THE NATIONAL MISSION—The Mission which begins in St. Peter's Cathedral next Sunday is not an ordinary parochial Mission, but is part of an Empire wide scheme inaugurated by the Church of England, to rouse the nation to repentance. There will be special services for men, for women and for children held next Sunday and throughout the following week. Three visiting clergy will take part in this Mission.

CONVALESCENT HOME—The St. John Standard says: Colonel J. J. Sharples, O. C. Military Hospital Commission, and Colonel Thompson, O. C. Military Hospitals Medical Board, in company with Captain Bruce, O. C. of the discharge depot, St. John, and Secretary Robinson of the Returned Soldiers' Commission, visited the Parks Convalescent Home and the Military Hospital yesterday, and after making a careful inspection of the premises and interior, pronounced both institutions in splendid condition. Colonel Thompson, who is the federal member for Yukon, when asked if the present facilities in St. John were adequate to attend to the number of patients which may during the course of the war arrive here, replied that the only fault he had with the Convalescent Home was that it was not large enough. "The work of looking after the wounded is only in its infancy," said the colonel, "and it will require some time before matters are straightened out. Although we have a chain of hospitals extending from Charlottetown, P. E. I., to Vancouver at the present time, there are still many alterations and improvements to be made."

OFFICERS SENT TO FRANCE—A London despatch contains the names of numerous officers who have been sent to France. Among them is Lieut. H. W. Oxenham from P. E. Island and Capt. G. C. Siroon of Halifax, well known here, who goes over as paymaster of the divisional train.

AMONG THE DEAD—The sympathy of the community goes to Dr. and Mrs. John T. Cosgrove of Wellington, in receiving the sad news of the death of their son Corporal Ambrose A. Cosgrove, who was wounded at Hill 60 on April 23rd and has died from his wounds at Napsberg War Hospital, England on Oct. 2nd, 1916.

POULTRYMEN MEET—The regular monthly meeting of the P. E. Island Poultry Association took place last evening in the L. O. A. Hall, and was well attended. It was decided to hold their annual Poultry Show, this winter, but the date and place has been left over until the November meeting. A great deal of interest has been awakened to the poultry association of late, many new members being added to their roll, and most of the old ones are coming back. Altogether it looks as if their show, that is planned to take place this winter, will be the best ever held on the Island.

NEW BOILERS—The new boiler for the Charlottetown Pumping Station arrived by the car ferry steamer on Wednesday night. This boiler was built by the International Engineering Works of Amherst, N. S. whose tender was the lowest. The boiler is intended to replace the old boiler in the pumping station, and is to supply steam for the new pump. The boiler is a large one being designed for a working pressure of 160 pounds per square inch. The general dimensions are as follows: Inside diameter of drum inner course, 72 inches. Inside diameter of tubes, 3 1/2 inches. Number of tubes, 54. Length 18 feet. Thickness of shell, half an inch. Longitudinal joint, quadruple rivetted, but double strap. Thickness of head 9-16 inches. The contract calls for its erection in the station by Dec. 1st. This same firm were also successful bidders for the Island Cold Storage Co's. boiler, which arrived by the same boat.

NATIVES OF CHARLOTTETOWN

The many friends here of Sergt. Gordon Dewar will be interested in learning a few words of how he is getting along. Sergt. Dewar, who left Charlottetown for Amherst when a youth, joined the 40th Battalion in that town, and soon after arriving in the Old Country was transferred to the Canadian Training Machine Gun Depot at Risboro Barracks, Shorncliffe. Six months later he was chosen out of 180 men for a high standard course in machine gunnery, and sent to the Imperial Military School for this course. In writing to friends in Amherst Sergt. Dewar says: Zeppelins pass over quite often, and he especially mentions one which passed over the camp with searchlights on, and shells bursting all round. The Zep. was quite a distance away and looked very small. His brother, Alfred Dewar, E. R. N., who has been on active service on H. M. S. "Canada," in the North Sea, for some time months is now in a rest hospital in Shorncliffe. It is to be hoped that the good luck which has attended these two Charlottetown men during their service in His Majesty's forces will follow them through the conflict.

(Dedicated to the memory of Charles Fisher, late Student of Ch. Ch., Oxford.)

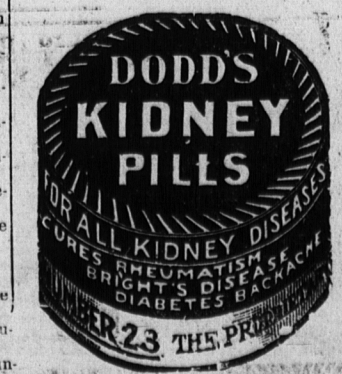
Over the warring waters, beneath the wandering skies,
