Fredericton Track Record Equalled In Free For All

Largest Crowd In Number Of Years Witnesses Horse Racing In Connection With The Firemen's Tournament.

FREDERICTON, N. B., July 25.—The largest crowd to witness horse races at the Fredericton track for a number of years were on hand this afternoon, the races being held as part of the Maritime Firemen's Tournament program.

2.16 Trot and Pace
The first race on the card was a 2.16 Trot and Pace, and nine horses faced the starter for the first heat.

2.26 Trot
Five trotters came to the wire for the 2.26 Trot. Dude Potemkin, owned by Wathen, Fort Fairfield, Me., went away on the pole and even though he had to trot in 2.15 in the first heat he did not seem to be extended at any time and went on to win the second and third heats without difficulty.

2.18 Trot and Pace (Purse \$200)

In race No. 2 (2.16 Trot and Pace), Three seconds time allowance for trotters.

In race No. 4 (2.25 Pace) horses with a record of 2.15 or better made this year are not eligible.

All purses divided 40%, 25%, 15%, 12% and 8%. Five per cent of the money raced for each heat will be deducted from the first and second horses.

Six horses to enter, four to start. All drivers must wear a driver's uniform that will be satisfactory to the judges.

Two entries of the same ownership may start in the same race, providing the full 5 per cent is paid on each starter, the drivers having the approval of the judges.

Eligibility based on N. T. A. money winning classification. The management assume no responsibility for any accident or damage to any person or property, during this meeting and this understanding is part of this contract.

The management reserves the right to declare off, change order of program, decline any entry, bar any driver, declare off and fill without re-advertising, any races not satisfactorily filled.

If weather is stormy, or track is in unfavorable condition so that racing cannot be carried on at the time advertised, the management reserve the right to postpone or declare the races off, and return the entrance monies.

Hay, straw and stabling free. This track is a member of the National Trotting Association, and will be governed by its rules, except where they conflict with the above conditions.

Stars Lose Close Game To Rovers

Northend Team Come From Behind To Eke Out A 5 To 4 Win.

After being shut out for five innings by masterful pitching by young Walter Goss, moundsman for the Stars, the Rovers scored two runs in the sixth and added three more in the following frame to edge out last year's City League champs 5-4 at the Abegweit Grounds last night.

Big George Francis' homer with one on in the sixth, and "Pud" Whitlock's spectacular running catch of Duffy's line drive in the third session were the big lights of the game. "Puddy" Connors, after a rather shabby start, when he was hit freely by the Stars stick-wielders, settled down and gave the losers only seven safe blows, and striking out six during the tilt.

Here Are The Classes Boys! Something to Suit Everyone Who Has a Stepper!

Ten classes with over \$4,000 in purses, prizes and premiums for three days racing, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, August 22nd, 23rd and 24th, are on the program for the Provincial Exhibition at Charlottetown on the above dates.

These classes are modeled very much on the lines of last year's which were so successful and drew such a large entry list. It will be by far the greatest amount of money offered by any track for harness racing in the Maritimes and is sure to bring together a classy array of speedsters.

The object of the racing of course is to provide good sport for the public and to do this it is necessary to have the horses as evenly matched as possible so that the events will not be of a runaway nature as then the public lose interest.

Knowing the available material that will likely race at Charlottetown we are confident in the assertion that the classes as shown below will provide the maximum of competition and yet give the horsemen a good square deal.

It will be noticed that the pacing classes allow trotters to start, but the trotters are not given any time allowance. The reason is that the trotters likely to compete with the pacers have enough class without giving them any handicap in seconds. The superlative merits of Addie McGraw 2.10-1-2, who it is felt can easily handle any of the trotters in her class, has caused her to be barred from one of the classes to which she is at present eligible. This will really not work any injustice on Addie's owners as they can enter her in both the 2.15 Trot and either the 2.19 Trot and Pace or the 2.16 Trot and Pace. It is not very often that the Provincial Exhibition has found it necessary to bar any horse and it is a distinct compliment. It was done some years ago in the case of The Yank.

In addition to the regular classes a colt race for two year olds has been added, as there seems to be a great deal of interest taken in them and a number are in training.

SPECIAL PRIZES FOR DRIVERS AND OWNERS

A special ribbon will be given to the owner of the winning horse in each race, and \$20.00 to the driver winning the most points during the meeting. \$10.00 to the driver winning second most points during the meet. First place counts five points, second place three points, third place two points and fourth place one point. \$10.00 will be given to the winning driver in each race.

\$10.00 will be given to the driver driving the fastest heat trotted during the meet and \$10.00 to the driver driving the fastest heat paced during the meet.

Ten Dollars will be given to the caretaker of the horse pacing the fastest heat and Ten Dollars to the caretaker of the horse pacing the fastest heat.

Five Dollars will be given to the caretaker of each horse winning a race in the trotting and pacing classes during the meet.

Fifty Dollars will be given to the owner of the horse that beats track record of 2:07 1/2 in a race except as provided for below. Fifty Dollars to the owner of the horse that beats the track record of 2:10 1/4 in a race, except as provided for below. In case two horses beat the above records then the awards go to the fastest horse. If two horses tie for the awards the money will be divided equally.
