Promised Safe Conduct Then Slaughtered

ALEPPO, Syria, May 10.—The slaughter of the little French garrison which evacuated Urfa on a promise of safe conduct by the Turkish nationalist troops after the town had been besieged for sixty-one days, is described in the diary of General Woodward, accountant for the American commission for relief in the Near East, who was an eyewitness of the massacre. He escaped and returned to Urfa after several hundred French soldiers had been killed or made prisoners by tribesmen. The French were ambushed by the tribesmen in violation of an agreement made by Naniq Effendi who came from Angora as the Turkish nationalist government's representative, the diary says, and promised the Frenchmen safe conduct if they would evacuate.

At that time the French had only four day's rations left and had eaten their horses and mules, and evacuation was considered inevitable as the garrison was greatly outnumbered by the enemy.

CANADIAN AVIATOR ARRIVES.—The Canadian Government Merchant Marine steamer Canadian Aviator was due in port last evening from Montreal. She will load a cargo of general produce for St. John's Nfld. It is a great boon to this port to have these ships calling here and it is hoped that the merchants in order to encourage the trade will order their goods by this steamer.

A Last Effort For French Strike

(Dom. Press Special.) PARIS, May 10.—In an eleventh hour effort to save the general strike from complete failure, the general labor committee has ordered out four important confederations of labor throughout France, the strike to begin today. Workers on street cars and buses, carriage makers, airplane builders and mechanics and men engaged in building trades are included in the orders. A twentieth century touch is added to the situation by an order affecting the airplane business. This will be the first general "air-strike" in France since the end of the war. For nearly a week the situation has been practically stationary. Those workers who are on strike are tenaciously clinging to their methods, but they are not sufficiently numerous to interfere with either railways or with mine production.

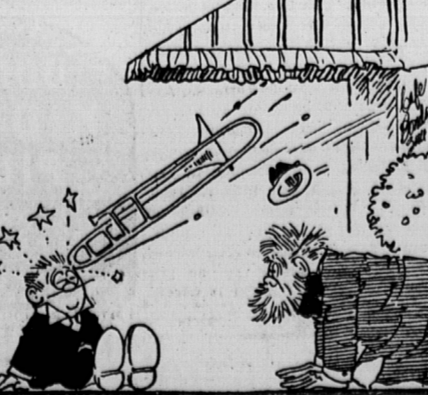
