## Canadian Farmer In Competition With the World

What the Canadian Farmer can sell Great Britain, and under what Conditions

By Dr. J. H. Griesdale

Great Britain is at present the one great food purchasing country in the world. A few other countries like France, Holland and Italy, buy some comparatively small quantities of such products. This buying is, however, done more or less spasmodically. At the same time many countries export, or are in a position to export, large quantities of agricultural products which are usually human food of one kind or another. Some of the more important of these are the following countries besides Canada are the United States, Argentina, Australia, New Zealand and India. The United States exports under normal conditions corn, wheat, meat—chiefly bacon or pork, and fruits, particularly apples; Argentina exports beef and wheat; Australia sends out Dairy produce and wheat; New Zealand ships lamb and dairy produce in great quantities and India exports wheat. Many countries export eggs and a number export some special products. Canada can and does export wheat, oats, barley, flax, butter, cheese, beef, cattle, bacon, eggs and apples. In the case of only one of these articles does she hold premier place among exporting countries, namely wheat. She is thus compelled to sell all her produce, wheat included, on a market, the only market there is, and a market open to the world, hence, against the very keenest sort of competition.

When it comes to buying food the Britisher knows no favorites or friends he buys where he can get the articles that please him best at the lowest price. To sell on this market, therefore, Canada must put out an article equal to if not superior to that offered by any other country, and she must sell it at a price quite as reasonable as that asked by any other country for produce of similar quality. The fact of the matter is she must take practically any price Great Britain offers since there is no other outlet for most of her surplus food products.

This may sound rather discouraging at the moment but here is the redeeming feature—Great Britain will pay just a little bit more for the best grade goods than she will for the average grades. For the inferior grades and will buy more generously when such goods are offered. The Britisher is exceedingly keen on quality and here is where Canada has her real chance to score. PRODUCE THE BEST! AND SEND ONLY THE BEST TO THE BRITISH MARKET.

There is no country in the world can produce better wheat, oats, barley, store cattle, bacon hogs, cheese, butter, eggs or apples, than Canada if she will just get down to the business of it.

She already stands at the top in wheat, both as to quality and quantity. Her coarse cereals, barley, oats and flax are also probably the best to trade the British market.

We need to get busy and improve our store cattle or beef cattle. They are not bad but could be a lot better. Our cheese has been losing ground for years or at least until a year or so ago when we began to improve a bit, and it is now decidedly on the upgrade.

Prices for most agricultural products are low just at present. For this reason buyers are ever more than usual pickers and choosers. The best goods are the goods first chosen, they are the goods that bring the highest prices and they are the goods that establish a reputation. Commonplace goods sell slowly and establish a reputation unless it be a bad one.

Now is the time for Canada to improve the quality of her produce, increase the output of her best grades and win the highest place and the best reputation in the British market. We have made a start, an excellent start, in the right direction—we must keep at it.

Our wheat is at the top, so are our coarse grains. We can keep at it.

Our bacon, if we sent more of it would be more uniform in quality, would be as high as Danish in price quotations. Our production both as to quality and quantity has made great progress in the past year. If we make relatively the same progress in the next few years we shall be convinced, have quite as good a reputation and be getting quite as good prices as the Danes. The progress made is due to co-operation between the farmer, the packer and the Department of Agriculture. The farmer, inspired by price, in Canada has produced more and better hogs, the packer has paid higher price for the good hogs and has put out a better article of bacon than he ever did before, the Department of Agriculture has helped the beginner, encouraged the hesitant and graded the live hog as it went to market. The result has been truly wonderful in improving quality, bettering reputation and increasing demand. We should be producing at least twice as many hogs in Canada as we are doing just at present. If we keep on we shall be doing this in a very few years much to our advantage, immediate and in the future. We must go at it in a sane manner however, every man do his bit so to speak. Flunging in hog raising is fatal just as it is in anything else.

 MUNICH, June 12.—An avalanche of fortune tellers and fakirs of every description has descended upon the Bavarian capital. The Munich police already have a record of over 300 such professional soothsayers, and are watching them closely. Their methods are varied, some using playing cards, others coffee grounds, still others astrological tables for humbugging the ignorant.

The police might be inclined to view these fakirs as harmless except for the fact that their forecasts have led to divorces, suicides and family disagreements. In one family recently the daughter of the house poisoned her husband because of an unfavorable astrological horoscope furnished her by a soothsayer, and her brother, driven frantic by a similar prediction, cut his veins.

In another case a girl was told she should not be able to marry her betrothed until four years later. She shot herself and left a note to the effect that she could not bear the thought of having to wait so long. In a third case a couple became divorced because the wife was told by a fortune teller that she would be murdered in case she went to the Balkans with her husband.

## Clock's Death Knell

 MELBOURNE, June 10.—Angus Murray, a man sentenced to death, who protested his innocence to the last, has sent what is perhaps the most poignant letter ever written by a man who knew exactly when his life would end.

He wrote in the condemned cell: "My life is fast drawing to an end. I have but thirteen days to live. Sometimes I hear the clanging of clocks, and it sounds to me like hammers of death. But I intend to face my fate bravely. I just keep smiling. What else can a man do? Gloomy? That may describe the cell. Wasn't it Oscar Wilde who said, 'It is always twilight in my cell, as it is always twilight in my heart'?"

The walls are whitewashed, and from a little window near the ceiling shafts of flashing sunlight penetrate the dusk. I can look out of the doorway, which is guarded by six iron bars. There I receive my visitors in the company of two warders. "My friends sit on a little form just outside the doorway, and talk to me through the bars. At night I hear the tramp of warders' feet. I like to see those who know me. It brightens the day. But I will have to stop the visits of some women friends. They weep, and I don't like that.

"Colonel Albatson, of the Salvation Army sees me frequently. He is a good friend to me. Sometimes I think of the old days in Adelaide, when life was full of hope. "Alas, they are gone!" "I have only a few days more left to me of air and light, and food and sensation—all that goes to make up life. Then there will be no more. "On the shadow of the scaffold I want to say goodbye to my friends. These are my parting words, 'I am not guilty.'"
