Coroner Bowness was at once notified and arrived at the spot about noon.

The body was found by a boy on his way to the shore for a load of sea weed early yesterday morning lying only about six feet from the road. No mark of violence was on the body and the only articles deceased carried were a lead pencil, a piece of wrapping twine and a pocket handkerchief. As the body was in a very decomposed condition and as several parties had passed the spot where the body was found it was evident that the deceased came to his death by starvation and exposure not earlier than Monday night. 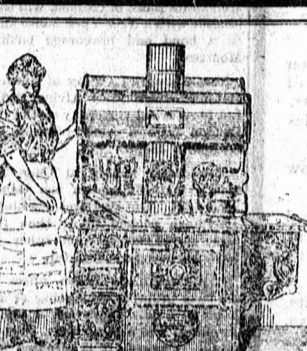
