GREAT MILITARY AND NAVAL PAGEANT

LONDON, Jan. 22.—The Coronation of King George V., says the Standard, will be the occasion for a naval and military pageant of great splendor. The chief note will be on the army side, whose representatives will come from every State and Dominion in the Empire. One of the busiest officials of the year will be the Quartermaster General to the Forces, Major General Sir Herbert Miles, whilst the heavy detail work will fall upon General A. E. Codrington, Coldstream Guards, Colonel Granville Smith, and Colonel C. Wallace King.

The total parade state will approximate 25,000 troops, including a naval brigade, but as details are only in the elementary stage any accurate figures are impossible.

The various contingents will be as follows: Indian Empire, 500; Overseas Dominions, 1,500; Colonies and Protectorates, 200; Channel Islands Militia, 20; Royal Navy, 2,000; Cavalry, 1,500; Royal Regiment of Artillery, 500; corps of Royal Engineers, 400; infantry, 10,500; Army Service Corps, 150; Royal Army Medical Corps, 100; Army Ordnance Corps, 100; military cadets, 350; special reserve, 1,000; Territorial Force, 700; various departments, 150; total, 25,000.

The special bands on duty will be the massed bands of the Foot Guards, the Household Cavalry, Royal Artillery, Royal Engineers, Royal Marines and Royal School of Music. These, with the bands which single units bring with them, will provide 2,000 performers.

CANADA'S TRADE SHOWS LARGE INCREASE

OTTAWA, Jan. 23.—During the first nine months of the present fiscal year Canada's total trade amounted to \$577,999,628, an increase of \$65,511,950 as compared with the nine months from April to December of 1909. The increase was entirely in imports, owing to the rapid development of the country and the growing demand of the home market.

The imports for the nine months totalled \$339,817,563, an increase of about sixty-eight millions over the corresponding period of 1909. The exports of domestic products for the nine months totalled \$221,766,866, a comparative increase of a little over a half a million dollars.

The exports of foreign products fell off by about two millions. The exports of manufactures totalled \$26,067,506, as compared with \$22,911,314. The exports of agricultural products totalled \$38,212,056, a small decrease.

For the first time in a year and a half the monthly statement shows a falling off in the total trade. The December trade totalled only \$65,541,876 as compared with \$72,527,465 for December, 1909. The imports for the month increased by four millions, but the exports fell off by nearly ten millions.

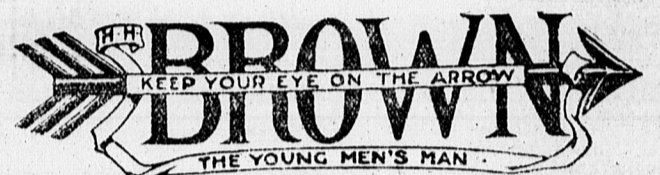

ARGUMENT IN POISON CASE NONDAY

(Continued from page 1.) ally determined today, and the case probably will go to the jury not later than Wednesday noon.

A full day will be given to each side for their pleas. Fred L. Mairy will open for the prosecution, and will be followed by S. G. Boyce and J. J. O'Brien for the defence. The arguments will be closed by Prosecuting Attorney Handlan.

The fact that the end of the trial is in sight is welcomed alike by judge, attorneys and jury. There never has been a case in the history of the criminal courts of this State fought more bitterly by both sides. The State has presented strong evidence against the accused and this has been met with telling points in her behalf.

For the State, expert chemists have testified that mineral water drunk by John O. Schenk in his home and medicine administered to him in his home were charged with two poisons—arsenic and sugar of lead. That Mrs. Schenk had improper relations with another man, and that she expressed a wish that her husband would die, also has been testified to.

The State produced a witness who swore that Mrs. Schenk offered \$1000 to put poison in her husband's medicine after he was removed to the hospital; that she purchased sugar of lead from a physician in quantity sufficient to kill a dozen men, and that John O. Schenk was suffering from arsenical and lead poison.

On the other hand the State has not shown that the defendant purchased arsenic, and no evidence has been adduced to prove that Mrs. Schenk actually put the deadly drugs in the water and medicine. The defence has claimed throughout that there was a conspiracy on the part of other members of the Schenk family to rid themselves of the woman under trial, and it put on a witness in an attempt to prove that Albert Schenk, head of the family, declared he would leave no stone unturned to accomplish that purpose.

Only witnesses to rebut testimony by the defence are to come, and no new evidence will be introduced tomorrow. It was determined late last night that Albert Schenk will be placed on the stand to rebut evidence of Mrs. Jane Hedges, who asserted that he had told her of his intentions to get rid of "that woman," and he will undoubtedly be subjected to a strenuous examination by Mr. O'Brien, Mrs. Schenk's chief attorney.
