**CHRISTIAN CHURCH EXPANSION**—The St. John Telegraph says: Having registered a determination to raise \$4,000 to secure the services of an evangelist, they have already pledged or contributed about \$700 to that cause, the annual convention of the Christian Churches of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, whose sermons concluded in the Douglas Avenue church on Saturday evening marked a big advancement in the work of the Christian churches in the two provinces. Business sessions were held on Saturday morning and afternoon and a public meeting in the evening. On Sunday conference sermons were delivered and special services were held in both the Coburg street and Douglas Avenue churches, and C. E. Armstrong, of Montague, P.E.I., was the preacher in St. Matthew's church on Sunday night. J.S. Flagler, in appealing for support of the home missions for which \$4,000 was to be raised to support an evangelist, predicted that before ten years had passed the vacant pulpits in the Christian churches would be filled, and capably filled by women. He spoke of the funds which the Home Mission society already had, which gave \$200 annually in interest, exclusive of another fund of \$800. L. A. Miles, the chairman, also appealed for support for the work. \$370 was taken in the collection and pledges were given to contribute \$530, while the previous night pledges for \$150 had been given. **THE CULT OF OMAR**  
The church of the Cult of Omar has expired. Founded on the rubbish of Omar Khayyam, a new religious organization, was born in The Pas, Manitoba, this spring; it sprang into sudden importance and today only three of its original members would admit that they still held firm to their beliefs. The exodus from membership started when a new convert made the statement that the whole affair was arranged with the object of getting a Government permit to purchase liquors from the Government store under guise of its necessity for sacramental purposes. Officials of the cult deny that they had any intention.

Many leading business and professional men of The Pas were members of the Cult, and the movement has assumed an importance and standing that was thought to threaten the temporary disruption of the local churches. Ministers were alarmed and amazed to read in a local paper the names of the members of the Cult of Omar, some of whom were leading members following the statement of the truant member as to the alleged purpose of the society, this movement collapsed rapidly.

**"RAINMAKER" TO GET \$8,000**  
"Rainmaker" Charles M. Hatfield has won his bet with the Medicine Hat United Agricultural Association, and he will be paid \$8,000 for rain which has fallen in the district during the past three months. Hatfield was to receive \$8,000 if four inches of rain fell between May 1 and July 1. Up to Saturday, July 31, four and one-quarter inches had been recorded, and so Hatfield draws the maximum payment. The association will hold a meeting shortly to determine whether or not the contract shall be renewed for another year.

**Unveiling Of Dundas Monument**  
Monday Aug. 15th. will long be remembered by the inhabitants of Dundas and surrounding districts as the unveiling and dedicating of the beautiful monument in the Dundas Cemetery in memory of Dundas brave boys who lost their lives in defence of their country and freedom during the world's great war. The monument stands about eleven feet high, and rests on a concrete foundation moulded in panel work. The lower granite base is three feet square, of light grey granite. The second base is of black granite two feet six inches square. The disc is two feet square by three and six inches in height, and black granite. The cap is of the same material and is finished in Gothic shape on top. Vere Beck & Sons of Montague were the contractors and are to be congratulated on the very fine piece of workmanship.

The day was all that could be desired being cool and fine and the air invigorating after the showers of the previous night.

The service was for most part held in the Presbyterian Church, which was filled to overflowing with earnest listeners, many of whom paid their last respects to the heroes whose names is inscribed on the monument.

Mr. Geo. J. Creed of Dundas, Chairman of the monument committee, very ably presided over the service which was very impressive from beginning to finish.

The address was well delivered and very inspiring.

Miss Sylvia McIntyre, in a very creditable manner, presided at the organ and the singing was excellent. Many visitors from other sections of the country were present, their opinion said it could not be excelled in any country community.

During the unveiling, four mothers of boys whose names are inscribed on the monument stood in a row facing the monument, and just behind them stood the returned men present, who saluted, as the monument was unveiled. Miss Edith McLeod, nurse, who spent considerable time in France during the war, stood beside the soldiers.

In the evening Mr. Burke of Charlottetown, favoured the people with moving pictures, of a very high order and instructive which were explained very well by Dr. H. D. Johnson of Charlottetown as they were shown on the curtains.
