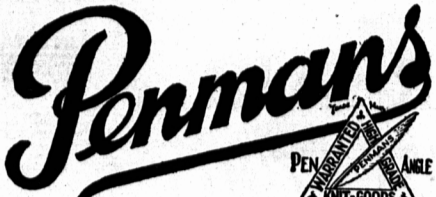

Rev. Alex. Craise Elected Moderator

A call for delegates to re-consecrate themselves to God for the service of their fellowmen, was the urgent message of retiring Moderator Rev. J. W. Britton, at the annual meeting of the Maritime Synod of the Presbyterian church in Canada, swung into action at St. David's Presbyterian church, Grafton street, Halifax, Tuesday evening.

This was the part the Presbyterian church could play in the present-day social problems, declared the Pictou county clergyman in his retiring sermon. His sermon rang with optimism over the interest which, he said, was being manifested throughout Canada in the membership rolls of the church. Concluding his sermon, he constituted the Synod and called for nominations for the Moderatorship. Dr. W. M. Townsend, Fairville, N. B. and Rev. D. L. Griffiths of Belfast, P. E. I. moved and seconded, respectively, Rev. Alexander Craise of Sackville, N. B. for the office and Mr. Craise was elected by unanimous accord of the Synod. In a few brief remarks, the new Moderator thanked the Synod for the honor.

From 19 ministers to 86 in the last 10 years, was a great achievement, was the congratulatory view of Rev. Dr. D. T. L. MacLean of Toronto, Moderator of the whole church, in commenting on the growth of the Maritime Synod. Arriving in Halifax to attend the Synod sessions following a general tour of points in the Maritimes, the Moderator expressed appreciation of the beauty of the Maritime provinces. "Good, hopeful and inspiring," was how he termed his reaction of conditions in the Maritime provinces, when questioned by a Chronicle reporter. It was his first visit to Halifax for 15 years, he said. St. David's church was filled to capacity as the Synod held its opening session last night. During the day one committee, that of bills and overtures, headed by Dr. Frank Baird, Pictou, clerk of the Synod, met and decided on the course of the business to appear before the 3-day sessions. At the devotional service last evening, the retiring Moderator, assisted by Rev. Dr. Kerr, pastor of St. David's, had charge. St. David's choir was in attendance.

Several reports, including that of stocks and bonds, Newcasle fund and Dr. Scott's Legacy were tabled by Clerk Dr. Baird. The Synod clerk also presented the section of his report dealing with the personnel and membership of the Synod, which showed a gratifying increase.

The rest of his report which will be presented before another session at Newcasle, included the fund stocks and bonds, Newcasle fund and Dr. Scott's Legacy were tabled by Clerk Dr. Baird. Stating this was the Jubilee anniversary of the church he reviewed several of the sermons that have been delivered in churches throughout Canada in this connection, commending that of Rev. Dr. Kerr Fraser dealing with the history of the church in modern times, given before the general church assembly. He also referred in praising terms to that of Rev. Dr. Kerr, pastor of St. David's, given on June 8, dealing with the whole church, and that of Mrs. Murry of Halifax, a woman who, he said, had her finger on the pulse of the church as regards the woman's part in church affairs.

Nothing had made him feel so good, he said, as his prediction that "a greater and grander Presbyterian church will be founded in Canada in the next 60 years."
