

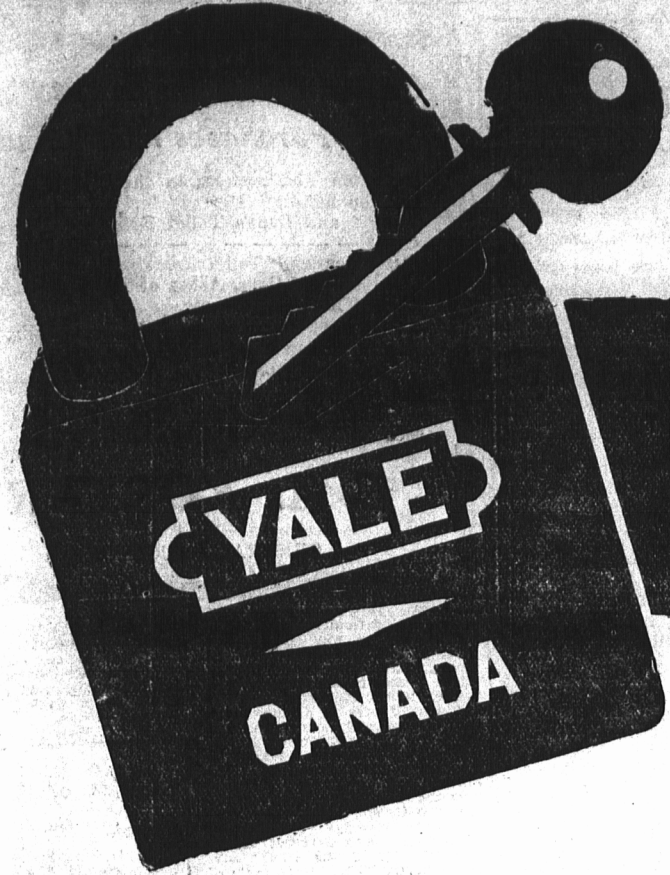

PIUS JAMESON, SR.

One by one, those who carried the responsibility of the past years on Pannure Island are answering the summons, to a higher destiny, till now very few of the older generation are left. The last one to answer the call was Pius Jameson on Saturday evening, October 15, 1938.

Deceased was born at Sturgeon, P. E. I., on March 28, 1861, where he spent his youth and also made his home during the first years of his happy married life. Approximately 34 years ago with his wife and older members of his family he moved to Pannure Island.

Practically all his life he had been employed in the fishing industry with marked success both in P. E. I. and Newfoundland. To this latter place during his early life, with several of his brothers and sisters and other residents of Sturgeon and his neighboring districts, he had made many annual trips by sailing vessel, where he was employed by the firm, Forest and Shearer. He was a very cheerful man always, and had taken an active and prominent part in the worthwhile activities of the community and especially the social life, and organization of all as the most outstanding step-dancer in the locality.

In October 1937, he was suddenly stricken with a painful illness which necessitated his immediate removal to the King's County hospital. There he underwent an operation, but the source of his illness was discovered to be that dread fatal human enemy cancer. After a few weeks of convalescence he was removed to his home where apparently, for a time he was improving. But gradually the dreadful disease took its course, and after having suffered a great deal with patience and fortitude and being fortified by the Catholic Church, his soul took its flight. Heavenward on the above mentioned date. During his illness he was gently and patiently nursed by his daughter, Christina and also by his wife and other members of his family.

He is survived by his widow (nee) Mary Anne McLaughlin, four sons, James in Bradford, Mass., Louis, Gus and Alex. at Pannure and two daughters, Christina and Patricia also at home, and two brothers and one sister, Jimmy, Philip and Mrs. Kitty Steele, all of Sturgeon. His funeral to St. Paul's Church Sturgeon was held from his late residence on Monday October 17, and was very largely attended, testifying to the high esteem in which he was held. Bluenose Likely To Visit Pacific Ports

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) VICTORIA, Dec. 17—George Willis, wharf manager here said tonight the famous Bluenose, N. S. schooner Bluenose might visit Victoria, Vancouver and Puget Sound ports in Washington state next year.

The wharf manager said Herbert Young of Lunenburg told him Captain Angus Walter of Bluenose expects to sail his craft to the Golden Gate Exposition in San Francisco in 1939, and if "sufficient inducement" can be guaranteed, the Bluenose will also visit the Pacific northwest.

Economic Force Is Urged By Dysart

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) EOSTON, Dec. 18—Democratic nations were urged by Premier A. A. Dussart of New Brunswick Saturday night to apply economic force against offending totalitarian states. The Premier spoke to the Canadian Club on the occasion of its annual ladies night which he and Mrs. Dussart attended.

The economic front was a weapon "that might be used without the frightful consequences of open warfare," Mr. Dussart said. It might be wielded to "influence these totallt n states and affect a readjustment of their principles and philosophy more in harmony with civilization today."
