

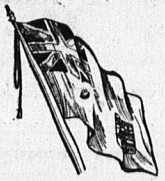

WHAT OTHER PROVINCES ARE DOING IN PROVIDING MACHINE GUNS

One thousand machine guns in two weeks. That was Canada's response to the appeal made just two weeks ago today for more guns for Canadian regiments on their way to the front.

One thousand more guns will be needed before our soldiers are as well equipped as the Germans whom they are facing, or are to face, in the trenches.

From Halifax to Victoria a wave of enthusiasm has swept across the country as the more machine guns became recognized, and it has found its expression in the generous subscriptions which are recorded in every province.

A machine-gun of the latest and most efficient type costs \$1,000. Col. Curry, invalided home from the front after the battle of St. Julien, estimates a machine-gun as the equivalent of almost a hundred men, and more than their equivalent in certain ever-recurring emergencies.

There are times when machine-guns and machine-guns only, can accomplish certain results. Without them, the lives of soldiers must be sacrificed to do what, with them, can be better done with much less risk and at a much less cost.

There has been one voice only, throughout the Dominion since the appeal for more machine-guns was made a fortnight ago. Those who cannot go to the front are using this opportunity to aid those who have gone or are going in a way which means not only saving Canadian lives, but increasing the efficiency of Canadian regiments.

The Montreal Daily Star publishes a list of contributions for the machine gun fund throughout Canada from which the following are clipped:

ONTARIO

TORONTO, July 26.—Since Senator Loughhead, Acting Minister of Militia, made his call for machine guns, or at least suggested that these are the most appropriate gifts that could be made by public bodies or individuals desirous of helping the Empire, 732 machine-guns have been donated or promised by this province or residents of it. Taking the average cost of a machine-gun at \$950, they represent a cash donation of \$695,400.

Early in the war Ontario realized the necessity and importance of the machine-gun as an offensive and defensive weapon. Some of the first public gifts from this province took that form. The City of Ottawa appropriated \$300,000 six or seven months ago for a machine-gun section of four guns mounted on armored motor vehicles. The Hon. Clifford Sifton and a number of other gentlemen of Ottawa duplicated the City of Ottawa's gift and donated the Sifton Machine Gun Battery of ten guns on armored cars. Sir John C. Eaton also formed a battery at a cost of \$100,000.

The most spectacular gift from Canada, however, was announced at the Massey Hall recruiting meeting held in Toronto last week, when the Hon. W. J. Hanna, acting premier, announced that the Provincial Government, in addition to the other magnificent gifts it had made, had decided to spend \$500,000 for the purchase of 500 machine-guns of the Lewis type. This type of gun is a light and portable weapon, weighing with all its appurtenances only 25 pounds. Without its field mount it weighs only 25 pounds, and can be fired from the shoulder by a strong man, and is capable of firing 400 rounds a minute.

At the same meeting at which the Hon. W. J. Hanna made his announcement, the Toronto Ministerial Association announced that its members had contributed the cost of one gun.

ALBERTA

EDMONTON, July 26.—Nearly fifty machine guns, as the result of both public and private subscriptions, are in sight from the Province of Alberta. The News Telegram of Calgary says that with contributions already made and promises given, about twenty-five machine guns are assured from the Calgary and Eastern British Columbia districts.

The Mountain Lumber Manufacturers' Association has given \$5,000 for guns for the 54th Battalion of British Columbia, and individual contributions for one gun apiece have been made by the citizens of Hanna and district, Patrick Burns, Eugene Coates, C. P. R. employees of Calgary, Hebrew citizens of Calgary, F. E. Osborne, Wholesale Grocers and Grocery Brokers, Canadian Credit Men's Trust Association of Alberta.

For the 68th Battalion at Edmonton, guns have been contributed by the following northern towns: Vegreville, Vermillion, Fort Saskatchewan, Peace River Crossing, Grand Prairie and possibly one other town. Three guns are being subscribed for by the citizens of Medicine Hat, and were intended for the 63rd Battalion of Edmonton, but as the Medicine Hat Company is now being absorbed by the 82nd Battalion of Calgary, the guns will doubtless go to that battalion. The City of Red Deer is raising money for a gun for the 63rd, and also the employees of the E. D. and B. C. Railway. For the 49th, now at Sherbrooke, an Edmonton regiment, and for the 51st, eight guns were secured as the result of the Board of Trade Fund.

SASKATCHEWAN

REGINA, Sask., July 26.—From available information, offers of three machine guns have been made by private organizations of this province to the Militia Department. The Pharmaceutical Association of Saskatchewan, in session here last week, voted \$1,000 for this purpose. The staff of The J. F. Cairns departmental store of Saskatoon, and the citizens of Kindersley, by private subscription, have pledged guns. Other offers are expected to follow as the mobilization of the 68th Battalion at Regina and the 56th of Saskatoon continues. Recruiting for both units has just commenced.

BRITISH COLUMBIA

VANCOUVER, B. C., July 26.—

Columbia was inaugurated by two officers of the 47th Battalion, who appealed to Vancouver men to purchase Lewis guns at \$1,000 each for issue to British Columbia regiments.

The appeal met with a striking response. Seven guns were donated at the end of the first day's campaign, several wealthy men appearing on the list. So fast did the money come in that a committee consisting of E. R. Ricketts, Clarence Marpole and R. V. Winch was appointed to take charge of the fund.

Vancouver hoped to donate twelve guns but the latest figures show that the money to buy fifty guns has been secured.

The committee then visited Victoria where ten guns were secured.

The movement spread to the upper country, and Nelson came through with five, while the small interior centres, put up the money for one each, and there is little doubt that British Columbia will buy one hundred guns for British Columbia boys.

NEW BRUNSWICK

ST. JOHN, N. B., July 26.—With the campaign for machine guns gathering momentum every day, thirty guns are already assured from New Brunswick. So far the contributions have been almost entirely from individuals and groups of individuals. As the various civic and municipal bodies meet it is expected that official grants will swell the lists.

So far the contributions announced in St. John are, one gun each from G. S. Mayes, Joseph Allison, L. R. Ross, T. H. Estabrooks & Co., James P. Robertson, Malcolm MacKay, John E. Moore, Fred E. Sayre, Frank P. Starr. Several others are undecided as to giving one gun each or half of a gun.

In Moncton collections for guns are being made by the I. O. O. F., the Women's Patriotic League and the Knights of Pythias.

ONE HALF GUN EACH.

The following are giving one half gun each, D. C. Dawson, E. L. Risling, D. C. Clark, E. A. Goodwin, F. G. Estabrooks. These with guns the diann town section will make at least Elks are expected to provide, one each from several societies, one from a group of ten men, one from Douglas avenue residents and one from the downtown section will make at least twenty.

OTHER CITIES.

The St. Andrews Society of Fredericton has given one gun. Residents of Woodstock, N. B., have given a gun for the 55th Battalion and the municipality of Carleton County, is expected to give at least one.

In the Miramichi district on the north shore a resident of Chatham and another of Douglastown have given one each and subscriptions in Chatham and Newcastle have provided two more. In several other counties the movement is just beginning to take form and before long many more contributions are expected.

No more popular movement has been undertaken since the war started.

NOVA SCOTIA.

HALIFAX, July 26.—Nova Scotia has contributed six machine guns to the Canadian Expeditionary Forces with more in sight.

At a public meeting to arrange for recruiting, Mr. G. S. Campbell announced that the Directors of the Bank of Nova Scotia had offered to supply two machine guns for one of the Nova Scotia battalions. He said it was entirely appropriate that a bank which bears the name of this province should make the offer applicable to the Nova Scotia battalions.

The same day the directors of the Halifax Hotel wired the Militia Department that they would deem it a great privilege to have the honor of contributing a machine gun to the Canadian Contingent, and that they desired this gun be given to either the 25th, or the 40th Battalion, Nova Scotia regiments. Their check would be forwarded as soon as advised of the acceptance of this gun.

The above are only a few taken from the list. There are many individual gifts of guns, some from parents as memorials to sons killed in action, some from patriotic societies, some from employees, employees of Corporations, Post Office Employees, Railway Employees, etc. etc.

The showing is a magnificent demonstration of Canadian patriotism, of Canadians awakening to their duty, Canada will now be fittingly represented at the front, fittingly and worthily equipped.

HALIFAX, July 27.—D. Macgillivray has been authorized by Mrs. Laurie, Oakfield, widow of Major-General J. W. Laurie, to order on her behalf a machine gun to be used either by the 25th or the 40th regiments.

This noble act comes very aptly from Mrs. Laurie whose family has sacrificed so much for the empire. Her husband was a useful public man

in civil as well as military life. One of her sons was killed in the early part of the present war. A second met his death in the service of king and country in the South African war. A third is at the front engaged in important work.

for an education that formerly the most of the agricultural colleges, affording an education that formerly had to be sought abroad. Instead of having to go to Truro they could have right here the assistance of the ablest instructors in Canada. He then referred to the Women's Institutes and Domestic Science and the great benefit they were proving, in agricultural education, one of the principal authorities in Ontario, had made the statement that Prince Edward Island was a long way ahead of the other provinces. He mentioned the agricultural buildings in Charlottetown and Summerside that had been provided and all paid for. He referred also to the operations that were in progress regarding the distribution of mangel seed fertilizer to farmers. Mr. McKinnon was listened to with the closest attention and his remarks were loudly applauded.

Premier Mathieson followed in an excellent review of the political situation and was listened to with keenest interest throughout.

Hon. John McLean was the next speaker. He said that when the election came to vote they should ask the other party what they intended to do that would be better than the record of the present Government during the past four years. He referred to the wonderful reduction of debt under the present administration and spoke in glowing terms of the indefatigable efforts of the premier in the presentation of the Island's claim at Ottawa. No man ever worked harder than Mr. Mathieson did, devoting all his time and energy to the performance of his duty towards his country. He presented the Island's claim in such a manner that it could not be refused. He also referred to the car ferry and the great boon it would prove, especially to the fishermen and farmers, enabling them to ship their produce in unbroken bulk to any part of the continent.

Mr. A. L. Fraser briefly reviewed the situation in regard to local affairs. In connection with Dominion politics he referred to the speeches of Mr. Hughes in the matter of scandals. The party was ready to admit that irregularities would occasionally occur, but Sir Robert Borden, when these were in a straightforward, fearless way and placed the blame on the shoulders to which it belonged, whether friend or foe, whereas for fifteen years Sir Wilfrid's party kept everything that could not bear the light of investigation strictly in the dark. (Cheers). That was the difference between the two parties.

The meeting closed with the National Anthem, three cheers for the Premier, Messrs McKinnon and Prowse
