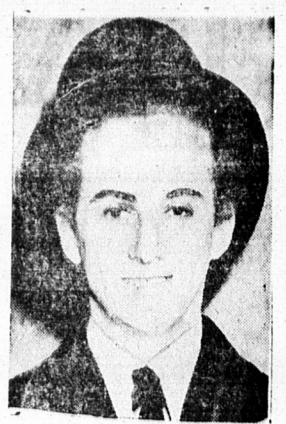

**NEW YORK, Oct. 10 (AP)**—Masterpieces of modern French art with a possible value of \$500,000 were removed from the American export liner Excelsior by British authorities at Bermuda last week, line officials said today. The line said more than 500 paintings by such masters as Gauguin, Degas, Manet, Monet, Cezanne, Renoir, and Picasso were seized from the ship's strong room as well as a box of books with illustrations by Rembrandt. Officials said they had been told that Britain regarded the pictures as "enemy exports" and a ruse by the Germans to secure dollar exchange in America.

**In Memoriam**

**MRS. ANNIE FISHER MCCOY**

Many friends in Moncton and vicinity will learn with regret of the death of Mrs. Annie Fisher McCoy one of the oldest and most highly respected residents of Moncton who died Tuesday at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Weston Palmer, 379 Highfield Street.

Mrs. McCoy was the widow of William McCoy of this city in March last and celebrated her 65th birthday and although her health had been somewhat impaired during the past months, she had been confined to her bed only during the past few days.

A daughter of John and Christine Fisher, Tench of Redbank, N. B. Mrs. McCoy was the last surviving member of her family. As a bride she went to St. John, N. B., to live and her home there was destroyed by the fire of 1877. With her husband she moved to Moncton almost 60 years ago and had washed with the green of Moncton.

She was one of the oldest members of St. John's United Church of this city, having been a member of the congregation when they worshipped in the old church on Mountain Road. Besides her home and church work Mrs. McCoy had time to assist in other benevolent and charitable efforts. During the World War she gave full of her time to the Red Cross Society. Even in the present conflict, she had done some knitting for the boys overseas.

She is survived by one son, George E. McCoy, assistant general superintendent of the equipment, central region, C. N. R. Toronto, and four daughters, Mrs. J. A. Webster of Charlottetown, P. L. I.; Mrs. H. A. MacNaughton, Grand Rapids, Mich.; Mrs. J. G. Dyden, of this city, and Mrs. Weston Palmer, with whom she lived. Both of the daughters who lived out of town had been home for several days prior to her death. Six grandchildren also survive.

The funeral was held from 379 Highfield Street on Thursday at 2 p.m. Dr. J. A. Kerr, pastor of St. John's United Church officiated. Burial was made in Elmwood cemetery. —Moncton Times

**TRADING WITH THE ENEMY**

In order to avoid trading with the enemy, all agricultural and other merchandise sent from Canada or any other country to Newfoundland territory in any part of the world must be covered by a certificate of origin. These certificates can be sent by letter and more convenient to have them issued by the local Chamber of Commerce or Board of Trade. No special form is required, the signature of the officer of the Board of Trade being accepted as such and need not be certified by the Consulate.

**U.S. Calf Quota Now About Filled**

The annual quota on calves entering the United States from all countries at the reduced rate of 1-1-2 cents per pound is 100,000 head. When this number has been exhausted, the full rate of 2-1-2 cents per pound is collected. The quota for 1940 as at the end of September was about filled. In fact, United States customs officials are now collecting the higher rate with provision made, of course, for a rebate on any of the calves which beat the deadline of 100,000. In this connection, it is interesting to note that in 1939 when the quota was filled about the middle of September, prices on Canadian markets were very little affected and Canada continued to ship a fair volume of calves to the United States each week until the end of the year. What the performance will be this year remains to be seen but the fact remains that Canadian calves are generally good sellers on such markets as New York and Jersey City, frequently bringing the top prices.
