At 9.20 yesterday evening an alarm for fire in a building in the rear of the block occupied by Messrs. A. W. Reddin and G. H. Taylor, was rung in. The large number in attendance at the band concert rushed to the scene and it was with difficulty that the different sections of the fire department could get to the scene. The structure was torn down before the fire could be extinguished. Chief Heilmann went through Mr. Reddin's drug store and after he arrived in the yard he met a boy who told him he had seen two other boys pouring oil on the blaze.

At an early hour yesterday morning the steamer Jacques Cartier left the Steam Navigation Co's Wharf for Pugwash to bring an excursion party to the City. The Captain states that the usual lights were in position and everything was working all right. When between the Block House and the black buoy a schooner named the Abraham Lincoln was approaching and nothing unusual would have occurred had not the vessel hauled to windward. Only a moment or two elapsed and her bow struck the steamer on the port side plunging through the lower deck which projected through the lower deck which projected and starting two planks. The schooner was coal laden. Captain Inman after assuring Captain McLean that he was all right he bashed his schooner. The Cartier then altered her course and returned to her berth. Repairs are being made to the Cartier and it is expected that the mishap will not cause much delay. The amount of debris indicates that the schooner and steamer struck each other with terrific force as the timber broken was quite strong.
