ATTITUDE OF GOV'T

In The Enforcing of A Commercial Traveller's Experience

HON. D. FARQUHARSON

Says That The Law Will Be Rigidly Enforced By Machinery of State.

This morning the Prohibition Act of 1900 is in full force and effect, and no person shall by himself, his clerk, servant or agent, directly or indirectly on any pretense or upon any device, sell or barter or in consideration of the purchase of any property give to any other person any intoxicating liquor.

The Lieut. Governor in Council has appointed two vendors viz: Byrne Bros. and Geo. McDonald. He has also appointed Norman Campbell as prosecutor.

Yesterday afternoon a GUARDIAN representative waited upon the Premier and ascertained the Government's intention in regard to the enforcement.

Mr. Farquharson said there was very little to be said in the matter. There is this however to be said:

"The Government is going to enforce the law and we have the machinery for the purpose and ready for the work. It would only be childish if we would pass a law and make no effort to enforce it. At all hazards the law will be enforced. It may take a good deal of money before we are through but if we can prove—and we think we can, in time—that our law is a good one, the money will be well spent."

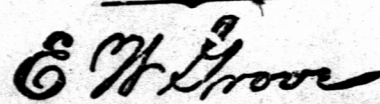
In the course of the conversation the Premier said he had an interview with the city authorities in connection with their duty in the matter. Mr. Farquharson then went on to say that as the city under the act is to get a third of the fines we expect the sympathy and support of the corporation on the enforcement of the law as they do in all other laws. The police and officers of the Stipendiary court where the cases are tried must certainly act as constables and peace officers and if there is any refusal on the part of any of the city authorities or the police it will be all the worse for the city.

HE WAS ARRESTED

He Had a License But the Inspector Said It Was no Good.

HERE IN CHARLTOWN

Inspector Said It Was no Good.

Mr. George Hastings Palmer, representative of W. H. Scovil & Co. of St. John N. B. manufacturers' agent landed in Summerside on 21st May, and duly presented himself there to the officer appointed by the Government for collecting the commercial travellers tax—Mr. James C. Wright—presenting Mr. Scovil's certificate to do business on the Island. This certificate bears date October 9th, 1900 and is good for one year. Mr. Wright at once endorsed the certificate as entitling Mr. Palmer to do so on with his work.

Thus armed with authority, Mr. Palmer proceeded to transact business in Summerside, Alberton, Tignish and other places and on Thursday night, 30th May, came to Charlottetown and registered at the Hotel Davies. On Saturday morning June 1st Inspector Campbell came into the sample room where Mr. Palmer was at work and demanded to see his license. The document was at once produced. Mr. Campbell said the license was no good and Mr. Palmer must pay \$20 and take out another, or be liable to a fine of \$200. This Mr. Palmer refused to do as he had a license already. Mr. Campbell said he would make him pay, and went out.

Half an hour afterwards while on Great George Street, in front of the Cathedral, Mr. Palmer was arrested by the Sheriff of Queen's County and taken to the Provincial Building. The Premier being absent Mr. Palmer was given the alternative of going to jail or furnishing bonds for \$40, being the amount of license fee and \$20 for costs. The necessary sureties were found and in this way Mr. Palmer escaped being locked up.

Mr. Palmer was formerly well-known on the Island, having been on the road for a long time. So long ago as 1873 and down to 1882 he travelled the Island regularly every six months. He then went on the Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Newfoundland route and has been continually travelling. This eventful trip was his first return to the Island, and he is naturally indignant over the manner in which he has been treated. He has placed the matter in the hands of Mr. W. S. Stewart, K. C., in order to obtain such redress as may be obtainable.

The news of Mr. Palmer's arrest was sent broad cast all over the country and quite a sheaf of telegrams came pouring in to learn the reason. From the house which he represents, from friends and from other travellers came inquiries to know what it all meant. This is what Mr. Palmer will now endeavor to find out. Just why a certificate should be good enough to be endorsed by the Government office at Summerside and at the same time bad as to cause his arrest in Charlottetown is one of those things that no fellow can understand.

BRITISH PEOPLE

Identified With Lost Tribes of Israel

ANGLO-ISRAEL ANTHEM

By Rev. J. Idrisyn Jones—He Lectures To-Night in Brick Church.

AIR—Men of Harlech

"Hear, O Israel; Heaven is calling, Time for action now is dawning, Spread thy story so enthraling, Over all the earth.

Those that hate thee still are dreaming, Since like them, from Japheth streaming, False the hopes on which thou'rt leaning,

For thy doom is nigh, Now with hearts exulting, All thy ranks uniting, Dare to plead—thou'rt Abram's seed,

And not of Gentile breeding, And of joyful as descendants, Of those patriarchal remnants, Fleeing from the grasp of tyrants,

To the British Isles, Round the world thy daughter nations, Linked in covenant relations, Soon shall throng their habitations,

Countless as the stars, For the promise has been spoken, And the Scriptures are not broken, And those crowds shall be the token,

Jacob spake of them, So with voices ringing, Let our tribes be singing, Ephraim and Manasse join,

To make the music thrilling, For, God's faithfulness beholding, As the ages are unfolding, We are guilty, if withholding

Praise from Israel's King."

A very interesting personality is Rev. J. Idrisyn Jones who is to-night to lecture in the First Methodist Church on what may be called Anglo-Israelism. A writer in the Anglo-Israel Almanac furnishes the following particulars about him.

He was for many years one of the most conspicuous leaders and active workers in the religious and philanthropic life of Liverpool, where he is still held in well-merited esteem. His startling letters and pamphlets on "The Slain by Drink in Liverpool" commanded widespread interest and identified him as an authority on the subject of temperance. His literary contributions and public lectures have more recently marked him as one of the ablest exponents of the testimony of Scripture in favor of theory of Anglo-Israelism.

He is a son of the Manse, or rather of the Vicarage, for his father was a vicar of a Welsh parish, who gained the bardic title of "Idrisyn," which is inherited by the oldest son. It was no small heritage to be the son of the author of many valuable works, including a popular commentary in the Welsh language and the translation of Her Majesty's Journal. In recognition of his services to Welsh literature a pension was given him by the Queen from the Royal Literary Fund. Three sons became ministers of the Established Church. Idrisyn Jones cast his lot with the Congregational Free Church.

During his 13 years in Liverpool he not only built a new sanctuary but afterwards enlarged it and subsequently removed to a London pastorate. England has been invaded by a race of Welsh preachers whose power, poetic fervor, wealth of illustration and pathetic eloquence have gained for them some of the foremost pulpits and most influential congregations."

So far the Anglo-Israel Almanac. Yesterday afternoon THE GUARDIAN enjoyed a talk with Mr. Jones on Anglo-Israelism, its origin, the progress of the movement and his present mission. It appears that the movement started about sixty years ago, when attention was directed to the subject by John Wilson an Englishman who propounded the theory that the English belonged to the Lost Tribes of Israel. The movement once begun has gone on. Bishop Titcomb of Bangor took it up and wrote several books on the subject. Rev. Mr. Glover of Norwich, England followed with a book. Some 15 years ago an Anglo-Israel Association of those who had become convinced of the theory was formed in London. Later another Association was formed in Glasgow for Scotland, one in Dublin for Ireland and later a second Association at Belfast and still another at Newcastle-on-Tyne for the North of England. Some seven or eight contributors were found who volunteered to bear the cost of extending the movement to the Colonies. Colonel Senior, a retired army officer, was selected for the work and undertook a three or four years tour about the world,

BOSTON TO HAVE A CUP RACE.

BOSTON, June 4.—(Special.)—The two cupdefenders, Constitution and Columbia will sail under the management of the Larchmont Yacht Club June 22 for a \$500 cup.

He went to South Africa, sickened and died and was buried at Durban. So the mission terminated for the time.

Appeal was then made to Rev. Mr. Jones, but he at first declined the task. All the Anglo-Israel Associations then set apart two successive Sundays for prayer that a missionary might be found. It seemed without avail and increased pressure was brought upon Mr. Jones to accept. He at length did so for six months and was sent to Australia in March 1898. He visited all the seven Australian Colonies and was received with enthusiastic interest. Hundreds thronged to hear him and at a meeting in New Zealand and hundreds were turned away, unable to obtain admittance.

After 15 months at home at home Mr. Jones was again induced by the united Associations to, set out, this time to make the tour of the West Indies and Canada. He set out in January last for six months trip. His meetings in Barbadoes and Jamaica were most successful. In Kingston, Jamaica, with Archdeacon Downer in the chair there were 800 present. Another large meeting was held in the Scotch Church at Kingston, and another at Port Antonio, Jamaica, at which 500 attended.

Rev. Mr. Jones then crossed the Gulf to New Orleans, thence proceeded to California and up the coast to Seattle and Victoria. There he found Sir Henri Joll deeply interested in Anglo-Israelism. He had good meetings in Victoria, Vancouver Calgary and at Winnipeg, where Hon. Hugh John McDonald presided. Coming eastward he held meetings at Ottawa and Montreal, at the latter of which Archbishop Bond occupied the chair. In St. John two meetings were held respectively in the St. John and St. George Episcopal churches. In Halifax a large meeting was held in Argyle Hall, followed by a parlor meeting, and a Bible reading on Sunday. Rev. Mr. Jones preached on Sunday evening for Rev. Dr. Heartz in the Brunswick Street Methodist Church.

With his visit to Prince Edward Island Rev. Mr. Jones nearly concludes his tour. He leaves for Yarmouth, N. S. tomorrow morning and proceeds thence to Boston where about the end of June he will take ship to England. Mr. Jones expresses himself as delighted with Canada. He has found the people quite as imperialistic as in any other part of the Empire; but rather less enthusiastic over the Anglo-Israel idea. None the less he counts confidently on its rapid spread and final acceptance generally. The meeting tonight will be at 8.30 o'clock and all are invited.
