THREE CHINAMEN SHOT;
TWO FATALLY INJURED.

NEW YORK, June 27.—The furtive Tong war that sleeps but never dies, despite threats, promises and solemn treaties, broke out again Sunday afternoon, within the little triangle of narrow streets just off the lower Bowery known as Chinatown. In ninety seconds, three Chinamen

were shot, two of them fatally, a third was painfully wounded and more than 40 shots from heavy caliber revolvers shattered against bricks or stained the pavement. In three minutes seven Chinamen were arrested. It was all over nearly as quickly as it had begun, and the remainder of the afternoon, the streets were as quiet as they had been an instant before and the murder broke the stillness.

It happened that the 2,000th anniversary of the founding of the Society of the Four Brothers fell on the day of rest, and in its honor the members were to give a banquet in Pell Street at 5 o'clock. A monster scarlet flag, scalloped in green, floated from the banquet hall, and guests began to arrive early. On Sundays the streets are thickest with sight-seers.

It was in the midst of this restless shuffling throng, soon thick with policemen, that the shooting began at just four o'clock. There is no certainty of the precise provocation, but it is generally understood in Chinatown that the Ong Leong Tong did not relish the fact that Chu Hen, recently acquitted of the murder of an Ong Leong Tong man, was to be the guest of honor.

The Hip Sing Tong, the Ong Leong Tong and the Four Brothers occupy each their own street, and no prudent

member of one society trespasses on a territory of another. Pickets had been posted today at the ends of Pell Street, by the Four Brothers, and scouts of the Ong Leong Tong patrolled the adjacent boundary of Mott Street. There were more policemen on the beat than usual, both because this was Sunday and because of the banquet. Somebody stepped over the line.

Somebody began to shoot. It is doubtful if any white man will ever know who trespassed and who punned too fast from too many directions at once for the eye to catch the first flash. MACKEREL SEASON CALLED FAILURE

BOSTON, June 27.—There have been further arrivals of mackerel vessels from the Cape Shore, but they have brought comparatively few fish, and

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the trade is calling the season a practical failure. The salt mackerel caught on the Cape Shore and landed to date have made up the smallest total for years and there is only about ten more vessels still out, the probabilities do not favor a material increase in the catch.

Thirty-nine vessels have now arrived home from the cape shore, bringing 2,416 bbls. salt mackerel and 442 bbls. fresh. Of these, 790 bbls. salt mackerel have been landed since the schooner Aloha, 190 bbls. salt mackerel; Pontiac, 52 bbls. salt; Judique, 85 bbls. salt; Arcadia, 50 bbls. salt; Slade Gorton, 5 bbls. salt; Massachusetts, 102 bbls. salt; Rhodora, 75 bbls. salt; Diana, 85 bbls. salt. Four vessels came in without any fish. The Pontiac came in at Boston, the others at Gloucester. All the fish sold at 315.50 bbl, fisherman's pack.

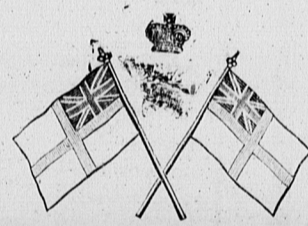
