, it was said.

Anne Boleyn Picture Owned In Toronto

During her imprisonment in the Tower of London, ill-fated Anne Boleyn, second wife of Henry VIII, occupied her time by pin-pricking pictures, and one of those is today the cherished possession of Miss Julia Barkaway.

The picture is that of Anne Boleyn's attendant, a nun who gave the doomed woman spiritual comfort in the days before her execution.

As portraits go today, the pin-pricked picture is a crude attempt at art, but amazing in detail. Pin-pricked on both sides of the paper, the picture of the Tower of London attendant depicts the heavy, ominous looking keys which hang on the girdle. Anne Boleyn's artistic equipment was indeed high, been measured as shown by the splashy coloring of the face and hands.

The companion pin-pricked picture—Anne Boleyn's maid attendant in the Tower of London—is now the property of Miss Barkaway's sister residing in England. These heirlooms have been handed down from Miss Barkaway's grandfather—Thomas Luck of Hadlow, Kent, England.

Prof. C. T. Curry of the Royal Ontario Museum, when shown the pin-pricked picture by Miss Barkaway, declared it a fine specimen of the fifteenth and sixteenth century work.

The Provincial Executive of the Women's Institutes met on the Tuesday, February 15, 1938, in the absence of the secretary, Mrs. Fred Gates was appointed secretary pro tem.

Members present were: Mrs. Mel-jah, Mrs. MacMillan, Mrs. MacLaren, Mrs. Shaw, Mrs. Jenkins, Mrs. Bell, Mrs. Leard, Mrs. Gaudet, Miss Rodd, Miss Hazzard and Mrs. Gates.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted.

The matter of the yearly allotment to the F.W.I.C. was discussed and on motion of Mrs. MacMillan and Mrs. Bell it was decided that one hundred and fifty dollars be sent to the F. W. I. C. treasurer.

It was moved by Mrs. Bell, seconded by Mrs. MacLaren that our share of twelve dollars towards the upkeep of the Peace Garden be paid.

The question of the National Magazine was discussed. Some members thought it was a splendid idea, while others felt that we should have some absolute guarantee of space before accepting the idea. After further discussion it was moved by Mrs. Leard and seconded by Mrs. MacLaren that a circular letter be sent to the secretary asking that each Women's Institute branch guarantee fifty per cent of their membership and explain that this magazine would include the material usually given in our Women's Institute News as well as that from other provinces.

A letter received from the head office of the A.G.W.W. concerning the "Million Member" plan was read and explained by Miss Rodd. It was moved by Mrs. Gates and seconded by Mrs. Bell that the matter be included in the circular letter to the National Magazine.

With regard to our exhibit to be sent to the Triennial Convention at London, 1939, Mrs. MacMillan moved that this be taken up by the executive committee as part of her questionnaire. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Shaw.

It was moved by Mrs. Bell and seconded by Mrs. Jenkins that the annual fee to the A.C.W.W. be paid.

The matter of appointing a sub-committee to act in place of the executive was left over until the annual convention.

Mrs. MacMillan spoke of the expenses entailed by the president and suggested that some resolution be made with the president who was attending Institute business. Mrs. Shaw moved that expenses up to twenty five dollars be paid, and that accounts be strictly kept and certified. The motion was seconded by Mrs. MacMillan.
