## TORONTO FALL FAIR

### Mr. F. S. Jost Returns Home.

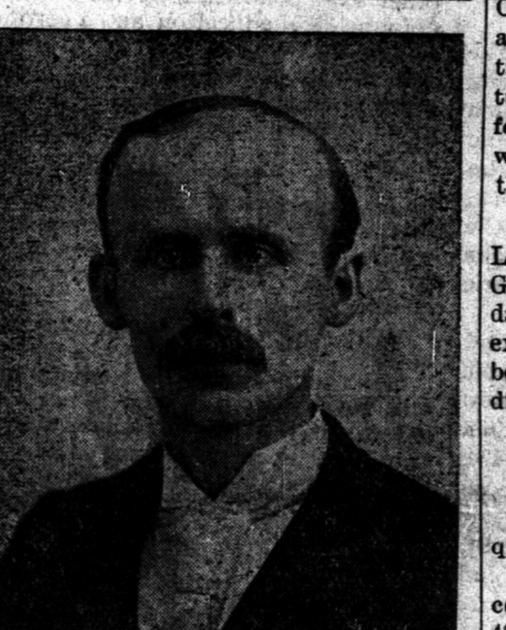
## HIS IMPRESSION OF

### The Exhibition—He is Delighted With The Specialties.

Mr. F. S. Jost, of Miller Bros, returned to the city on Wednesday evening from Toronto, after spending some ten days abroad during which time he visited the Toronto Exhibition.

Mr. Jost pronounces the exhibition a grand success as far as the show is concerned and he was informed that up to Saturday last the receipts were \$1100 ahead of last year. The grounds were beautifully laid off and the walks and shady trees gave the impression of space. The location of the grounds is also very attractive, facing as it does on the lake.

The devoting of different buildings to different exhibits, Mr. Jost considers an important feature. The enormous ex-

hibit of fruit has a building of its own. The flowers of the garden are artistically arranged in another building and so on with all the other different exhibits. The music pavillion attracted a large number of visitors and although it contained nothing but musical instruments the arranging, etc. of the different exhibits displayed taste and an endless amount of labor on the part of the exhibitors.

Large crowds visited the machinery hall, the automobile attracting considerable attention. The cattle were not attractively shown and the spectator finds it difficult to see the exhibits at all. In fact Mr. Jost considers the method of showing cattle at the Provincial Exhibition in Charlottetown, superior at least to the custom in Toronto.

The main building is devoted to the different merchants. The grand stand is a mammoth affair with a seating capacity of 10,000 people. The grand stand is used on alternate days for viewing the different special features such as the relief of Mafeking, the feats of the different acrobats and trapes performers.

The inclined plane is built of trestle work. One end of the plain is 100 feet high, the other 50 feet. The performer mounts a wheel at the highest point and rides down the incline to the lowest end diving into an artificial pond. The feat is very thrilling and was witnessed by thousands.

Besides the specialty performances, menagerie of trained animals of different kinds were shown. The wild man from Philippine Islands and the Cuban dwarf, also attracted considerable attention.

The crystal maze was visited by a very large number of people. After entering the tent the e were a number of intricate passages and the visitor found himself unable to make his exit without calling for the guide. The visitor's condition is truly "mazedness" It was a confusing, baffling net work of paths, an embarrassing place. The smallest railroad in the world is shown, the engine of which is capable of hauling 40 people. The cars are open and only five cents was charged for a ride.

The Australian woman snake charmer elicited much comment among the visitors to the fair. The woman stood in a ravine and with her was placed a species of every known reptile. She appeared to be thoroughly familiar with her friends.

The Ferris wheel and merry-go-round added to the attractions on the grounds. The latter gave the rider the impression that he is going over hills and dales and is much more pleasant than the merry-go-round known in Charlottetown. The Ferris wheel was driven by an engine.

The above will be given at the Exhibition, Charlottetown, on the 28th, and 27th inst., and should be witnessed by all, as it is the first time that anything of any magnitude in that line has been shown here. We feel confident these fire work displays will be among the leading attractions at the Exhibition.

THE examination upon Hurburt's Normal Lessons will be held at the home of Rev. G. P. Raymond, Queen Street, on Thursday, Sept. 20th, beginning at 3 p. m. The examination will cover the entire text book, and will consist of twenty questions distributed as follows:

- Bible Books and History 5 questions.
- Bible Geography, 5
- Bible Institutions, 5
- Sunday School, Teacher, and Pupil, 5 questions.

Each question answered perfectly will count 20, so that a perfect paper will count 400. A total of 250 will entitle the examinee to a Prince Edward Island Sunday School Association Diploma, which will be presented at the Annual Convention to be held in Charlottetown Oct. 8th and 9th. This examination paper will probably be set and marked by leading educationists of Charlottetown, and is open to any person who may be prepared to try it. Any one unable to take the examination at the time herein specified may make arrangements with Rev. G. P. Raymond for a private examination any time before Sept. 25th.

WORK upon the Murray Harbor branch Railway is being pushed with all possible speed by Contractor Kitchen. Only three miles of the proposed line remain to be graded. It is understood that the new road will be modern in every detail. The first station will be located at Mt. Herbert, near the cheese factory. The second will be at Hazelbrook on Mr. John Smith's farm. The third will be on the farm of Mr. James Woods, Village Green. Flag stations will be established where most required. The contractor will lay the sleepers and rails and the Government will do the ballasting. The deepest cutting will be at Hazelbrook. The Hazelbrook cutting however is only 9 feet at the greatest depth. The work upon the road has been light. The damps are short, the highest only being 15 feet. The new road will be a great improvement over the present P. E. I. cuts and damps being wider. The track will be fenced the standard I. C. R. width, the celebrated anchor wire being used. The fence will not permit the smaller animals to enter upon the railroad. Two thirds of the road will be straight. The work of grading will be completed in about a month's time. Upwards of 100 men and 25 horses have been employed during the summer.
