## A GIRL BABY FOUND IN LOT

Month Old infant, Warmly Wrapped, Left in a Lot at Maspeth.

NEW YORK, Nov. 22.—While out with his dog recently John Schneider of 15 Malcolm place, Maspeth, found in a hollow in a vacant lot at old Flushing road and Broad street a girl baby about a month old. The infant was warmly and neatly dressed and was carefully wrapped in a faded blue shawl. Mr. Schneider's attention was attracted to the bundle by the dog, which ran about it, barking furiously. Schneider went to investigate and found the child. He picked her up and went in search of a policeman. Finding Patrolman Whitehead of the Glendale precinct, he accompanied him to the station house. There was nothing on the baby by which she could be identified and the tiny girl was sent down to 110 Ashland place, Brooklyn, to be cared for by the city nurse. Meanwhile the police are endeavoring to locate the person who left the baby where she was found.

## SCHOONER HAD HUGH STONES

NEW YORK, Nov. 22.—Seven weeks were required by the schooner Meibese, which arrived here recently to travel from Vinal Haven, Maine to this port, a journey usually made in seven days. The delay was caused by the shifting of a huge granite monolith, weighing 42 tons, two of which made up the entire cargo. The monoliths were too large to be put into the schooner's hold, so they were loaded on the deck and lashed into place. Heavy weather was encountered off Point Judith, R. I., and one of the big blocks of stone broke from its fastenings, nearly causing the schooner to capsze. By the united efforts of the crew, the monolith was again fastened in position and the trip resumed. One sailor had a leg broken during the struggle to replace the stone and was taken ashore at Point Judith. The two monoliths are the second largest ever quarried and will be used in the office building being erected on the site of the old Fifth Avenue Hotel here. The columns measure 30 feet in length and are about six feet square.

## WAS 'PRISONED BANKER POISONED?

NEW YORK, Nov. 22.—To determine whether or not David Rothschild (once a New York banker) was the victim of poison will be the purpose of an inquest by Dr. A. O. Squire, coroner of Ossining, N. Y. Rothschild died suddenly in Sing Sing prison. Last week Rothschild received a box of food from relatives and ate heartily of it before he went to bed. He called a keeper to his cell door at nine thirty and complained of excruciating pain in his stomach. Soon he went into collapse and was taken to the prison hospital. There he died fifteen minutes after he was taken ill. Coroner Squire ordered a post-mortem examination. After making the autopsy, Dr. Irving reported to Coroner Squire that Rothschild's brain and the lining membrane of his stomach were congested, post-mortem symptoms which may have been caused by acute indigestion. But they might be caused by certain poisons too.

## NAVIGATION ON THE RIVER WILL BE OVER TODAY

ST. JOHN, Nov. 22.—Navigation on the St. John river practically closed yesterday for the season. The cold weather of the past few days has caused ice to form at different points along the river, making it unsafe for boats to venture.

Both the Fredericton boats, the Victoria and Elaine, have been laid up for the winter. The steamer Scinemas will make her last trip, of the season today, going as far as the Narrows. The Champlain will also make a trip today, going as far as the ice will permit. The Majestic will probably be the last boat to go into winter quarters, as it is the intention of her owners to keep her on the route as long as possible. The fact of her having a steel hull will enable her to continue on the route until stopped by heavy ice. Last year navigation remained open until Nov. 26th, the Sincennes being the last boat to lay up.

## NOT NEGOTIATING FOR A GOVERNMENT OWNED CABLE.

LONDON, Nov. 22.—The statement cabled from London to Canada and repeated back to London is a special cable from Ottawa to the Times to the effect that the Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux has been authorized by his Government to pledge Canadian financial support to the laying of a Government cable between London and Great Britain and Canada, was shown to Mr. Lemieux, who made this reply: "I have had interviews with the Premier, the Chancellor of the Exchequer and other high officials of the Government, but no subject of state-owned cables has not yet been discussed. Mr. Lemieux added that he is here in a semi-official capacity only.

## FISH TRUST FAILURE MAY BE INVESTIGATED.

CHICAGO, Ill., Nov. 21.—At a meeting of the creditors committee of Bankers' Trust closed doors in the Corn Exchange Bank, of Chicago recently the question was seriously discussed, it is said, of asking the State Attorney to use his judgment of laying the failure of A. Booth & Company, known as the "Fish Trust" before the Cook County Grand Jury.

## STIFF SENTENCE FOR LIQUOR VIOLATOR.

PERTH Jct., Nov. 21.—Before Commissioner Farris, Fred L. Greer, of St. Leonard's, recently received a heavy sentence, when he was fined three hundred dollars and costs and one year and a half in jail for three intoxicating liquor. Greer's wife was also fined fifty dollars for one first offence. It is understood that both Greer and his wife have made their escape across the boundary line into America territory. Warrants have been issued for their arrest.

## FORMER TAMMANY LEADER ON VISIT.

NEW YORK, Nov. 21.—Richard Croker, who for years directed the destinies of Tammany Hall, before he retired to lead the life of a country gentleman in Ireland, returned to New York yesterday on the steamer Lusitania. He comes back to New York merely as a visitor, he has said, to see his old friends and renew old acquaintances. That his contemplations again entering the field of politics in New York city where he so long held sway, he positively denied. It is expected that Mr. Croker will remain in the United States about six months.

## AMERICAN PRISON ASSOCIATION.

TORONTO, November 21.—A de-patch from Richmond, Va., announces that Dr. J. J. Gill Moore, the warden of the Central Prison, Toronto, has been elected president of the American Prison Association at Richmond, Va.
