Great Racing Expected Here Wednesday, Thur.

With fine weather probable and the largest entry list in Maritime annals for a two-day meeting, race fans here are assured that the Goodwill Horse Races Wednesday and Thursday afternoons will be something to remember.

From all over the Maritimes the best in the speedline have either arrived at the track or will arrive this evening.

The two-year-old futurity stakes will have seven starters and there are some slightly good colts among them. There are at least three that can beat 2:30 and this race is bound to attract a lot of attention.

Owing to the large number of entries it will be necessary to race five classes each day.

Subject to change the program for Wednesday afternoon is: Two-Year-Old Futurity, 2:14-2:16 Trot and Pace, Classified, Trot, Free-For-All Trot and Pace, first Division 2:25 Trot and Pace.

For Thursday afternoon, also subject to change, the program includes 2:16-2:18 Trot and Pace, Free-For-All Trot, Junior Free-For-All Trot and Pace, 2:19-2:22 Pace, second division and 2:25 Trot and Pace.

To enable the five classes to be raced off the start-up time has been advanced to 1:30 p.m. and

the horses will be called at 1:15 p.m. W. H. Beaton, the assistant clerk of the course, has been instructed to have all his arrangements made so there will be no holdups and they will be on their way for the first heat of the futurity stakes at 1:30 p.m.

Today the track is having its regular tune-up and caretaker William McAusland said he hoped to have either a trotter or a pacer smash the existing marks which are pacing, 2:05 1-2, made by Bud Wenger, 2:05 1-4, trotting, 2:07 3-4, by Alonway, 2:04 3-4.

The trotting mark had a rather close call during Old Home Week when Watchin' equalled it.

Among the horses that are attracting a lot of attention is the Widows' Pride, 2:06, owned by C. E. Wry, St. Stephen, N. B. This was an outstanding pacer in his two year old form, winning some great races on the grand circuit. He was injured as a three year old and was sold by Sullivan and Mawhinney to the present owner, Sound and apparently faster than ever he has won three free for alls in a row at Saint John Labor Day he paced in 2:10 1-4 to set up new track record, Saint John track is considered at least four seconds slow so The Widows' Pride is expected to furnish lively competition in the fastest class at the meet.

The 25 trot and pace has an entry list of 32 but it is expected that quite a few will cancel out and that it will go down to more reasonable proportions. It will be raced in two divisions and may be considered among one of the great uncensored races in that there are many potential winners.

Yesterday there were a large number of visitors at the track to greet horsemen friends and look over their charges and from all signs it looks as though Wednesday's and Thursday's races will see great gatherings at the Charlottetown track.

Both bride and bridegroom were members of the ship's original company. Staff Sgt. McCune has been on the Lady Nelson ever since she was converted into a hospital ship, and the bride served on her from April, 1943, until January, 1944.

This was the first wedding on the hospital ship, which, before the war, was the flagship of the Canadian National West Indies fleet.

The officiating clergyman was the ship's padre, Capt. E. Wightson, Toronto. The bride was given in marriage by Lt.-Col. A. L. Cornish, of Prince Rupert, B.C., Officer Commanding Lieut. Report Allies Have New Armored Car

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17—(AP)—The British supply council announced Saturday that a new weapon, the staghound 1 armored car, produced only in the United States, now is in use in various war theatres. Capable of a speed of 30 miles an hour, despite its heavy armor, the new vehicle is used for armed reconnaissance. It has a crew of five men. Its equipment includes a machine gun, telescopic sights, a 37-MM anti-tank gun, two machine-guns and an anti-aircraft machine-gun.

New British Record For 1 1/2 Miles

LONDON, Sept. 17—(CP-Reuters)—A 42-year-old British record for the 1 1/2 mile was topped by Douglas Wilson of the Polytechnic Harriers Club when he covered the distance in six minutes, 46 1/2 seconds at Fording Track Saturday. His time was one second better than the record established by Alfred Shrubbs at Stamford Bridge in 1902.
