the servants of the community," Dr. Best claimed in the course of his address last night. "We look forward to some future day," he continued, "when the world will be governed by the principles of love, good will, and peace."
Dr. Best prefaced his remarks by congratulating Dr. Clark, Mr. Luck and the directors of the local Association on the fine work which they have done, the courageous and determined manner in which they met and surmounted their many problems. He reviewed the past five years in which the organization in common with all suffered from the depression, but due to the "orderly retreat," the manner in which the Association adapted itself to the times, the Y. M. C. A. was ready to resume the march of progress.
Dr. Best traced the history of the Association and enlarged on its activities showing the well-balanced program it provided. Its scope was unlimited in that it included the religious, social and physical education of youth.
The meeting was closed by prayer by Rev. Hugh Miller.

A Public Speaking Class has been organized. Since the first session held on February 19th, nine meetings were held with a total attendance of ninety-six.
"Bowling has been one of our recreational features which has had quite a large participation. In the Ladies' section two Leagues met in our Building throughout the season—four Teams were entered from the Zion Presbyterian Guild in one League and four Teams from the Rebekahs in the other League. Fifty different ladies participated in these leagues. A total of fifty-one games were bowled with a total attendance of four hundred and eighty-five participants. In the men's section, twenty-four Teams were entered from five different leagues with one hundred and eighty-five different men participating. One hundred and twenty-one games were bowled with a gross attendance of one thousand and sixty-five bowlers.
"In the Girls' and Boys' Hobby Exhibition there were twenty different Classes of Exhibits and Contests, with two hundred and fifty-four different entries including eleven Group entries from Boy Scouts, C. G. T., Team Rangers, and School Classes. There were two hundred and seventy-five different entrants in the Exhibition and for the three nights and two afternoons during which the Exhibition was held, there was an approximate attendance of one thousand and persons including entrants, judges, and all others who were connected with the event.
"The Y's Men's Club has been more than a right arm to the Association the past year. Among their good works were the re-decorating of the main lobby, the re-decorating, furnishing and equipping of the Reading Room which they formally opened in November 1934. They provided the funds for the Educational Classes and gave whole-hearted assistance in connection with the very successful play held at the close of January. In addition to these services they made a substantial cash contribution to the funds of the Association.
"There is only one rival organization that can win over the Y. M. C. A. and that is the Ladies' Auxiliary. We do not think that any member of the Y's Men's Club will disagree so much that organization also owes so much to the Ladies. We acknowledge the generous gifts the Auxiliary has contributed to our general funds. In addition to the wonderful help they have been, month by month, week by week, in assisting at our Supper Gatherings.
"We wish, at this time, to express our appreciation of the Y's Men's Club who organized in the Autumn of 1934 as an Auxiliary in the work of the Y's Men's Club. They have assisted with the serving of the boys' suppers and have rendered a splendid service in connection with the refurbishing of the Reading Room and in providing curtains for our main lobby.
"The Hi-Y Grads, an organization of college students and graduates who have been together over a period of years, have shown a significant development in their willingness to take on service tasks as evidenced by the part they have played in our Association work in recent months. They have assisted in the Sunday Evening after-school Church Song Service for young people, and in giving a measure of supervision to our weekly program for Community boys. During our recent Campaign they did splendid work and carried off a number of honors in addition to providing a substantial Club donation to the funds of the Association.
"The Financial Campaign which more than reached its objective is still recent history. We wish to pay tribute to the excellent executive ability of the General Chairman, Mr. P. W. Turner and to thank him and all those who were associated with him in carrying through so successfully and quickly a Financial Campaign in these difficult times. It is a great incentive and inspiration to the staff and Board of Directors to know that the citizens are so whole-hearted behind the Association. We wish to pay tribute to our Ladies' Auxiliary, the Y's Men's Club, the Y's Men's Club, and the Hi-Y Grads for the substantial contributions made to the Campaign fund by each of these organizations. It is most encouraging not only from the standpoint of funds raised but it gives heartening evidence of the fine spirit of loyalty which binds together the units of our Association.
"The Foreign Work of the Young Men's Christian Association in common with that of other Missionary enterprises has been greatly curtailed in recent years. The International budget was, however, balanced. Canada made up her allotment and our Association contributed the objective the Board agreed upon. This year we hope to exceed the allotment of \$125,000. Friends of our organization learn more of the wonderful work of the Foreign Secretaries who can make Christian contacts with other peoples that are not open to the Denominational Missionary enterprises. These contributions are of course individual voluntary ones by interested friends of the "Y."

Directors' Report
Deep regret is expressed in the Directors' report, at the death recently of Lieut. Col. Dr. V. L. Goodwill, who had been a very active and faithful member of the Board.
"The very serious financial stress throughout rural communities," says the report, "reacted upon the business conditions of our city and that financial has been a problem that your Board has had continually before it. We thank all those who during the year, supported us in our endeavour to maintain the work and still keep within our revenues."
Other quotations from the report follow:
"There has been whole hearted co-operation between the Students Christian Movement, the Young Men's Christian Association and the Ministerial Association to make the Sunday evening Sing Song services of great value to the whole community. Twenty eight services were conducted with an average attendance of over three hundred. A Sussex, N.B., on Tuesday evening. and bring renewed progress and prosperity. (Loud applause).
HON. MR. MCPHEE
In a brief address at the close of the meeting, Hon. H. F. MacPhee, Attorney General, voiced pleasure at the privilege of attending such a significant convention. He referred to the popularity, experience and ability of the new federal candidate, Hon. Dr. MacDonald and commended also the choice made in the provincial candidates. "All you have to do now," he added, "is to get solidly behind your candidates; give them that wholehearted support which they are entitled to receive, and there is no doubt as to the success which will result."
Mr. MacPhee paid a warm tribute to Hon. J. A. MacDonald, whose resignation he generally regretted.
The success of the present provincial Government, he said, has not been paralleled by any former administration, and 85 per cent of this was due to the character, the zeal and ability of Premier MacMillan. Emphasis was placed on the many problems which the Premier had had to face, including the rebuilding of the two most important establishments of the Province—the establishment of old age pensions, and unemployment difficulties consequent upon the world depression. "When you consider his record of accomplishment in the face of the difficulties which had to be overcome, I am sure that the people of this Province will not wish that the administration of affairs should pass out of the hands of a man who has such a splendid record of success." (Applause).
Tribute was also paid to the phenomenal achievements of Premier Bennett — to his courageous leadership and statesmanship which is bringing Canada with such credit through the present great crisis in world history.
The convention closed with the singing of the National Anthem and hearty cheers for Premier Bennett, Premier MacMillan, the candidates, and Hon. Mr. MacDonald.

Looking Forward
"As we look toward the year ahead of us, we are deeply impressed with the opportunities which we believe, face our Association for service to our Community. Not only are we conscious of the opportunities, but we are aware of the responsibility which rests upon the Association. The friends who support the Young Men's Christian Association, honor it not only by the opportunities which their support make possible, but by the challenge they present to our Association. A measure of criticism is heard these days in Y. M. C. A. centres, suggesting that our Association has lost its original purpose and lacks in spiritual dynamic in influencing the Christian life. It is quite true that there has been considerable change in the set-up and scope of our program during these latter years, but we wish to re-affirm our position of the Young Men's Christian Association as a brotherhood devoted to the task of making Jesus Christ and his teachings real in the lives of men and boys, and we wish to re-affirm this as the fundamental purpose of the Young Men's Christian Association. It is quite true that the carrying out of this great mission has taken on a new meaning and in the day in which we are living and the problems facing us, it seems to us, is that there is a great need for an added emphasis on interpreting the life and teachings of Jesus as they may be applied not only to individuals but to larger groups in our Society and whole of life. Our daily work, our play, our interest in Art, Music, Literature, our Social Groups, or whatever it may be that has cultural value, may each and all be the media by which a well balanced Christian personality may be expressed. We recognize our place as an auxiliary to the Church, and recognize it as our responsibility to give whatever help and encouragement we can in directing those with whom we come in contact into the Church and its service.
"Thought will soon be given to initiating certain organized work for girls, and to further program projects in the area of adult education. The size of our City and all that we warrant an expansion program along the lines indicated. In a comparatively short period of time a new Y. M. C. A. Building in Charlottetown is essential, if our Association is to go forward and carry on the work which we believe, is so qualified to do and for which there is urgent need. A moderately planned Community type of Building equipped with a swimming pool and facilities for an all-round program in Christian education is not only a great need in our City, but must come within the next few years if our Association and extra-curricular education for our young people is to keep pace with other towns and cities—some of them smaller than Charlottetown—throughout Canada.
"In closing the directors and staff wish to thank all those who have so generously given their assistance both in time and money during the past year to increase the usefulness of the Y. M. C. A. to our community.
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
