LIBERAL MEETING AT ST. MARY'S HALL

A Liberal mass meeting was held in St. Mary's Hall, Summerside, on Friday night and was addressed at considerable length by Hon. J. E. Sinclair, Premier Saunders, Mr. A. E. MacLean, M.P., and Hon. P. J. Veniot, Postmaster-General of Canada. Hon. Dr. John F. MacNeill presided over a gathering which filled the hall. Hon. J. E. Sinclair and Mr. MacLean reviewed the activities of the past session at Ottawa and seemed to find quite a lot to praise in the Liberal policies, past and present.

He then went on to extol in a rambling manner the savings in all departments of the Government excepting the public works department. Addressing the meeting Hon. P. J. Veniot, Postmaster General said that at a Conservative meeting held in Summerside the other day credit was given to Hon. J. A. McDonald, M.P., for Kings for obtaining through his efforts the additional car ferry service, whereas the full credit, Mr. Veniot maintained, was due to Messrs. McLean, Sinclair and Jenkins.

Referring to the accident to the ferry service last winter he said—"Your mails would have been indefinitely held up were it not for the very prompt action of Messrs. MacLean, Sinclair and Jenkins." Within a very few hours after it was seen that the mail service would be interrupted, these gentlemen were in communication with me by telegram. I immediately made arrangements for emergency air mail service and within twelve hours after receipt of their telegram an airplane reached Moncton to carry mail to your Island Province." In dealing with Mr. Bennett's condemnation of the Liberal Government for allowing so much of our raw material to be exported, Mr. Veniot pointed out that the highly protected country, the United States exported 40 percent of all the raw material it produced, including wheat, while Canada exported, wheat included, 46 percent. If you leave out wheat, said Mr. Veniot, you will find United States exports about 10 to 13 percent more of its raw material, than does Canada.

What then becomes of Mr. Bennett's argument that a high tariff will give more employment to our people, by forcing the manufacture of our raw material into the finished products. It has not been so in the United States, the highest tariff country in the world. It did not have such results under the high tariff policy of the Canadian Tories. The facts are all against Mr. Bennett's contention.

Dealing with Mr. Bennett's recent speeches on the attitude of the United States Government and their proposed new tariff the Postmaster General said, "In his speeches, Mr. Bennett points out that we are importing too much from the United States and that we should increase our tariff and thus put a stop to such large imports." In dealing with our imports from United States and other countries Bennett does not tell the whole story. If he did, it would not suit his purpose, for immediately it would be seen how absurd the argument is. The moment the United States Elections were over, Mr. Bennett and his friends began to cry for Canada to raise our tariff all along the line. They appealed to red blooded Canadians to meet the United States threat to raise their tariff by a large increase in the Canadian tariff. They advocated this movement before even knowing to what extent the United States might go. Finally when Congress did meet and some idea could be had of what was intended, Mr. Bennett made his famous speech in which he hinted at trade within the Empire. What became of their red blooded appeal. He has not explained the cause of this breakdown. His empire trade suggestion was made in a moment of despair. If he had studied Canadian Political History, he would have known that ever since 1896 the Liberal Party has been steadily drifting towards that goal by its frequent application of the British preference. Under a Liberal rule, trading within the empire has been given a wonderful impetus. While Canadians, owing to our close proximity to United States are desirous, and even anxious to trade with them, should they obstruct that trade by high tariff walls, Canada cannot be blamed in any effort we may make to find new avenues of trade.

I cannot see that we have any grave reason to fear the action of the United States, whatever that action may be. Canada has always been able to stand on its own footing in the past, and I know I am safe in saying Canada can still do so. The Liberal Party has never failed to meet any commercial, industrial or financial crisis that may arise and the Liberal party will be prepared when the proper time comes to meet whatever situation may be created in our economic condition by the action of the United States. The government of the day is closely watching the situation and will be prepared when necessary to act in the best interests of the general good of the Canadian people. Mr. Bennett claims Canada must change her tariff policy because the United States is threatening to change her policy. Since when did the Conservative Party make up its mind to follow in the footsteps of the United States politicians? Not very long ago Mr. Bennett and his party were preaching no truck nor trade with the Yankees. All this harangue about raising our tariff against the United States before it is known what our neighbors to the south really intend doing, is very poor statesmanship. The United States are discussing heavy increases in their tariff, not against Canada alone but against the entire world. The Republican Party is divided on this issue. No one, not even the versatile Mr. Bennett, can foretell the outcome. Why then should Canada jump the stile before reaching it? You may rest assured that the Liberal Party will meet the situation when the proper time comes. As in the past, the Liberal Party will adjust our tariff to meet the needs of the Canadian people alone. That is the policy of the King Government.

The Problems of Higher Education as well as the Christian Home in Modern, Social and Industrial Life were all dealt with in a manner which has sent the delegates home to their respective countries with the firm rooted conviction that there is still, in the future of the world's development, a great part for the Presbyterian Church still to play.

The most important question for the representatives of the Presbyterian Church in Canada was the name, which is the face of worldwide Presbyterianism, we still bear. This important matter was discussed by two hours and a resolution brought in by Dr. Cox, the Principal Clerk of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland became the finding of the business committee and ultimately of the Alliance. It is to be noted that as far as the Alliance is concerned the Presbyterian Church in Canada, as a charter member of the Alliance, stands in the same relation thereto as it did before the disruption of 1925, and while this matter might be in dispute in Canada it cannot alter the relationship which the so-called continuing
