HON. W. FIELDING IS IN MONCTON

Meets Emerson and Delegations of Train Men

AN ARMY OF IMMIGRANTS. OTTAWA, Nov. 5.—(Special).—The Interior Department reports 121,115 immigrants arrived in Canada during the ten months ending with October.

Another big effort will be made in the Old Country next season for immigrants and also in France and Belgium.

DRYSDALE ON ALASKA AWARD

Another Instance of British Diplomacy Pandering to the American.

The Pall Mall Gazette of Oct 21 has the following:

The Hon Arthur Drysdale, Commissioner of Mines and Public Works, of Nova Scotia, who is at present in London stated to-day in an interview with a Central News representative that the award meant that Canada was shut off from the Alaskan coast, and "what little has been conceded to her there did not amount to anything. Of course," he proceeded, "Canada agreed to the arbitration in full good faith, and would have to live up to the decision."

"Canadians, however would regard the award as the result of diplomacy, rather than as a judicial decision, they would consider it also as the old story of pleading the Americans regardless of the just rights of the Canadians on the border lines. The Americans went into arbitration with nothing to lose. The decision, to say the least, was most unfortunate. Canada got nothing. It would strike anybody that if Canada was entitled to the two Islands given her she was entitled to the four."

"It was simply," he added, "another instance of British diplomacy, pandering to the American—a diplomacy which lost Canada the American Union and later gave a great slice of the Dominion to the State of Maine."

SHIELDS GOES TO NEWFOUNDLAND

He says Soo Trouble will be Satisfactorily Adjusted.

NORTH SYDNEY, Nov. 3.—Cornelius Shields and William Coyne, of the Consolidated Lake Superior Companies arrived this evening by the last train and left for Newfoundland by the Bruce. "I feel confident that the trouble at the Soo will eventually be satisfactorily adjusted," said Mr. Shields when interviewed by the Chronicle's correspondent. "An extension of time has already been received from Speyer & Company. The trouble was I think, due mainly to the tightness of the money market. Our trip to St. John's is of a purely personal character."

James Stewart, auditor of the Reid Newfoundland Company, who was the principal witness for the prosecution in the late case against J. T. Meany, till recently the company's agent here, was arrested this evening on a charge of slander at the instance of R. H. Wilcox, another employee of the Company. The case is a sequel to Meany's acquittal after the jury had been out for three minutes. Wilcox, who was discharged at the same time as Meany claims that he was wrongfully dismissed, that the Auditor accused him of assisting Meany to embezzle the Company's funds.

SAYS CANADA WON.

British Columbia Bishop Discusses Alaskan Boundary Award.

VANCOUVER B. C. Nov. 1.—Bishop Ridley of Caledonia has returned from making a farwell tour of his diocese, which embraces all the northern part of British Columbia, and of which he has been bishop for twenty-five years. From his long residence at Port Simpson and intimate knowledge of the territory in dispute between Canada and the United States, Bishop Ridley says he considers that, in securing ownership of Wales and Peare Islands, Canada has gained more than was expected. In early days the United States Government had a fort and custom house at Longas, and the middle of Fortland Channel was always regarded as the boundary, and never questioned until the Klondike excitement and construction of the White Pass Railway which made the port on Lynn Canal of value. In fact, Bishop Ridley considers the award a victory for Canada. President Roosevelt's note of congratulation he regards as a ruse to cover his retreat from an unsuccessful attempt to retain possession of Wales and Peare Islands, awarded to Canada, which command the situation. These two large islands are rich in timber and minerals, as well as salmon streams. From a strategic point of view, their value is incalculable. They command the harbor of Port Simpson and its approaches, and at the western end of Wales Island is an emolence some 1100 feet high, a natural location for fortifications. Sitkan and the other islands are small, rocky islets of no value, and useless for strategic purposes, as they are low and could be swept from Wales Island. Wales and Peare Islands also have splendid harbors and shelters. A further point to be considered is that the entire entrance to the pass, on which are located several canneries, goes Canada.

SUPREME COURT.

Thursday, Nov. 5. Kitcham v. Davidson and Burke claimant. Judgment reserved.

Line vs. Whear, an argument on demurrer Hazard K. C. for plaintiff. Peters K. C. for defendant.

This is a suit to recover from defendant \$8000 being the amount of a penalty alleged to have been incurred by the defendant for sitting and voting in the Legislative Assembly after having been disqualified by reason of having acted as counsel in certain crown cases before the Supreme Court and having been paid for his services. The defendant demurred to the plaintiff's declaration or claim viz that it was bad in substance.

The points taken are as follows:—

- 1.—That the engagement of the services of a Barrister of the Supreme Court of Prince Edward Island who is a member of the Legislative Assembly of the said Province, by the Attorney General as Counsel for the Crown, does not under the Provisions of the Act 58 Victoria Cap. 1, entitled "An Act Respecting the Legislature," disqualify such member or render him incapable of sitting or voting in the said Legislative Assembly.
- 2.—That a member who accepts such employment, is not liable for any penalty under said statute.
- 3.—That the declaration does not allege that a contract or agreement existed between the defendant and a Department of the Public Service of the said Province, at the time that the defendant did sit and vote as a member of the said Legislative Assembly as alleged by the plaintiff in the said declaration.
- 4.—That it does not appear by the declaration that the defendant was at the time this action was brought made ineligible as a member of the Assembly, or declared incapable of sitting or voting therein.

FICTITIOUS SALES OF TWIN CITY

Sensational Statement Made by A. E. Ames, False Entries

TORONTO, Nov. 3.—Some sensational evidence was given by A. E. Ames this morning in his examination by W. H. Hunter in respect to the relations between his firm and the Atlas Loan Company of St. Thomas, now in liquidation. On examination of some of the books and accounts of Mr. Ames, the recent suspension of whose firm caused a sensation, admitted that certain sales of Twin City stock, through the medium of which some thousands of dollars had been transferred to the deposit account of the Atlas Loan in his office, were fictitious, and had never taken place.

He blamed Mr. A. E. Wallace, Manager of the Atlas Loan Company, for this, and said the false entries must have been made under the latter's instructions. The fictitious sales also appeared on one of the quarterly reports of the Atlas Loan Company, prepared by Ames & Co.

Mr. Ames read a statement challenging the figures submitted yesterday by Mr. Hunter, solicitor for the liquidator as showing the losses of Ames & Co., and incidentally criticised the liquidator for permitting such a statement to have been made.

FOR LIFE SAVING HEROISM.

OTTAWA, Nov. 3.—On behalf of the Royal Canadian Humane Association, Mayor Cook today presented Miss Amy Ritchie, daughter of Lady Ritchie, with a certificate and Lieutenant Palmer with a bronze medal of the society for heroism displayed in saving the life of Miss Burrows, in the St. Lawrence River last July.
