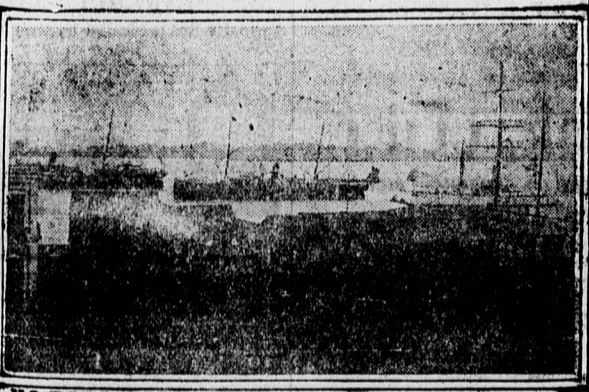

Regulation of the practice of hypnotism by law is demanded by scientists and physicians, in view of the death at Somerville, N. J., of the subject, Robert Simpson, while under the influence of Arthur Everton, an itinerant hypnotist performing in a cheap theatre. The tragedy suggests in many ways the story of the death of the brilliant mind reader Washington Irving Bishop, who while in a cataleptic state not essentially different from that induced by Everton was adjudged by physicians to have died. Bitter was the controversy which raged two decades ago as to whether Bishop was not actually alive when, within six hours of his supposed death, his body was dissected by eager pathologists. Using the death of Simpson as their text, such men as Professor James H. Hyslop, secretary of the Society for Psychological Research; Dr. Isaac K. Funk and Dr. John D. Quackenbush, a physician practising hypnotic therapeutics, raise the danger signal and inquire if it is not possible that the domain of hypnosis, which hardly the borders are known, shall not be explored by trained men. They, too, would see inaugurated legislation such as is already on the statute books of France and Italy, which forbids the practice of hypnotism for purposes of theatrical display, and confine its use entirely to graduated physicians. They maintain that in this enlightened age it would be no more barbarous to inject nitroglycerine into the veins of a man for the purpose of amusing an audience than it would be to administer that powerful mental agent hypnosis for the entertainment of the public. It is, in accordance with their code, no better to expose a subject to the control of another mind in public than to administer medicine as an adjunct to vaudeville.



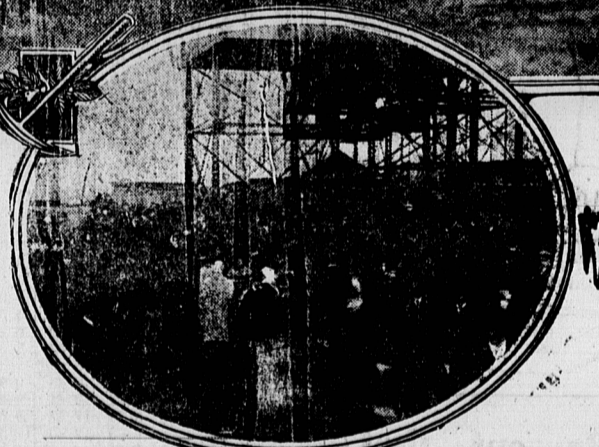

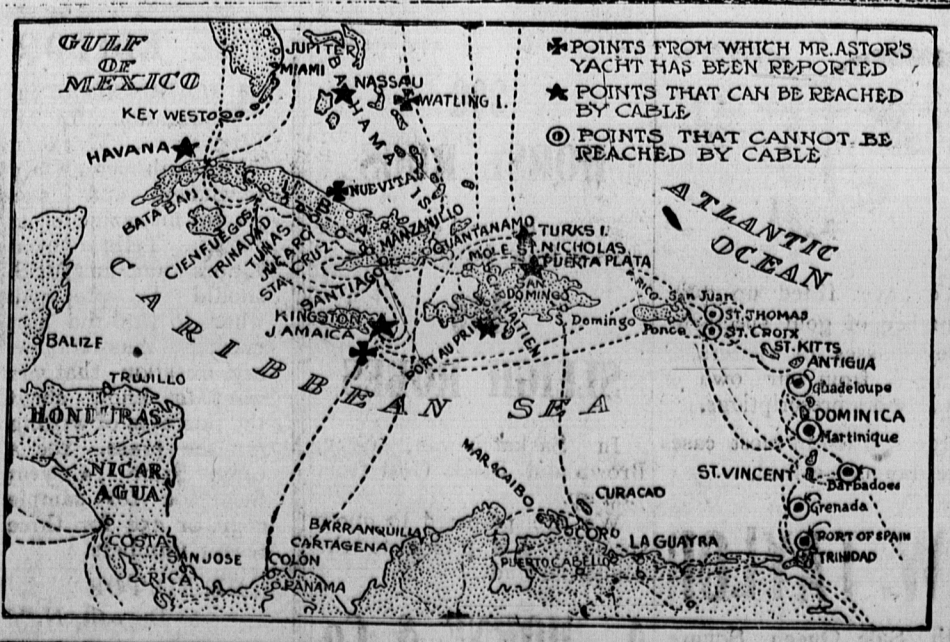
THE ST. PAUL MINE AT CHERRY, ILLINOIS.

The course pursued by those in search of Astor's Yacht during the recent storm.



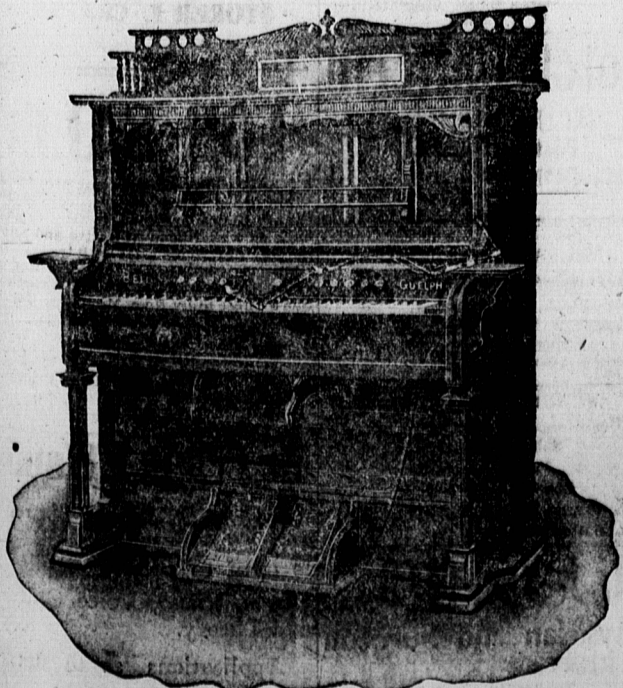

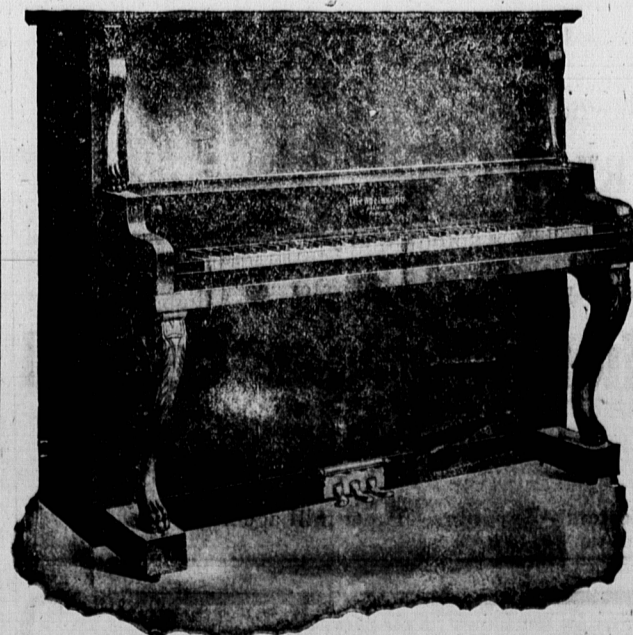
