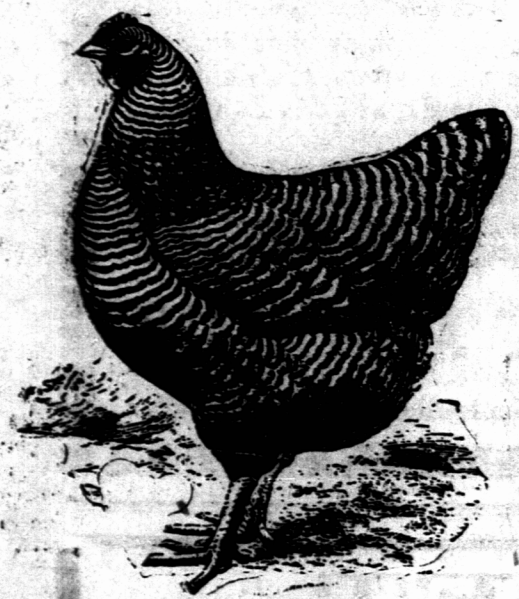

sale of tobacco to minors was moved by Mr. Whear, who said that he regretted the feeling which exists in regard to the passing of the Bill. In Germany, Japan and the United States a law exists prohibiting the use of tobacco by minors. In Ontario and Nova Scotia a prohibitory law exists and the evidence of highest authorities goes to show that the use of tobacco is injurious to minors physically and mentally. He considered that the clause with regard to the imprisonment of the boys is the section which will make the law workable.

Capt. Read said he was going to protest against the passing of the bill. He considered the clause which made the child a criminal when the father is allowed to smoke with impunity is the height of hypocrisy. He could not understand how those pretending to be Christians and friends of the Master who said to the little children "come unto me," etc., were anything less than hypocrites when they urge the incarceration of minors for breaking the provisions of the second clause of the Act. He thought that when he was coming to the House he was coming to a Legislature which gave free schools of this country almost in advance of other parts of the world. He would feel like resigning his seat if the bill passed. The second clause will cripple the bill and will place a stigma upon the books which will be a disgrace. If the promoter of the bill insisted upon the passing of the bill he would move that it be given the six months hoist.

Hon. Mr. Rogers said he was surprised at the attitude of the honorable member from Bedouque. He did not consider that his argument was consistent when it is considered that the amendment moved by Mr. Read a few days ago provided for imprisonment without a fine until confession was made. He contended that many at present in the Asylum were placed there by the use of tobacco in their early days.

Captain Read said that his amendment gave the child, after he got in the hands of the magistrate, a key to release himself and thus prevent commitment. The matter was with the child.

Premier Farquharson said the Bill is brought in by people who labor for the betterment of humanity. He quoted the application of the law in reference to the two little boys arrested for theft, some time ago. The parents sat in court with them, yet the children were being tried.

Mr. J. A. Matheson contended that the Bill was a legal deformity, not only in the second but in another paragraph. According to the criminal code the child must know and fully appreciate the Act before he is amenable to the law. If the amendments are not made he would vote against the measure.
