**Mr. Justice Riddell To Preside—Winner Will Compete in Canadian Championship.**

TORONTO, April 29.—Friday His Worship Mayor McBride drew lots to determine the speaking order of the sixteen contestants in the Ontario oratory final which is to be held at Massey Hall on Wednesday evening, May 1, resulting as follows:

These young people are all champions in their own districts. Co-operating with The Star in the work of organizing contests in 150 secondary schools and district semi-finals and finals, was the Ontario Secondary School Teachers' Federation, the president of which is W. H. Tuke, principal of Halleybury high school, and secretary, S. H. Henry of Central High School of Commerce, Toronto.

Mr. Justice Riddell will preside over the meetings.

The orations, which are ten minutes in length, will be given in groups of four, with music between the groups.

The dogs of Massey Hall will be opened at 6.30 o'clock and the speeches are scheduled to start at 7.15. While the audience is assembling a musical program of high merit will be provided so that there will be no dull moments.

Contestants will have a choice of the following four subjects: "Canada Among the Nations," "The Unification of Canada," "The Peoples of Canada," and "Canada's Economic Problem." The ten-minute time limit will be strictly adhered to.

Next October at Washington Canada's best orator will speak for his country in the international final. At that time champions from secondary schools in 22 countries will meet, first in semi-finals, followed by the final, the winner of which will be acclaimed the world's champion orator. Preceding this important meeting, Canada's champion will be given a travelling scholarship, in the form of a free trip to Europe by newspapers and committees in the seven provinces which have this year participated in the competitions, namely, British Columbia, Alberta, Manitoba, Ontario, Quebec, Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia.

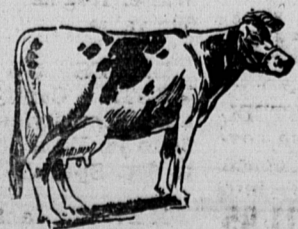

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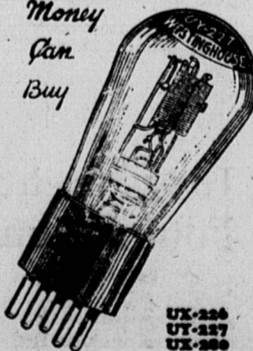
