Ring of St. John, who has taken a commander's course in England and is in command of the Battery and no doubt will shortly be gazetted as Major. During his absence from the Battery, while taking his course, Major W.G. Scully of Montreal was in temporary command of the "Happy Eight." Major Scully has now assumed command of another unit and like Capt. Ring is a very popular officer.

SERGT.-MAJOR LEIGHTIZER.—Word has been received by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Leightizer, City, that Sergeant-Major John Leightizer of the Expert Operating Railway Battalion has been invalided to England suffering from aseptic poisoning in the right arm. "Jack" was a famous athlete in the City in "the good old days," when the Abbie football team was known as the Maritime Beef Trust and the local teams carried their victories around the Maritime Province. Sergeant-Major Leightizer enlisted from Montreal and went overseas with probably the greatest battalion of railway experts ever banded together. Though not called on for trench or gun warfare, the operating Battalion has had call on many occasions to indulge in active skirmishes with the Huns. In one encounter they beat off an attacking party of Germans with coolness and crowbars an account of which was sent to the Canadian papers by the press representatives overseas.

GETTING TREATMENT IN HALIFAX.—Pre. G. E. Warren of North River, who went overseas with the 105th Battalion, severely wounded last May and returned home a short time ago, has gone to Halifax for medical treatment, which it is hoped will greatly improve his condition.

Just how our friends on the Magdalen Islands are going to fare for a steamer the coming season we know not."

INSTITUTE MEETING.—The regular monthly meeting of the Cornwall-York Women's Institute was held at the home of Mrs. F. Lowther, Cornwall on March 24th. Owing to the unfavorable condition of the weather the attendance was small, so the Poverty Party arranged for this evening was postponed till the next meeting which will be at Mrs. F. McLaren's, York Pt., on April 1st. After the business had been disposed of, dainty refreshments were served by the Cornwall Ladies and a pleasant social hour was enjoyed by all.

FURTHER PARTICULARS.—The New Glasgow News says:—Capt. Walter Rowe of the D. G. S. Stanley, which was sent out to rescue the Russian steamer reported in distress some miles off the Cape Breton coast, reports that his ship reached a point 115 miles southwest of Canoe and from there it was sold packed to Sable Island. It was found impossible to break through this ice barrier without unreasonable delay, and to reach the disabled steamer, the Stanley would have to go away around the southern end of Sable Island. This idea was given up because of the boisterous weather prevailing and for the time being, the efforts of rescue were abandoned. Capt. Rowe said that on his trip out, the ice conditions were practically the worst in all his experience, and even men who have been on this well-known ice-breaker longer than the Captain said they never before saw the like of it. As the Russian steamer is in the path of transatlantic ships they will likely fall in with her and tow the disabled craft to port.

ISLAND LADY DEAD.—Many friends in this province will hear with regret of the death in Jamaica Plains, Mass., on Monday, of Mrs. Nell D. MacLean, of Canoe Cove. Mrs. MacLean left here last November to visit her sisters in Jamaica Plains, and enjoyed fairly good health to within a few days of her death, when she contracted pneumonia and passed away in spite of good nursing and expert medical skill. The deceased lady leaves to mourn two daughters, Laura at home and Annie in Jamaica Plains, who was with her mother when she passed away, and two sons, Nelson and Daniel of Canoe Cove. The remains are expected here on Friday next for burial. Funeral notice later.
