DOES GREAT BRITAIN WANT WAR WITH GERMANY?

Probably nine out of ten of our readers would find no difficulty in answering the above question in the negative. They would say off-hand that Britain does not want war, and the Guardian shares that conviction. But here is an article in the Toronto World which expresses a contrary opinion. The World believes that while Germany desires peace, Britain is not only ready for war, but desires that it shall be precipitated soon. We quote:—

"England, on the contrary, seems to be seeking war. She was within an ace of attacking Germany last fall. She is ready today to attack her. There must be a reason. What is it? Her people resent Germany's attitude and Germany's steady advance as a rival for England's trade."

"We believe, as we said, Germany does not want to fight. We believe that she does want to expand. We believe she has a right to expand. But England has blocked her so far."

"We believe that England wants to fight, not for the love of fighting, but because, as we believe, she thinks she will never get Germany any weaker in fighting strength, she will find her on the contrary stronger and more militant year by year. 'If it were done, when 'tis done, then were well it were done quickly!'"

"England has something up her sleeve, and Germany knows something. What are they? England has an ally in France. Has she any more? We do not know. But at all events England is ready to fight."

In the light of such an article in a Canadian newspaper, we are the better prepared for the German misunderstanding of the attitude and wishes of the British people, for if such

opinions as are here expressed can obtain any credence at all in Canada, it must be comparatively easy for the German people to accept them, and hence the danger of war occurring may be greater than has been commonly supposed. If either one or other of the two nations becomes convinced that the other desires to fight, then there will be imminent danger that war cannot be prevented.

The World is an ably conducted newspaper, loyal, conservative and not frequently given to the expression of extreme views, except possibly at times in matters political. It is therefore with surprise and some regret that we find it indulging the erratic and injurious opinion that Great Britain desires war with Germany. So far as our reading goes, no other Canadian newspaper of any considerable standing shares the World's views of the existing situation. We cannot believe that either the present Government of the United Kingdom or the British people desire war with Germany, or with any other nation.

In a subsequent portion of the World's article above quoted from, an intimation is given that Germany may acquire Portugal's possessions in Africa, now shortly to be sold, and that this may give the opportunity for German expansion which may render the Anglo-German crisis less acute for the time and so prevent the immediate resort to open hostilities. But the World views this as merely a temporary compromise and insists that Britain wants to fight Germany with her ships and wants to fight now. This seems to us an absurd and preposterous conclusion.

THE TARIFF COMMISSION.

The vote on the principle of creating a tariff commission in the House of Commons the other day gave a majority of 52 for the Government and the measure, which is more than a mere party majority. The fact is that both parties have been for years past committed to the principle, but neither party trusts the other. The Liberal objection in the present instance is not to the principle of a commission, but to a commission of Conservative appointment.

The commission will have no legislative powers; it can neither make nor revise the tariff. For any tariff changes now or hereafter to be made the Government must take the full responsibility and Parliament must give its sanction. The tariff commission's powers will be limited to finding information and investigating. It may be a good thing or a bad thing to have a tariff commission. The value of its work will depend largely upon the capability and honesty of the men who are appointed.

A commission composed of men who believe in stiff protection will quite naturally find information to support their views, just as in religious matters the prophet's vision always corresponds with his creed. So that there would be a difference between

the information gathered and the recommendations, if any are made, by two commissions holding different views in regard to protection. The Opposition fear, and the danger to the public is that a commission appointed by a Conservative and protectionist Government may collect information specially designed to bolster up the protectionist system in Canada.

The Guardian has always held that the Canadian tariff is too high and ought to be reduced. The protective tariff as it stands is mainly the creation of the Conservative party. The Liberal party came into power in 1896, committed by its platform to destroy the last vestige of protection, but instead of destroying, it gave its sanction to protection. With that betrayal the hopes of the low tariff and revenue tariff men in Canada were dashed to the ground. It cannot be hoped that the party now in power will destroy their own creation, seeing that their opponents who were pledged to destroy it, and having the power to do so refused to task.

Believing as we do that the present tariff is far too high, and is injurious on that account to the Maritime Provinces and especially to Prince Edward Island and to the far western Provinces, we can only hope and trust that the Government will be merciful and not lay any additional burdens upon the consumer. And we think it will be found to be a sound policy for the party in power to reduce rather than increase the rates of duties, however they may be advised by the protected interests or by a commission wholly committed to protection. The movement of popular conviction in both Canada and the United States is towards tariff reform downwards and if the Government of the day will set to work moderately in the direction of relief to the great body of consumers the flowing tide will be with them.

NOTES

We anticipate the election of Hon. George P. Graham in South Renfrew on the 22nd, chiefly because of the large Liberal majority in the riding and partly because of the popular sense of the desirability of having Mr. Graham in the House and of the fact that the Conservatives are unreasonably desirous of preventing him from getting there. One thing operates against Mr. Graham in the election. He is a non-resident of the riding and is on record as opposed to electing non-resident candidates.
