These candidates have, persistently and publicly stated that they have not promised, nor do they intend if elected to favor any such exemption. This civic fight should at least be a fair one.

The special meeting of the Summerside School Board held last night, was attended by quite a number of friends. The matter of ventilation and cleanliness of the High School was under discussion. Some suggestions relative to the introduction of a better system of heating were made and will probably be acted upon by the board. Dr. J. F. McNeill, health officer, read a report giving his impressions relative to the condition in the school. A letter from Dr. Anderson, superintendent of education, was also read by the chairman, speaking in the highest terms of the system of ventilation used in the Summerside schools.

C. R. Rogers, Sumner side, has purchased the Brown lot, adjoining his lot on Central street, and purposes erecting a handsome residence to take the place of the one destroyed in the recent fire. The residence, judging from the plans and specifications prepared, will be an ornament to the town. STIRRED HATRED AGAINST BRITISH

Labhore Newspaper Publisher Sent to Prison: Sentence Causes Outbreak

LABHORE, Feb. 18.—There has been a violent outbreak of anti-British feeling here, following the conviction of the proprietor and editor of the native newspaper, Pustaji, for stirring up hatred against the government and the English community. The paper printed a story that an English officer shot a Mohammedan policeman for refusing to carry the carcass of a dead bear the officer had speared, adding that the government had hushed up the affair and the murderer escaped. The European murderers of natives usually escaped in this country, where the much-vaunted British justice is a delusion. The Government prosecutor showed the story was fictitious, and that the policeman was killed by being thrown from a horse. The prisoners pleaded that they had published an unverified rumour in good faith. The court sentenced the proprietor to two years imprisonment and to pay a fine of 1,000 rupees. The editor was sentenced to six months imprisonment, and to pay a fine of 2,000 rupees. After the sentences had been imposed a crowd of Hindus paraded the streets shouting denunciations and hoisting every thing European they met. The native population is deeply stirred.

CANADIAN HIGH COMMISSIONER

Sir Frederick Borden Likely to Succeed Lord Strathcona in London

OTTAWA, Feb. 18.—Sir Frederick Borden is likely to be appointed Canadian High Commissioner in Lord Strathcona's stead, when the latter decides definitely to retire. Whether Lord Strathcona's resignation is announced at once or is withheld for some little time to come, it is known to those who have been in touch with the High Commissioner, that he has been expressing to his friends a desire to be relieved from the duties of this responsible post and some months ago, moreover, discussed the subject both with Sir Wilfrid Laurier and with the Minister of the Interior.

COTTON MILL FOR MONTREAL

Will Employ Eight Hundred Hands—Good Demand for Cotton in Canada

MONTREAL, Feb. 18.—Within eighteen months a new cotton mill with a capital of \$1,500,000, employing 800 hands, and containing 120 looms and 40,000 spindles will be in operation in the Island of Montreal. Mr. W. F. Whitehead, formerly of the Dominion Textile Company is the promoter and thirty Montreal capitalists have subscribed, the capital required.

DOUKHOBORS ARE BAD CITIZENS

YORKTON, Sask., February 19.—Doukhobors who live in the communal reservation, attacked Constable Scott, who attempted to levy on their cattle for the head tax, which they have refused to pay. One hundred and ninety-two warrants were sworn out, and an additional force called out, but again the Doukhobors, assisted by a horde of their women, drove the officers off and recovered their goods. Now the mounted police have been called in. The English speaking troubles have helped the authorities. Trouble has been experienced for years in this section, the Doukhobors being impressed with their Russian ideas of not being subject to a head tax when living in communal colonies and that their goods are not subject to attachments to pay a head tax.

LONDON, February 19.—The Board of Guardians of Lurgan, Ireland, assert that a villager named Thompson is the laziest man on earth. Thompson went to bed in 1877 and did not leave it until two weeks ago and then only on compulsion. His aged mother, with whom he lives alone, was taken ill and had to be removed to an infirmary, and Thompson was then compelled to get up. The effort rendered him too tired to walk and he was taken to the workhouse in an ambulance, where he remained until his mother returned home. Thompson followed her immediately, but was compelled to walk this time, the poor guardians refusing to furnish an ambulance. He is now comfortably in bed again. He is supported by his old mother, who receives occasional help from her energetic sons in Australia, and eight-pence a week from the guardians. The doctors tried irritating plasters and electric currents on Thompson to make him get up, but they had no effect. He is quite healthy, but suffers from acute, chronic laziness.
