THE EMPRESS TO BE REPAIRED

MONTREAL, October 16.—It has been decided that the passengers booked for the Empress of Ireland, scheduled to sail from Quebec for Liverpool on Friday of next week, shall be transferred to the Corsican of the Atlantic, leaving on the same day from Montreal and Quebec. In the meantime a survey is being made of the damaged Empress of Quebec, and divers are investigating the condition of the ship's bottom. After her accident on Thursday, the Empress was only able to make eight miles an hour, proceeding under her own steam to Quebec, which port she reached early this morning. After temporary repairs have been made at Quebec, the Empress of Ireland will steam to Halifax for dry docking. The Levis dry dock is not large enough to accommodate vessels of such size, a fact which has been adversely commented on by St. Lawrence ship owners. It is possible that the Empress may be patched up sufficiently at Quebec to cross the Atlantic for permanent repairs; but if this is done she will carry no passengers. It is not known yet whether the Empress struck a sunken derelict or whether she ran in too close to shore and grazed the ledge, but this will be brought out in the investigation.

sign gold requirements and the gradual hardening of private discount rates, had the anticipated rate, which was put up to four per cent. this morning. The amount of reserve is nearly \$5,000,000 below last week, and the demands for the metal in Argentina, show no signs of abatement. A large amount of American finance paper already has been placed here and it is anticipated that the United States will shortly be in the position to withdraw gold to the further disturbance of the London money market.

In Germany speculation made men-ty openly light and an expansion of German demands for gold is looked for. In some quarters there is doubt if the four per cent rate will attract sufficient gold to build up the reserve as well as meet current demands from Europe and America, so they would not be surprised if a higher rate is imposed.

Today's advance was so confidently anticipated that it had little effect on the Stock Exchange, where the feeling was one of relief. When the sur-prise was over operators marked up consols.

EVERY AUSTRALIAN TO BE A SOLDIER

MELBOURNE, Oct. 16.—Australia is going to show the Old Country the way in the matter of compulsory service. The Government of the Commonwealth is about to bring in a bill in the Federal Parliament which will place its defence forces on the sound basis of "every man a soldier." There will, under the bill, be a compulsory cadet system, combined with the reconstruction of the militia on lines similar to those governing the British territorial force. A more or less motley arrangement will be replaced by a complete divisional organization. At present the Australian army is deficient in the administrative service and has not enough warlike stores

and equipments. Guns of more modern pattern, various technical stores which are now absolutely necessary must be provided, and these matters will be placed before the Australian Parliament.

TEACHING TO BE POLITE

NEW YORK, October 16.—"What a poor, of a man!" The speaker, shrugged her pretty shoulders in disgust. The division of the players' money on the 60 and 40 per cent basis will give 940,154.94 to the winners and \$26,769.96 to the losers.

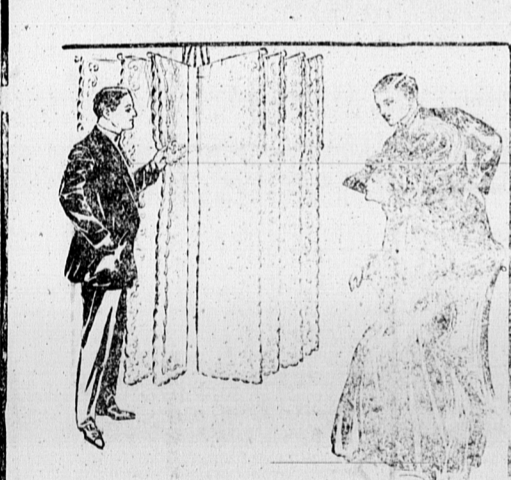
