—MIRACULOUS ESCAPE—A party of five young people motoring to Charlottetown from Summerside on Wednesday morning had a miraculous escape from being killed when the car in which they were driving turned completely over just beyond Hazelbrook School, near Hunter River. The car, a Chrysler sedan, swerved twice in the clay and turned a complete somersault, smashing the windshield and glass in the right front door and crushing the hood. The occupants were not seriously hurt. One young lady received a severe lacerated wound just below the knee and had to be taken to a doctor at Hunter River and six stitches put in to close the wound. The others escaped with only slight bruises. But for the fact that the car was travelling slowly and that the engine stopped when the car turned over, a very different story might have been told. The young people crawled out through the door. Nearby neighbours helped to right the machine which was able to return to Summerside under its own power.—S.

NEW U. OF A. PROF IS RHODES SCHOLAR
EDMONTON, Alta., Aug. 13. (By the Canadian Press)—Former Westerner and Rhodes scholar, George M. Smith will secure the position of professor and head of the department of history at the University of Alberta, Mr. Smith succeeds Prof. A. L. Burt, who resigned recently, and will bring with him an enviable record at the University of Toronto where he was senior professor in the history department for several years. The new head of U. of A.'s history department is at present in Oxford and is to accompany the Canadian delegation to the international relations conference in China this fall. On his return to the Dominion he will take over his new duties in the west where he was elected Rhodes scholar to represent Alberta and Saskatchewan in 1909.

CONDUCTING UNACCOMPANIED GIRLS

(Canadian Press)
LONDON, Aug. 13.—Miss Winifrede Wrench writing in Overseas says: "The conductress of the 'Empress of Britain' is Miss M. Stericker. Miss Stericker represents a new career for women, that of conducting unaccompanied girls from Great Britain going out to service or other employment in Canada. Owing to the bad times at present, she told me, she had only a few girls to look after, but when times are good she has had as many as 200 or 300. There are countless things a sympathetic and efficient woman like Miss Stericker can do for her charges, the majority of whom have never left home before. "On landing the girls are handed over by the ship conductresses to the shore conductresses, employed for this purpose by the Canadian Government. Nothing can exceed the kindness of the Canadian women to the newcomers," Miss Stericker told me. Everything that can be done for them is done, both by the C. P. and the Government, and she also described the delightful nursery in the Emigration Hall in Quebec, equipped and maintained by the Junior Red Cross of Canada, where babies and children receive a particularly warm welcome. "No girl need nowadays have the slightest qualms about crossing the Atlantic in search of a new life, provided always that she goes to a post or is in a position to earn her own living. The saddest part of Miss Stericker's job is to take back girls who for some reason or another have failed to make good. And today the Canadian Government, faced with their own problems of unemployment, return to the Old Country those who cannot or will not take care of themselves."

THE POWER TO PULL STRINGS

CAPE TOWN, South Africa, Aug. 13.—That the power to pull strings was of greater use to a woman who desired a successful business career than a university degree appeared from a talk on women's chances in commerce given by Miss Nettieford, a managing director of a big London firm, to the Cape Town Association of University Women. "Without influence or financial backing it is extremely difficult for either a man or woman to get the opportunity of advance to higher positions in business, at least in Britain. A man has no scruples in pulling every possible string to secure a good beginning for a son. He is far more reluctant to make the same efforts in favor of a daughter. A woman is still more reluctant to do so on her own account, and more especially if she has had a university education, for that naturally encourages a certain mental fastidiousness. If a woman wishes to succeed in business she must throw these scruples to the winds, and pull every possible string, and pull hard," said Miss Nettieford.

MISS NETTIEFOLD has taken her law degrees at Cambridge and London, and served two years in a London solicitor's office before taking a post during the war in the Ministry of Food. When the war ended she became joint director with her brother of Nettieford and Sons, Ltd.
