THE ACCUSED' TOPS
IN SUSPENSE DRAMAS

The suspense was terrific at the Capitol Theatre yesterday when Paramount's new Hal Wallis drama, "The Accused," made its bow to a rapt audience. 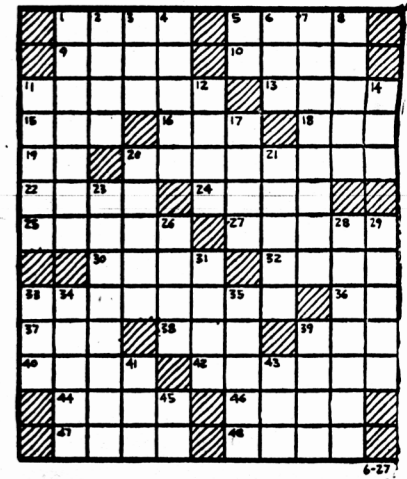

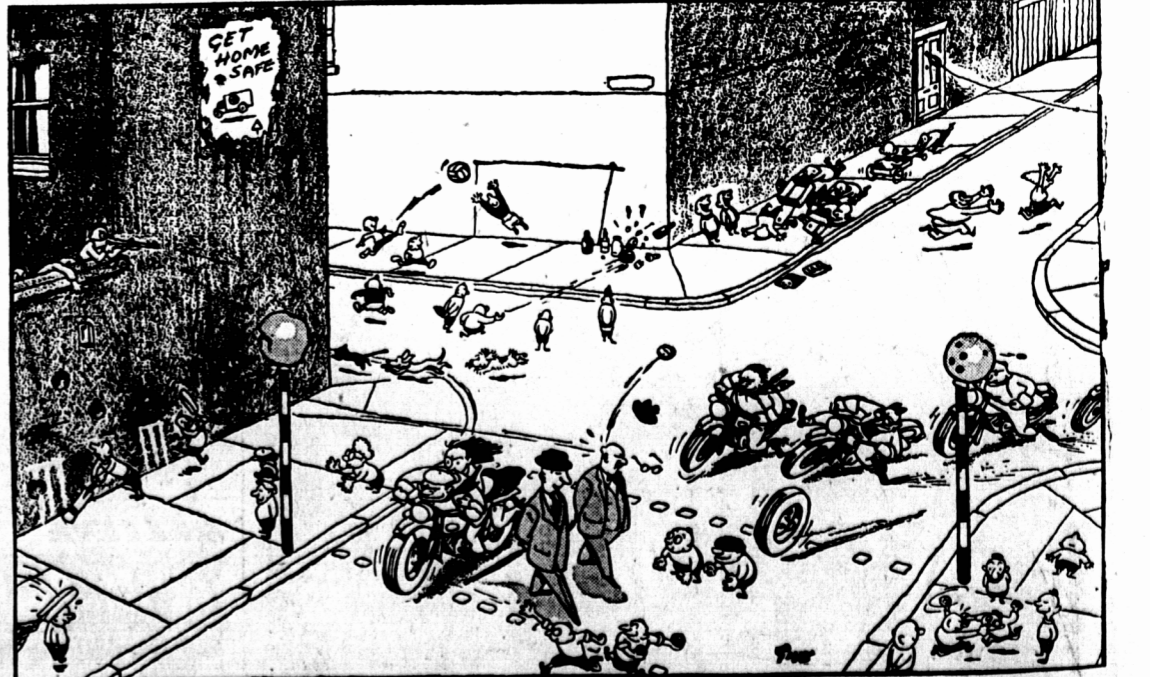
