**W. A. C. BRANCH CLOSING** — The Charlottetown branch of the W. A. C. Corporation, under the management of Squadron Leader W. L. Higgins, D.F.C., will officially close down on the last day of August. The reason as given to a Guardian representative by a War Assets official, is shortage of materials, and in fact that the volume of trade being done here now does not warrant the expense and upkeep of a local branch. Most of the materials disposed of here were handled through wholesalers on the mainland, which added to the cost of maintaining a local branch here.

**POTATO CROP SPRAYING** — Many farmers are now calling at the laboratory of pathology at the Dominion Experimental Farm looking for information relative to spraying their potato crops. One particular point is being stressed by the officials, namely the need of destroying all cull piles, as these discarded potatoes often are the principal source of blight infection. While no blight has been reported to date, growers are advised to commence spraying as soon as the plants are eight to ten inches high. Some growers already have applied one, two or more sprays and this practice officials advise should become general not later than this week. The first spray should be applied before haying.

VICTORIA, July 14 — (CP)—A few hours after Georges Laramée died in hospital here today at the reported age of 110 years and reputedly Canada's second oldest citizen, his true age was revealed as 93.

Mrs. J. T. Jones, at whose home he lived for the last five years, said she and an administrator had opened Laramée's safety deposit box and found annuity papers revealing he was only 93.

Born near Montreal, he claimed to be a cousin of Sir Wilfrid Laurier.
