MAY DESPATCH SUPER-SUB ON 20,000-MILE TRIP LONDON, Feb. 17.—The British admiralty is considering sending the new \$4,000,000 super submarine X-1 on a 20,000 mile round trip to Singapore, completing a series of tests of its seaworthiness. The submarine is five times the size of Guardian.
