SUCCESSFUL ISLANDERS RETURN WITH HONORS

Among the passengers by the Earl Harold Brown, Pinette, also including Judge Longley and Pring Saturday were the Prince Edward Island students returning from the Nova Scotia Agricultural College.

There were six in attendance from this province and all were fortunate enough to receive their diplomas.

In a class of forty-four, thirty-eight graduated, the Island boys keeping well up in the list, especially Mr. W. R. Shaw of St. Catharines, who was second in his class, being but half a point below the leader.

Harold Laird, Kiltin Grove, came third, Mr. M. H. Coughlan, Hope River fourth, and Mr. Everett Hogan, Hope River, seventh, the other students Mr. Frank Cairns, Freetown, and Mr. W. R. Shaw of St. Catharines.

For some time previous to closing there was no doubt as to where the cup was going as four Island students were in close competition.

I. Shaw, Frank L. Cairns, M. H. Coughlan and Harold Laird, and great was the suspense till on closing day when Mr. Shaw was declared the winner.

The presentation was made by Hon. Mr. McGregor, M. P. P., acting Premier Murray, at the closing exercises held in the college hall on Thursday, April 16th.

Addresses were delivered by some of the leading men of Nova Scotia, also including Judge Longley and Pring making a creditable standing.

Mr. W. R. Shaw won the Premier Murray cup awarded to the best judge of live ment Commission, on high cost of living. All the speakers dwelt upon the importance of agriculture and the congratulated the graduates and commended them to do their utmost to advance agricultural work in their respective communities.

In the evening a closing banquet was held at the Stanley House, at which Mr. E. Hogan, class president, presided. After the President's address, speeches were delivered by students from the various provinces and countries represented at the college. After the singing of a few college songs, the proceedings closed with singing Auld Lang Syne.

Performing Horse Dies
