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Lieut. H. S. Sellar Takes Aerial Photos

ENGAGED ON AERIAL PHOTOGRAPHIC MISSION IN NORTHERN QUEBEC

Lieut. Harold L. Sellar, a former pilot of the Royal Air Force, and a native of Prince Edward Island, enters upon this modern work which photographic science has developed in co-operation with the advancement of the Aeroplane.

Lieut. Sellar is connected with the Dominion Aerial Exploration Company which is the largest commercial aviation company in Canada today, and are under contract to operate the Air Station at Roberval for the Quebec Government, giving aerial service to the Department of Lands and Forests in transportation, mapping, sketching, forest fire patrol, etc.

The departments Engineers carrying out their work from their Aerial photography plays a major part in the survey work of the northern area of Quebec Province, and these photographs are used extensively in the placement of rivers, lakes, forests, measurement of vast timber lands and water power which Quebec has so successfully brought before the interests of American capital in the past year.

Lieut. Sellar has been entrusted with the task of obtaining these photographs which are afterwards speeded together and mounted in mosaic form, whereupon the Departments Engineers are enabled to gain their measurements and view from the photographic map the topography of the north country.

Lieut. Sellar sees it from the air. In a recent article of the Quebec Chronicle-Telegraph mention is made of the appointment of a provincial Air Director, and plans for a great expansion of the operations now carried on so successfully by Captain Harry Quigley and his staff of experts, whose services it is intended to utilize in the work of survey and exploration in the great Ungava district, which is as yet unexplored.

Undoubtedly the results of this year's work will be a determining factor in the much greater plans yet to be completed, and the Guardian wishes all success to Lieut. Sellar in the work of obtaining for his chief these most prized photographs, which seem to have simplified to no small degree the task of survey and exploration in northern Quebec.

Street Car Afire; People In Panic

NEW YORK, Aug. 21.—A small panic in which eight persons were slightly injured, occurred on a Second Avenue surface car when a collision with a truck was followed by a burst of flame from a short circuit in the front vestibule of the car.

There were about 25 passengers in the car when the accident occurred as the result of a misadventure standing in the vestibule. Seeing the flames the passengers stamped for the rear vestibule, the door of which was caused, as the car was of the one-man type. The pressure of the crowd burst the door, and injuries were done to the glass and brutes result. The man remained at his post, was uninjured. No arrests were made as the police held no one was at fault.

Attempt On Life Of King Alfonso

HENDAYE, FRANCE, Aug. 21.—An unverified account of another attempt on the life of King Alfonso of Spain was given by a returning traveller.

According to this account, a man was arrested at Santander Saturday night as he was in the act of drawing a large revolver in the presence of the King. A secret service man pinned his arms before he could get the weapon out of his pocket.

The Spanish police are credited with the belief that the several recent attempts against the sovereign are part of a general conspiracy.

U. S. Is Watching Canada's Cooperation

(Canadian Press) WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—The success of the cooperative movement among the farmers of Canada and especially western Canada is emphasized in the latest issue of Labor, the official publication of the National Farmers' Organization of the United States.

Canadian figures are being studied with great interest on this side of the line for the reason the subject of legislation dealing with cooperative organizations will be up in the coming session of Congress. The movement has the sympathy of Labor and this means that the agricultural elements in Congress and the organized labor group are likely to be found working hand in hand next session for such legislation as the cooperatives desire. The cooperatives here are especially alarmed over efforts to pass the administration cooperative measure which they fear aims at licensing and regulating the cooperatives from Washington. Labor stresses the fact that the cooperative movement has taken a great hold in Canada.

Congress May Be Called To Discuss Tax Revision

(Canadian Press) WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—Talk has been revived of an extra session of Congress, beginning October 1, two months ahead of the regular session. It is suggested that the President call Congress together at that time for the purpose of taking up tax revision and disposing of it in advance of the regular session, thus leaving the regular session to other important legislative business.

Whether anything will come of the idea is not yet certain. However, there is increasing pressure for tax revision and for the proposition of getting the tax laws changed as expeditiously as practicable in order that the country and the average business man may know what he has to reckon on for next year.

The majority of the members of Congress do not want an extra session, for the reason they are either enjoying vacations or need the time at home to fix political fences.

President Coolidge is not desirous of an extra session, being the general rule that the chief executive and the executive officials in general prefer to have Congress out of Washington, where it will not disturb them.

Nevertheless, there is a possibility the extra session will be brought about, so strong an administration paper as the Washington Post has come out for one. It says Congress ought to meet October 1 and take up and dispose of tax revision in October and November leaving the regular session to other pressing matters, such as the agricultural problem, the railroad problem, the world court and numerous other questions which will crowd on the legislators in the regular session.

If the President finds the pressure strong enough, it may be expected he will call Congress back in extra session. If a hard coal strike develops after September 1, there will be pressure on account of this matter to have Congress assembled in the expectation it will pass comprehensive legislation for regulation of the coal industry.

NEW YORK, Aug. 21.—A bare-foot boy, about 10, on his way to the East River to fish, passed Theo Isaac, 25, of Astoria, swinging a long line attached to a bamboo pole.

The hook at its end firmly embedded in Isaac's nostrils. The lad pulled a pen-knife from his pocket, and bearing the blade, released his line and fled. Isaac appeared at St. John's Hospital where the hook was removed from his nostril.
