CRITICISM RESENTED Sir - Permit me the space in your valuable paper to express the indignation felt by Baptists all over E. I. on reading the attack on the Rev. Ross C. Eaton of Charlottetown, as published in a letter in the Guardian a few days ago, and signed "Subscriber," Bedeque. This is not a personal matter. My friend, Rev. Ross C. Eaton, is so well known to his friends and parishioners, that the suggestion of his low character because of certain Liberals in his congregation, in relation to the work of the Temperance Alliance, is absurd in the extreme, and shows the ignorance of his true character on the part of the writer of the letter, recently published, and signed "Subscriber," Bedeque. With the privilege of "Subscriber," to indulge in free criticisms of the methods of either the Alliance, or the Government, I have no fault to find. METHODS OF U. S. REVENUE SHIPS STRONGLY PROTESTED. BY BRITAIN

WASHINGTON, May 7 - The controversy between the British and United States Government over violations by the United States prohibition enforcement craft of the Bahamas agreement probably will be carried to President Coolidge. It is rumored here that Secretary of State Frank B. Kellogg has informed the Treasury Department which is in charge of Coast Guard ships, that the British Government is not satisfied with the explanation offered of recent invasion of British ports in the West Indies by anti-smuggling ships from the United States, and that the whole question will have to be referred to the President and his Cabinet. On March 11 the American revenue cutters Travis and Cuyahoga entered the harbor of St. George, Bermuda, and remained there for three days without giving reasons, which was in contravention of the Bahamas agreement concerning movements of United States and British ships in those waters. A similar incident a year ago had called for sharp protests from the British Embassy here. On that occasion United States ships "Herring Lane and General Greene entered Nassau Harbor and remained without giving reasons. Despite these two protests from the Embassy, the United States revenue cutter Tiger went into St. George's Harbor on April 6 last. It signalled for permission to enter, but did not wait for permission. The British Embassy has lodged another protest, and it is understood that Mr. Kellogg has decided to refer the whole matter to the President and Cabinet.
