The rally day service in Princetown United on Sunday morning was largely attended. The exercises, as assigned by the Religious Board of Education were wholeheartedly carried out. Mr. John Simpson, Superintendent of Sunday School, acting as leader. The special address "O Come let us worship" was given by the pastor the Rev. E. M. Aitken. **English Weeklies Are Devoting Much Space To Imperial Conference**

LONDON, Oct. 1.—Most of the English weekly reviews devote considerable space to discussing the Imperial Conference, and a theme common to most of the reviews is that, equal relationship being already a fact, it now remains to be seen how the equality will be used.

"A common deal will have to be regarded," says The Spectator, "as being immensely more important than any pedantic legalistic conception. Any scheme of imperial development representing the greatest measure of common agreement is bound to be largely a patch-work in which tariffs will play a part, though, we hope, not a predominant part." The Spectator believes the most crying need of the Imperial Conference is to have a permanent secretariat.

The Saturday Review describes the conference as meeting in an atmosphere of good-will, though amid gloom and doubting expectation, rather than definite hope. The onus, says the Review, are frankly unfavorable. The weekly goes on to say that the Canadian Premier, fresh from his victory at the polls, has replied to the United States tariff by fiscal action which will, no doubt, be effective on the land frontier of the Dominion, but will, incidentally, make the import of sea-borne British commerce more difficult.

some unknown and uncharted Socialist haven, where young professors will be found to believe they can control the world's trade in wheat and wool from an arm chair in Whitehall.

The New Statesmen, representing the intellectual democrats, after admitting the conference will, doubtless, concern itself primarily with economic matters, asks if the "old conclusions will hold good when all the premises are different."

"The logical conclusion to be drawn from the present economic state of the Empire," says this weekly, "is that it is worth while to take risks in order to foster the development of inter-Imperial trade. This does not mean, necessarily, that we ought to imitate the Dominions in resorting to preferential tariffs, for there may be other methods which from our viewpoint, would be better.

"We doubt if even the most confirmed free trader really desires the Dominions to remove the preferences which they now grant to British goods, or would propose the repeal of the Colonial Stocks Act, under which the Dominions enjoy a preferential position in the British capital market. And so the entire question is removed from the sphere of principle into that of expediency.

"As a workable alternative to a stronger fiscal policy, there is the proposal to regulate trade by means of import boards and the bulk purchase of Dominions' products. This scheme, at present, appears to be favored in Governmental circles.

"The scheme admittedly has its difficulties, but we venture to predict that Great Britain will very soon take to either higher tariffs and more preferences, or the purchase boards as a means of stimulating Empire trade.

"If the present Government," concludes the New Statesmen, "lets slip the opportunity to lead the way towards a constructive policy, it will leave those who favor protective and preferential tariffs in undisputed possession of the field.
