The Rev. gentlemen in preface his lecture humorously remarked that he never was in doubt as to the wisdom of his call to the ministry but was sure that his hearers would perceive ere the close that he was not intended for a lecturer. The close and enthusiastic hearing given him for one and a half hours most thoroughly disproved such a thought. The speaker referred to the characteristics of a man which distinguished him from all others of his race and showed that such distinction existed in regard to matters, family, civic and national. He further stated that such traits conditioned life and were incorporated in all the works of men or nations. England was the incarnation of English genius, which was decidedly localized. He asserted that Englishmen could not be raised this side the ocean. An Englishman is a peculiar product. His striking traits, the imperial spirit, solidity of character, patience of endurance in every sphere of activity, abhorrence of change, unselfishness, were adverted to and impressed with a story. London was briefly touched in regard to its greatness in wealth, goodness, philanthropy, and wickedness. English perseverance was forcing its way to the foundation of an Empire, and the progress of civilization. A most hearty vote of thanks moved by Col. Moore, seconded by J. T. Mellish Esq was unanimously tendered the lecturer to which he fittingly responded.

MR. E. D. STERNS was busily engaged yesterday in installing some new machinery which he has recently imported from the Crawford Laundry Machine Company, Boston, Mass. The washer on the first floor, formerly in use, has been replaced by an improved oscillating one with a capacity of one hundred shirts at one wash. On the second floor a Saaw shaper has been placed for the purpose of turning down and finishing collars. This machine has a speed of from 4 to 5 hundred pieces an hour and has other attachments to be used in the perfecting of the work. The atmospheric burners for heating irons have been adopted by Mr. Sterns throughout the laundry thus avoiding the unnecessary heat caused by using stoves. While in Boston Mr. Sterns visited a number of the leading laundries there and has returned in a better position than ever to please his many patrons.
