***ISLANDER DEAD—**The death of Mr. John McNeill, formerly of Green Hill, O'Leary, was brought to his former home for burial by his brother, Mr. Wallace McNeill. The funeral took place to Bethel Cemetery.

***SAD BEREAVEMENT—**Residents of Alberton and many friends at Summerside and elsewhere have been shocked to learn that Mr. Howard Clark of Alberton passed away there at 8 p. m. on Thursday. The deceased was a student at the Presbyterian Collegiate School at Pictou, N. S., where he was recently taken ill and entered the hospital. He returned to his home at Alberton on Wednesday and was operated upon there on Thursday afternoon.

***RUMORS LAID—**As many rumors had been afloat here, where the deceased was well known and where he was married to a Summerside lady, it was learned with relief on Saturday that the inquiry held at Fredericton, N. B., into the death of Mr. W. Fendleton, had ended in a verdict of accidental drowning. Since returning from Great War service overseas he had been subject to fits and from the evidence given at the inquest it was established that he had been seized with a fit on the wharf at Fredericton, had fallen into the river and was subsequently drowned. Much sympathy is expressed here for his widow and little five-year old son.

***BUSY DAY IN POLICE COURT—**Very considerable interest was shown in the proceedings at the police court in Summerside on Saturday, a large crowd being in attendance. The excitement was due to five local parties appearing charged under the Prohibition Act with selling liquor. Four out of the five cases were dismissed by Acting Stipendiary Magistrate for want of sufficient evidence. The remaining case was adjourned until Tuesday for further evidence. Mr. Thane Campbell appeared as counsel for the prosecution and Mr. J. J. Johnston, K.C., of Charlottetown for the defence. A drunk was fined \$20 and costs or sixty days. A nominal fine of \$1 and costs or ten days was imposed upon a milk vendor for selling without a license.

ITALIANS COMBAT NOISE NUISANCE

ROME, Oct. 1.—The noise nuisance is beginning to worry the Italians. The State is studying the problem. New laws will, it appears, forbid the inordinate use of hooters; newspaper vendors will not be allowed to "cry" their wares; cost-ly and dealers in State Lottery tickets must henceforth let the things they sell speak for themselves.

WOMAN ON AUSTRALIAN LABOR BOARD

LONDON, Oct. 1.—(C.P.)—Close following the departure of the economic mission to Australia comes the news that a woman expert to go to Australia to investigate the conditions of the opportunities for women workers there. The ministry's choice is Miss M. A. Cox, senior woman officer of Leeds Employment Committee and Secretary of Leeds Women's Migration Committee.

The Economic Mission, which left Britain consists of Sir Arthur Duckham, Sir Hugo Hirst, Sir Ernest Clark, and Douglas Malcolm. Their task is broadly, to gather information on any matter of mutual economic interest to Britain and the Commonwealth which may tend to promote trade between the two countries and the increase of settlement in Australia.

DEATH REGRETTED

Mr. Hugh Montgomery Campbell, of Sea View, passed away unexpectedly at 8 o'clock last Wednesday morning. He got up at his customary hour and apparently in his usual health when he suddenly collapsed. The deceased was 65 years of age and a man of great physical stature. Possessed of a very agreeable disposition he had many friends who will learn with genuine sorrow of his sudden demise. He leaves behind him his memory his wife and one son, John E.; also his grandsons, Leeland, Lorne and Norwood residing on the farmstead. Deceased was a son of the late Hon. William Campbell and of his wife, Mrs. M. M. Campbell, the old homestead with her son Robert; another brother, James, is in Western Canada, and a sister, Mrs. John S. Cousins, resides at Park Corner. The funeral took place on Thursday afternoon from his late home to the Geddies Memorial Cemetery and was one of the largest seen in the district. The eight pallbearers were Messrs. Geo. Cousins, James Cousins, John E. Cousins, Heath MacLeod, Kenneth MacLeod, James MacLeod, Wilfred Campbell and Frederick Champion. To the bereaved the sincere sympathy of the community is extended.

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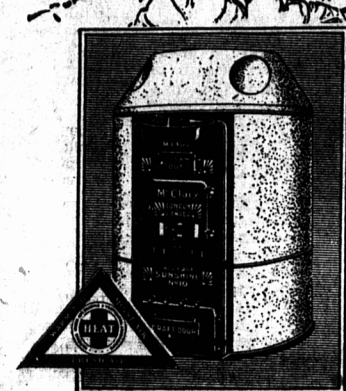
