In Memoriam Whitehall Notebook

Canadian Press Staff Writer LONDON, Jan. 11.—(CP)—Britain's past generosity to her leaders in war—she is only giving them their pensions this time—caused gloom among present holders of the national money-bags. The grateful nation granted the descendants of Admiral Lord Nelson an annuity of £5,000 (\$22,500) and since 1805 this has cost the Exchequer £700,000 (\$3,150,000). Hugh Dalton, Chancellor of the Exchequer, is to speak with the present Lord Nelson in the hope that some change can be made. This, however, was just one of Britain's bonanzas. The Duke of Marlborough, an ancestor of Winston Churchill, received £5,000 annually plus Blenheim Palace built at public expense for £240,000. The Duke of Wellington came home from victory over the French to a house and gift of £700,000. After the First Great War, Admiral Earl Beattie received £100,000 and Field Marshal Earl Haig, army commander, £100,000 and his ancestral home in Scotland. Admiral Lord Jellicoe and Gen. Lord Allenby received £50,000 each.

Bit of lace: British women and children must continue to go about with little decoration on their clothes although the grave heads of the House of Commons nodded in agreement when Sidney Shepherd, (Conservative) asked Sir Stafford Cripps, president of the Board of Trade, if he was aware that women were utterly disgusted with austere regulations and men liked to see women and children wearing a bit of lace. Sir Stafford said he was aware men liked to see lace but the quantity of lace that would be provided for manufacture of fancy lace was small and was needed for export.

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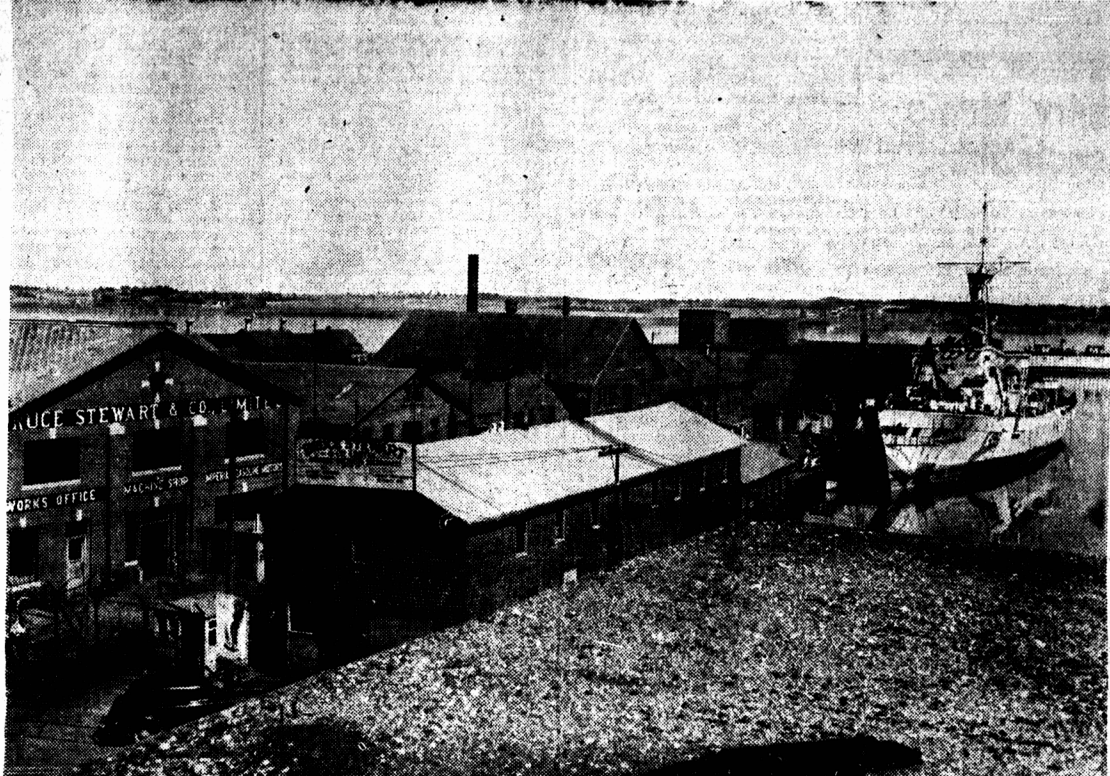
