

Gay Law Winner Of Junior Free - For - All

Upsets Are Feature On Opening Day Of Goodwill Race Meet

Close finishes, sensational duels of speed and fast times were part and parcel of the Goodwill racing program held yesterday afternoon as Gay Law, Halifax-owned horse came through with a victory in the featured junior free for all event, pacing two miles in better than 2:10 before being headed by Cylonic and Scott Spencer in the final mile of the event.

Upsets as usual played a major role with Just Betty, owned by Dr. R. F. Seaman causing the biggest one as she raced off with the 2:21-2:23 pace in straight heats, giving a display of pacing power that saw her take a new record of 2:10 3-5 in winning the first heat as driver Don Seaman took her out from behind to beat the pack home in the stretch battle.

Marjorie Hanover was another upset winner in the Classified Trot, having a 1-1-1 summary; Reta's Trinket added still another in capturing the two year old futurity, while the only favorite to head a summary was Marion L. driven by the great old veteran Tyndal Semple in the 2:19 Classified Trot.

As added feature the crowd also saw Prince Budlong go down at the first turn in the first heat of the 2:21-2:23 pace, throwing driver Harold Cudmore over the top of him, but the reinsman luckily escaped injury. Prince Budlong came back to place fifth and second in the next two miles.

The program continues this afternoon with another five class card that is expected to produce even keener racing while in the evening a night racing program will see three additional classes raced.

Yesterday's lengthy card was run off in an efficient manner by the officials, with Starter Dr. F. C. Dougan giving another great display in getting the fields away with a minimum of scoring.

2:21-2:23 Pace
First Heat: Just Betty provided another upset as, after trailing June Morning driver Don Seaman took her to the front at the seven-eighths and pulled away in the stretch to win by four lengths. After Prince Budlong had come down at the first turn June Morning led the field followed by Just Betty and the remainder a couple of strides behind. Positions changed rapidly in the final half with Aubrey Budlong finishing second, June Morning third, Marjorie Budlong fourth, Eleanor G., Miss Knox and Single Streak were placed in that order. Single Streak finished fourth but was set back for interference on the first turn.

Second Heat: The fans saw another great race as Don Seaman again took Just Betty home in front of a packed field of seven horses, regaining the lead in the stretch after June Morning had paced to the front on the first turn after getting the field around to the half. Marjorie pulled out at the stands to race neck and neck with Neil to the three-quarters before allowing in front. At the seven-eighths Mac Stout and Eva Worthly started to come on with Eva nipping second place. Neil Kalmuck placed third as Mac Stout was set back for pacing in the stretch. Buddy Moko, after a disastrous break, was fifth.

Third Heat: It was Marjorie Hanover all the way from the word. Buddy Moko made a bid in the first half only to drop back. Mac Stout came on from the seven-eighths with a challenge but Marjorie had too much trot left, winning comfortably. Neil Kalmuck scooped from a break to place third, Buddy Moko fourth and Eva Worthly fifth.

Fourth Heat: Starting off in last place Marjorie Hanover gave the crowd an extra thrill in the stretch as she surged from behind to take the heat from Neil Kalmuck who had headed Mac Stout halfway down the stretch. Again the horses raced closely packed from the three-quarters to the wire, with Buddy Moko third, Eva Worthly fourth, Mac Stout fifth.

Junior Free For All
First Heat: The fans saw another exciting four-horse finish as Gay Law came through in the stretch to win the heat. Away in front, Walnut Abbe lost the lead so Time Counts on the backstretch to lead the field around the half. Strung out the drivers started on the back side with Gay Law, Walnut Abbe and Cylonic in a bunch as they hit the stretch. Gay Law outfooted them home, Time Counts being second, Walnut Abbe third, Cylonic fourth, Alyceno fifth with the remainder well strung out.

Second Heat: The crowd saw an eye-opening finish as Gay Law's going burst nipped Time Counts at the wire. Time Counts had led all the way after taking the lead at the first turn, but again couldn't withstand the winner's bid from the top of the stretch.

Cylonic was third a half length in front of Alyceno.
Third Heat: Still another surprise was added as Cylonic came on in the stretch to win the heat in another driving finish. Time Counts, after losing the lead to Walnut Abbe, took over again at the quarter pole to lead right into the stretch, but fell before the closing rush of Cylonic. Scott Spencer and Gay Law, who finished in that order.

Two Year Old Futurity
First Heat: Reta's Trinket in an upset win, led from wire to wire to win the first mile. Rosalie H. moved from far back to second place as they hit the backstretch for the first trip, followed by Miss Cherry Valley. The three top horses failed to change positions, Reta's Trinket winning by two lengths followed by Miss Cherry Valley, Glib Hanover, Westphal Girl and 7 Up Direct.

Second Heat: It was Reta's Trinket all the way, leading from wire to wire. She made a break at the half but failed to retain the lead and paced under the wire a length to the good despite another skip 20 yards away. Rosalie H. was second the entire mile. Westphal Girl trotted fast to place third, 7 Up Direct fourth, Miss Cherry Valley fifth and Glib Hanover sixth.

2:19 Trot
First Heat: It was another driving finish between five or six horses as Marion L. after taking the lead from Queenie Dewey staved off the closing stretch challenges to win by a length over May Todd. They were strung out at the half but the six leading horses had packed together at the seven-eighths, furnishing a pretty picture as they pounded towards the wire. May Todd finished fast to cop second, Luscilia moved up from sixth to third, Billie Kalmuck fourth, Quaker's Boy fifth, Queenie Dewey, Geo Mac and Sir Francis Drake finished in that order.

Second Heat: Marion L. made every post a winning one in the second mile, withstanding stretch drives by four other horses to win by half a length over Quaker's Boy who came very fast from the seven-eighths. Luscilia was third and Billie Kalmuck fourth among the money winners.

Third Heat: After losing the lead by the first mile, Johnny Conroy took Quaker's Boy out again at the seven-eighths pole to trot to the front in the stretch in the final mile. May Todd finished fast to cop second, Luscilia moved up from sixth to third, Billie Kalmuck third and Quaker's Boy fifth, Queenie Dewey, Geo Mac and Sir Francis Drake finished in that order.

Upsets still continue to play the leading role in Island harness racing circles and yesterday afternoon as the Goodwill meeting opened no less than four out of five favorites went down to defeat in what was considered one of the finest days of racing this event has produced in its years of existence.

Close driving finishes with battles taking place over every part of the track were part and parcel of the program and today with a five-class card scheduled for the afternoon and a three-class card for the night, racing program fans should just about have their fill of harness racing for this week.

This afternoon's card will be highlighted by the looked-forward-to free for all and some thrilling duels of speed should be witnessed before the winner is decided. In the minds of the railbirds the track record will be a very little danger but nevertheless the horses that will take the word appear to be very evenly matched in speed and staying power and all heats should be fought out right to the wire.

But while the free for all will be holding the spotlight more or less, the other classes on the card will produce equally as keen racing. Last night among the bettors opinion was pretty well divided as to the winners and it will be a bit surprising if the program is once again dotted with upsets.

The night program looks to be about the best the management have lined up since they started staging these events. Cream of Maritime racing flesh in their respective divisions will be participating in the first field of horses not be a bit surprising if the program watching them perform under the lights. Night racing has caught on here in a big way and a record crowd is expected to fill the stands before the first field of horses are led up the stretch by Marshall Miss Vimy Jones.

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Death Of Well-known Racing Enthusiast

TORONTO, Sept. 10 (CP)—A.M. (Abe) Orpen, 61 well known in Dominion racing circles, died here suddenly today of a heart ailment.

In conjunction with his father, the late A.M. (Abe) Orpen, sportsman and philanthropist, and his younger brother, Fred, he had been associated with racing in Toronto since his youth.

Born in Toronto, he was educated in public schools and at Upper Canada College. He then entered his father's business and was active in racing until his death.

His father was the founder of the Kenilworth race track at Windsor, Ont., and of the Dufferin and Long Branch tracks at Toronto. The "Mrs. Orpen Cup and Saucer," rosiest futurity raced for in Canada, was set up to commemorate his parents' golden wedding anniversary.

He is survived by his brother, Fred, and a sister, Mrs. T.A. Woods.

McPhail's Baseball Standing In Doubt

CINCINNATI, Sept. 10 (AP)—Larry MacPhail's standing in baseball became a matter of some question today after Commissioner A.B. Chandler began an investigation into an interview attributed to the New York Yankees head in violation of an order not to discuss the suspension of Leo Durocher.

Chandler asked Al Buck, baseball writer for the New York Post, to fly to Cincinnati for questioning in the matter. Buck advised the commissioner he could not make such an appointment because of his work.

Baseball writers on other New York evening newspapers who also quoted MacPhail said Chandler asked them to send him copies of their stories.

The writers quoted MacPhail as saying in Washington last Thursday that it was a 100-to-1 shot that Durocher would not be back as manager at Brooklyn next year.

"Do you think that Durocher would have been suspended if Rickover (Branch Rickey, president of the Brooklyn club) hadn't wanted him suspended?" the reporters quoted MacPhail as saying.

MacPhail, president of the New York Yankees, denied that he authorized an interview.

When Chandler suspended Durocher on April 9 for the 1947 season for incidents "retroactive to baseball" after engaging in a verbal dispute with MacPhail and in which Rickey also became involved, he imposed silence on "all parties to this controversy."
