SUCCESSFUL RIFLE SHOOT SATURDAY

Eric Coles, Milton Wins City Championship.

The cold, high northwest wind could not dampen the enthusiasm of the riflemen of Charlottetown and vicinity who gathered to the number of 22 to settle the City Championship and have a real good shoot.

The City Championship, which carried with it the City Trophy, was inaugurated about 1910 and many great shooting battles took place over this beautiful piece of silverware.

Formerly the ranges were 200, 500, 600, 800 and 900 yards, but this year the revival shoot was held over 200, 900 and 500 yard ranges. As mentioned before the afternoon was cold and windy, but notwithstanding some remarkably good scores were made. Eric Coles of Milton, who because an out-of-town rifleman, was ineligible for the cup, was the highest scorer of the day with 101 points out of 105. Lt. J. S. Moore, of Charlottetown, captured the coveted trophy with a clever 89, and will have its keeping for one year or until the next contest.

As will be noticed by the prize list E. G. Love, who has seen over eighty winters and whose eye is still undimmed, made a wonderful shoot, 93 points. The old veteran, Joe Berrigan, who has not missed a shoot for over fifty years, was present and was presented with a spoon as a remembrance of his attendance.

At the conclusion of the shoot each rifleman received a cash prize and a prize in kind. These prizes were made possible by the generous contributions of the following parties. Votes of thanks were tendered the committee for soliciting the prizes.

fined \$15 or 20 days. For a similar offence another party was fined \$10 or 20 days.

A Summerside man, who had been fined \$100 and costs, under the customs act, last week for having a hot water bottle half filled with rum, which had been found by excise officer Platts suspended by a string concealed in a partition wall on his premises, for the same offence was charged under the Prohibition Act with having this same liquor illegally in his possession. Chief Inspector Haywood gave evidence that he and other Prohibition Officers were present when the hot water bottle was found. The accused was convicted and it being proved that this was his third offence he was sentenced to eleven months in jail without the option of a fine.

A party from Miscouche was charged with having liquor in his possession. Prohibition Officer Brooks gave evidence that he went to the defendant's house to serve a summons on him for being drunk.

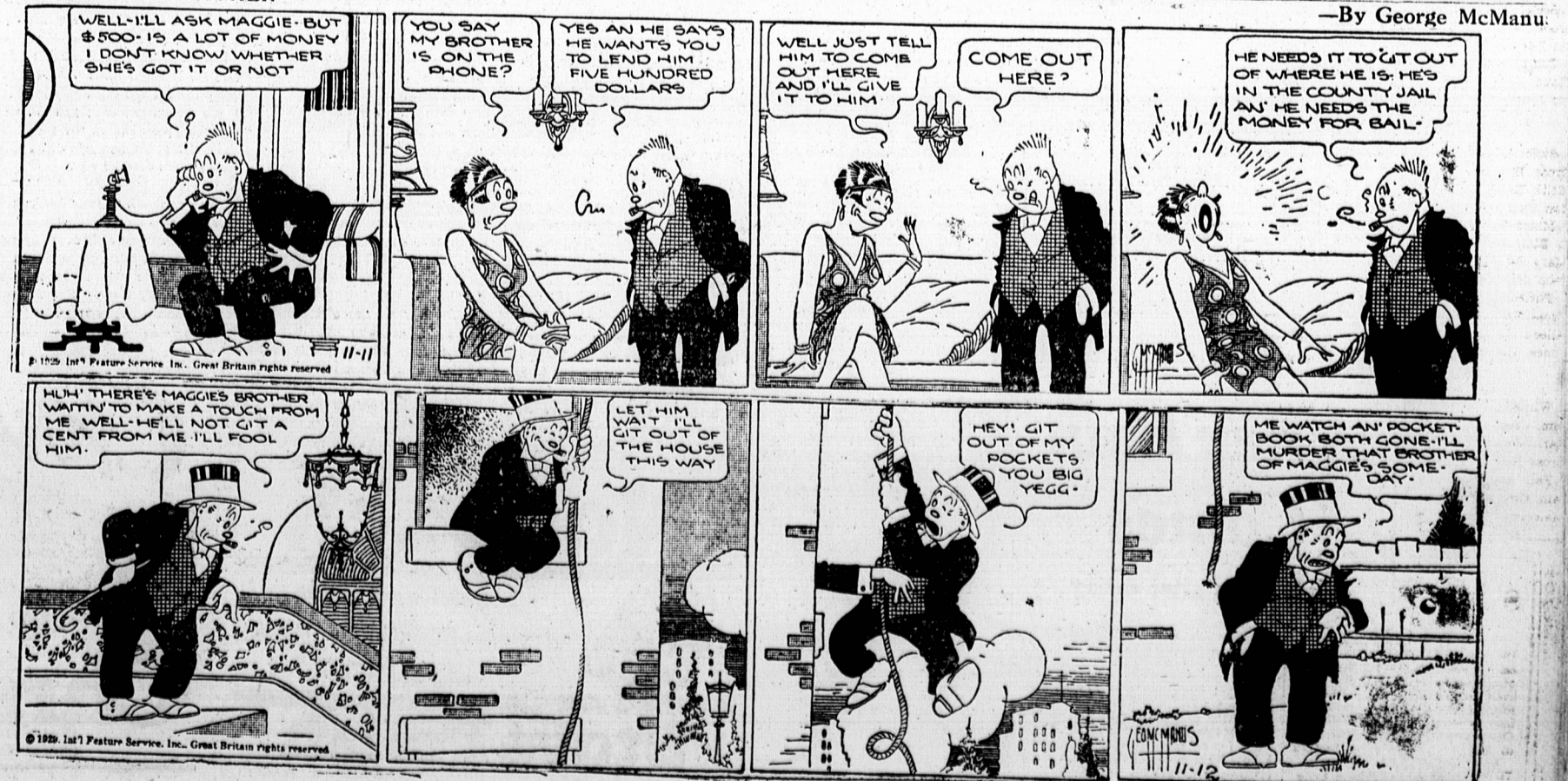
PROVIDENCE, R. I., Nov. 10.—Canadians of the National Hockey League nosed out the Rhode Island Reds of the Canadian-American League, 7 to 6 in an exhibition game here Saturday night. By virtue of the new rules it was a wide open contest and a new record was established for the number of goals scored in a single game on the local rink.

Liquor was found in an old car on St. Stephen Street, Summerside, at the rear of an old garage, in which Prosecutors Brooks and Dystant stated that they found thirteen tiddies of rum. The car had been there all the summer and the Prosecutors saw defendant going towards the car but did not see defendant with any liquor. The magistrate held that the evidence was insufficient and dismissed the case. Mr. Heath Strong, K. C., was counsel for the defence.

A case against a well known Summerside man was not proceeded with because of the fact that there was some defect in the service of the summons and Mr. Thane Campbell, on behalf of the prosecution, asked for a new summons to be issued, which was granted. All the cases were conducted by Chief Inspector Haywood. The Attorney General was not present at the proceedings. Mr. J. J. Johnson, K. C., of Charlottetown, was in the Court room during part of the proceedings. The lawyers conducting the cases were Messrs. E. H. Strong, K. C., C. D. MacCallum, and G. L. Compton, S.

Seven touch-downs, two in the first half and five in the final stanza with two converts added, tells the story of the line crossing in which every try was made standing up and under wraps.

The team of "Kelly" arrived in the city with many glowing reports as to its prowess preceding it. These reports were lived its prowess. These reports were up to the very first letter of their name. From the opening whistle till the curtain call the visiting wearers of the red and blue showed class personified, especially the half line, which at times seemed to have full control of every situation that cropped up during the sixty minutes of play. After the first try, made in less than three minutes from the kick-off, it did not take the casual observer long to realize as to just what the outcome would be—an easy Acadia win over an inexperienced and very much lighter foe, that did exceptionally well to keep the score down to even twenty-five.

The visiting collegians were well within themselves at all times, and every Saint Dunstan threat to score was met with ease by a stellar defence and a great kicking full back and half line, not to mention the quarters. Acadia forwards, however, seemed mediocre compared with the back lines, which shouldered the bulk of the work throughout the tussle.

Saint Dunstan's appeared stage-struck at the opening whistle, and not until two tries were scored against them, did they get back to earth; and even at that they showed more off color than in any previous game this season. Had the Saints been playing up to form, the invaders' score would undoubtedly have been cut in half, and perhaps better than that.

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of their fathers to the men who made the supreme sacrifice of this generation. In the act of unveiling this tablet so kindly placed here by the Girls' Club of this Church, we feel as though we were treading on holy ground and we would not wish to bring back to our recollection all the associations of that conflict, for we remember how beautifully the mothers and fathers of those boys bore the strain and stress of those days without a murmur; still this act is a labor of love born of a long-lingering desire to further honor the memory of those departed heroes and it is performed as a living act to their reverend memory. Efforts have been made in every way possible to honor the memory of these men and to impress upon the nation the magnitude of their supreme sacrifice. In the tower of victory in the Parliament Buildings at Ottawa and in the memorial chambers in keeping with the commemorative character of the tower, a space was set apart and an altar erected. On that altar has been placed the book of remembrance, and within its covers constituting a roll of honor is inscribed on illumined parchment sixty thousand names of those who in the hour of the world's greatest need made the supreme sacrifice on behalf of their country and the land they loved. Beside this book on the altar is a large and beautiful copy of the Holy Bible placed there as a gift and in loving remembrance by His Royal Highness, the Prince of Wales on the occasion of the dedication of the Chamber by him. Although these acts of remembrance are all we can do to honor the memory of those who gave their lives in the cause of freedom, we can all say in the words of the poet:

"On valiant hearts, who to your glory came, through dust of conflict and through battle flame. Tranquil you lie, your knightly virtue proved, your memory hallowed in the land you loved." Rev. Mr. Jeans then dedicated the tablet, and with very appropriate quotations from the scriptures, closed a very impressive and beautiful service at which the front pews of the Church were occupied by the relatives and comrades of the honored dead.
