

INDIAN GUILTY OF MURDER.

OTTAWA, Nov. 5.—The new trial allowed in the case of Stephen Kyioshki, the Indian convicted at Sarnia of the killing of Adam John will take place at the next assizes unless a special sitting of the court is called for. The case as it now stands is one of the most peculiar in the criminal annals of Canada. Only once before has the right to grant a new trial after a conviction for murder been exercised in this country. This was in the case of Mrs. Sternaman, who was found guilty nearly a dozen years ago at Cayuga of poisoning her husband. The then minister of justice, Hon. David Mills, ordered a new trial. Twelve hours before the time set for the execution notice of a reprieve of fifteen days reached Cayuga and the new trial followed. The gallows had been erected for the woman's execution. In the present case Kyioshki was found guilty of one killing and acquitted of another, both having occurred at the same time in the same place.

EPIDEMIC OF SUICIDE SWEEPING BOSTON.

BOSTON, Nov. 4.—Mrs. Caroline Eaton, formerly of Halifax, aunt of Beatrice Smith, of Halifax, is dying at the Boston city hospital, one of several who tried killing themselves in an epidemic of suicide that has been sweeping Boston and suburbs for the last few days. Mrs. Eaton has been living with her husband, Walter Eaton, to whom she had been married but few months. In the absence of Mr. Eaton she locked herself in her room and turned on all the gas jets. Neighbors, alarmed at the odor, broke open her apartment and found her unconscious and apparently dying. She was taken to the Boston city hospital and her name is still on the "dangerous list" there, although she is alive at 10 tonight. She left notes for her husband and friends and for Rev. Allen Stockdale. She told her husband in her death letter where he could find clean linen to wear at her funeral. She left also a letter for Beatrice Smith, of Halifax. Mrs. Eaton is thought to have been religiously insane.

N. B. AND P. E. I. SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.

MONCTON, Nov. 4.—The New Brunswick and P. E. Island Sunday School Convention opened this morning in the Sunday School room of the First Baptist Church at 10 o'clock. The indications are for a record-breaking attendance. The devotional service was conducted by Rev. W. A. Ross, who presided. Prayer was offered by Rev. R. M. Bynon. Mr. Ross then introduced Mrs. Mary Foster Bryner, International Elementary Superintendent of Chicago, who took charge of the service. Mrs. Bryner spoke on Sunday school work and scripture reading. The term Elementary was discussed at length. This term in Sunday school hoot up to the "teen" years. This division includes four phases of our work, namely, first, Cradle Roll, Second, Beginners, Third, Primary, Fourth, Junior. The Cradle Roll department has been in existence since 1881, and extends from the birth of the child, until it is three years of age, the Beginners department for children under the school age, extends from three to five years, the Primary, for school children, who are just beginning to read, extends from 6 to 8 years, the Junior for boys who can read and write, extends from 9 to 12 years. The schools, which have these departments, are far ahead of those without them. These departments apply equally well to all denominations.
