ected very recently and they asked for this bill. It was mainly the old Council re-elected. The powers in this bill were not new and it was evident the citizens were pretty well satisfied with the law in regard to permanent improvements.

EVENING SESSION.

At 8:20 the House resumed its sitting in committee of the whole on the bill to amend the Charlottetown Incorporation Act, Mr. McWilliams in the chair.

MR. ARSENAULT moved an amendment to the previous amendments giving property owners a right of appeal in certain cases. Further discussion was made by Mr. Mathieson and the Premier, the latter pointing out that to pass the amendment would be a reversal of the vote already taken.

MR. MCKINNON had learned that four cases had come into court, on the city suing for the amount assessed for sidewalks. The defendants in these cases proved that they had real grievances which had been met in part. In one or more cases it was proved that the measurement had been wrong.

MR. ARSENAULT said the last speaker was wrong in part. There are no cases pending. The cases that were before the court in which technical objection had been made had been withdrawn.

MR. ARSENAULT said he had met a number of complainants of injustice in this matter. The amendment to the amendment was then rejected 12 to 11. The previous amendment changing the phraseology of the bill was adopted on the same division reversed.

On section 7 increasing the tax on banks to 250. Hon. Mr. Cummins pointed out that this was a matter which affected both city and country. He moved to strike out the clause as he thought the banks were sufficiently taxed. They paid a large tax on their property besides this special tax.

MR. WARBURTON read a memorandum from the City Council asking power to limit to \$20,000 the amount of assessment on the Cold Storage Company's property.

MR. MATHIESON asked that the clause stand over. If power to exempt from taxation were to be given of this sort the provision should be general. He went on to point out that the bill was incomplete without a provision for ballot voting as set forth in the cards of the Mayorality candidates.

MR. MATHIESON moved the bill to consolidate and amend the Act relating to Trustees, Mr. Cox in the chair. The committee sat till 10 o'clock when progress was reported.

DR. WARBURTON moved the third reading of the bill to incorporate the Island Cold Storage Company. The Bill was passed and the House adjourned till tomorrow afternoon at 8 o'clock.
